

PSYCHIATRIC NURSING

This course is designed for L.P.N.'s and other related nursing personnel and is intended to provide basic information relevant to human development, care-giver patient relationships and dynamic nursing care practices. Concepts relating to behaviour development, defense mechanisms, communication skills, common patient behaviour in the mentally ill adult and nursing interventions will be reviewed.

Security in a retail setting is this course's focus; topics include external and internal loss, employee dishonesty, security hardware and systems, and disturbed persons. You will discover the nature of a Security Officer's role by considering such topics as Bill 38, responsibilities and limitