LANGARA CAMPUS

One of Vancouver Community College's three campuses, Langara offers a wide array of academic university transfer courses as well as over 20 employment oriented Career Programs. The Arts and Science (Academic) programs comprise first and second year university level courses, most of which are acceptable for credit at the province's three public universities. Career Programs are further described inside these pages.

ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS

CITIZENSHIP CATEGORY

Canadian Citizen or Permanent Resident (Landed Immigrant) status is required.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE PROFICIENCY

You must possess a level of English sufficient to support studies at Langara. Should you not, you may be first referred to King Edward Campus for English Assessment and perhaps assigned to an English upgrading course.

EDUCATIONAL BACKGROUND

THE FOLLOWING CATEGORIES ARE CONSIDERED FOR ADMISSION:

- Regular B.C. Grade 12 completion (as defined by the Ministry of Education) or its equivalent from another province or country.
- 2. Conditional An applicant, just leaving Grade 12, short of graduation by no more than two (2) courses, may be considered for admission in this category. The applicant must complete the shortfall within one year. Until this is complete, the applicant will be required to take a reduced course load.
- 3. Dean's Admission (Mature Student)

Admissibility is adjudicated by the Counselling Department based on age, work experience, and academic potential.

EDUCATIONAL DOCUMENTS

Before a final decision is made on admission, applicants are required to provide a copy of secondary school grades and/or other documents. (See Application Procedures for details of submission.)

LANGUAGE PROFICIENCY INDEX (LPI)

- 1. All Langara Campus Career Programs require English or Communication courses as part of their curriculum. You must write the LPI several months prior to registration. The results may be needed in determining acceptability.
- 2. The LPI must be written by an Arts and Science Langara student who intends to enroll in an English Department course. Depending on test results placement may be in a college or pre-college level English course.
- The LPI is conducted several times a year and pre-registration is required. Contact your school counsellor or the Langara Counselling Department for further information.

MATHEMATICS AND COMPUTER SCIENCE DIAGNOSTIC TESTS

Students wishing to take specific academic Mathematics and Computer Science courses may be required to write a diagnostic placement test prior to registration.

These tests are free and should be written well before registration.

ARTS AND SCIENCE PROGRAMS

APPLICATION FORMS

- 1. For transfer courses and for enrollment in "independent" or general education courses, use an "Academic" (Arts & Science) application form.
- 2. Application forms can be obtained from and returned to the Langara Counselling Department in person or by mail.

EARLY SEPTEMBER APPLICATIONS BY CURRENTLY ENROLLED GRADE 12 STUDENTS

- 1. Completed application forms can be submitted as early as February 15th. An interim Grade 12 record need not be submitted.
- 2. At this time a registration number is assigned and the application is filed as "Pending". This number is released to the applicant upon his/her submission of an official graduation record later in the year.
- 3. At early application time printed course planning information is distributed. Secondary school applicants are encouraged to attend a Langara course planning group session. In addition, an applicant may make an appointment to see a Langara counsellor in order to discuss course choices and other questions.

EARLY SEPTEMBER APPLICATIONS BY OTHER APPLICANTS

- 1. Completed applications can be submitted as early as February 15th. As necessary, secondary school completion records and any post-secondary education records should also be submitted.
- 2. Immediately, a September Term registration number is assigned and released to applicant.
- 3. At application time printed course planning information is distributed. Further, an applicant can attend scheduled course planning group sessions and/or make an appointment to see a counsellor.

JANUARY AND MAY TERM APPLICATIONS

- 1. Completed application forms can be submitted as early as October 15th and February 15th, respectively.
- 2. (Further procedure the same as above.)

COUNSELLING DEPARTMENT

The Counselling Department provides confidential counselling to students attending Langara Campus and to persons planning to enrol.

Students may request service in the form of admissions assistance, course planning, career or vocational guidance, or personal counselling. In addition to regular academic advising and counselling services, the department provides occupational information, maintains a collection of university and college calendars, and conducts personal development and study skills workshops.

Counsellors are available from 9:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Monday to Thursday, and from 11:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on Fridays. For an appointment please phone 324-5505.

CAREER PROGRAMS

APPLICATION FORMS

- 1. Specific program forms can be obtained from the Langara Counselling Department in person or by mail.
- 2. Secondary school counselling offices should have a quantity of mail order request forms for the use of students.

PROCEDURE

- 1. Early application is strongly recommended as all these programs have limited enrollment.
- 2. Applications can be submitted as early as 10 months ahead of program starting date. Most career programs start once a year in September. (For the three exceptions, see program descriptions inside.)
- 3. Please read and follow calendar-stated program admission requirements, obtain and complete application form attachments, and submit requested documents.
- 4. Acknowledgement of application submission and notification of future steps such as interviews, testing, auditions, etc., will be mailed to you.
- 5. Grade 12 enrolled students can apply for Career programs: choose programs; submit appropriate applications; and attach a copy of Grade 11 marks and Grade 12 marks to date. As soon as possible, submit a copy of your graduation results.

Fine Arts, Theatre and Communication

Advanced placement in the nursing program is available to Licensed Practical nurses and Psychiatric nurses, upon completion of pre-requisites and a 45-hour introductory course.

Recreation Facilities Management

P.E. and Recreation

Recreation Leadership

This two-year (four-term) diploma program trains graduates in the management and operation of municipal recreation programs and activities, private organizations such as Y.M.C.A.'s and Boys and Girls Clubs, and commercial fitness and leisure facilities.

This two year (four-term) diploma program trains graduates in the design, management, and operational aspects of various Recreational Facilities (eg. ice skating arenas, swimming pools, golf courses, ski hills, fitness centres, etc.). The courses focus on accounting, food and beverage operations, physical plant maintenance, staffing, recreation programming, management, and philosophy.

Business Administration / Computer Technology

Accounting

This two year (four-term) diploma program provides preparatory training for students interested in accounting occupations in business, industry and government. Course credit may also be transferred to professional accountancy programs offered by the Certified General Accountants Association, the Society of Management Accountants, and the Institute of Chartered **Accountants**

1. Grade 12 completion or mature student status.

 Preference given to applicants with a C+ average in senior secondary school English, Social Studies, Mathematics, and Accounting, or to applicants with a grade point average greater than 2.00 in post-secondary studies.

NOTE: Students now have the option of entering the Co-operative Education Accounting Program.
Two work terms are included in this six-term program.

Business Finance and Investment Management

This two year (four-term) diploma program introduces students to the principles and functions of finance and investment, including such areas as stock market activity, securities analysis, internal company finance, and the credit granting process. This program also fulfills the requirements of The Canadian Institute of Credit and Financial Management.

Preference given to applicants with above-average grades or those with relevant work experience.

General Insurance

This two-year (four term) diploma program provides sound knowledge and understanding of general insurance and related business administration skills, emphasizing practical application. Rewarding careers include brokerage, underwriting, claims adjusting or risk management.

 Preference is given to those with above average grades.

- Students may enter the Co-op option providing they meet the academic qualifications.

Marketing and Sales

This two-year (four-term) diploma program prepares graduates to enter the field of sales and marketing in industry and commerce. It emphasizes interpersonal relations, decision making processes and sales and marketing policies and practices.

- 1. Grade 12 completion or mature student status.
- Preference given to applicants with above-average grades or to those with relevant work experience.
- This program starts every September.
 Applications are accepted as of November 1 and early application is encouraged.

Pacific Rim (Business Option)

This program provides preparatory training for students considering future employment in trade, commerce or professional activities dealing with certain Pacific Rim countries.

- Grade 12 completion or mature student status.
 Willingness to learn a Pacific Rim language.
- 3. At least 2 years work or study beyond high school graduation.

Realty Appraisal Program

The Realty Appraisal Program offers three options:

(1) The full-time two year Diploma Program (Regular);

(2) The full-time two year Diploma Program (Co-op Ed.);

(3) The part-time Certificate Program (Evening).

All three options are endorsed by the Appraisal Institute of Ganada which sets Canada-wide standards for the appraisal profession and regulates the national code of ethics. Two professional designations are awarded to qualified members of the Institute: CRA (Canadian Residential Appraiser) and AACI (Accredited Appraiser Canadian Institute).

The Program prepares graduates for employment as real estate appraisers and investment consultants. They will also be eligible to write the Appraisal Institute of Canada's National Comprehensive Examination leading towards the professional designations.

Small Business Development

This 8 month (two-term) certificate program is designed to assist entrepreneurs with the initial stages of developing a small business. It blends instruction and practical experience in areas of management, financing, marketing, and planning skills as applied to small business.

Computer Information Systems

This two-year (six-term) diploma program trains students in computer programming and systems analysis. A co-operative education program; and two terms of paid work experience are integrated with four terms of classroom instruction for those who meet academic qualifications.

Computer Systems Technologist

This two-year (six-term) diploma program educates students to develop "high-tech" mini/microcomputer applications for environments where an in-depth knowledge of computer architecture is desired. The CST program provides the graduates with High-tech education, paid work experience (Co-op option), job opportunities and career as well as academic advancement.

- 1. Grade 12 completion or mature student status.
- 2. Algebra 12 and Physics 11 with C grades or better. Physics 12 is preferred.
- 3. Successful performance on Language Proficiency Index and Mathematics and Computer Science Diagnostic Tests.
- Successful admission interview.

- This program starts each September.
- 2. Applications are accepted as of November 1 and early application is encouraged.
- 3. On application, students are strongly advised to see the CST counsellor or CST co-ordinator for discussing the program contents as well as course planning.

Arts and Science - (University Transfer) (Academic Education)

1. Arts and Science studies provide students with an opportunity to take academic courses for which credit can be transferred to many university degree programs. Students can receive a Vancouver Community College, Langara Campus Diploma upon completing two years (four terms) of study.

N.B. Under some circumstances, Accounting can be a transfer course. Also many Physical Education, Theatre Arts and Fine Arts courses have transfer status. Please check with Student Services (Counselling) for details.

General Education Independent Course Registrations

This 60 credit hour diploma program provides an opportunity for students to undertake a diverse selection of course work and to receive a Vancouver Community College, Langara Campus Diploma in General Education. Courses may be selected from Arts and Science, or Career Courses.

- Grade 12 completion or mature student status. Students who are not mature students and who have not completed Grade 12 may be admitted on a conditional basis, if they are deficient in no more than two courses. Students admitted on a conditional basis must complete their deficient coursework while enrolled in a partial course load at Langara Campus.

INSTRUCTIONAL SUPPORT SERVICES

LANGARA CAMPUS BOOKSTORE

The Langara Bookstore, located on the main floor of the Library building, sells all required and recommended text-books used in college courses. In addition, the store stocks a selection of general books of interest, school and art supplies, and sportswear.

The bookstore staff welcomes you to browse and to give them suggestions. On your request, any available book not presently in stock will be specially ordered. Store hours are 8:30 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Monday to Thursday and 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on Fridays.

LIBRARY

The Langara Library is the centre of action throughout the year. Its five floors contain books, periodicals, newspapers, films, records and tapes.

The library staff are eager to provide assistance in any way. Students are welcome to browse, study or check out materials.

INSTRUCTIONAL ASSISTANCE

In addition to classroom instruction, instructors maintain scheduled office hours for student consultation. These office hours are usually posted on their office doors.

THE GOLD ROOM

English and Mathematics tutoring is available in the Gold Room A212- located in the South West wing on the second floor. Reference books, grammar and essay writing handouts are also available there.

FINANCIAL AID

Students whose resources are insufficient to provide for the cost of full-time studies may apply for financial assistance through the British Columbia Student Assistance Program. This program consists of interest-free loans provided by the federal and provincial governments. Application forms for loans are available at Langara's Counselling Department. They should be completed and returned to the Financial Aid Office at least 10 weeks prior to the start of classes.

In addition, there are a number of private scholarships and bursaries. These awards are listed in the Langara Campus calendar. Further information and applications can be obtained from the Financial Aid Office, which is located in the Counselling Department.

REGISTRAR/RECORDS OFFICE

The Records Office provides the service of the Registrar. This office maintains complete student records on admissions, grades, and certificates and diplomas granted.

Students should contact the Records Office when:

- a. requesting calendars and course schedules;
- b. requesting official transcripts or unofficial duplicates of records;

- c. inquiring about permanent registration numbers and student identification cards.
- d. changing one's name or address; or
- e. needing any information regarding student records or registration.

SERVICES FOR DISABLED STUDENTS

Langara Campus is well equipped to provide a wide variety of services to meet the needs of disabled students who are strongly urged to make their needs known as early as possible prior to registration. It is staffed by a full-time physician, community health nurse, and receptionist/first-aid attendant; and by a part-time psychologist, psychiatrist, and orthoptist (vision testing). Students concerned about their health are free to drop in for a visit. Whatever the concern, the Health Service staff provides medical treatment, counselling and referral services. The Student Health Service is located on the main concourse across from the elevator and is open from 9:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. Phone 324-5256.
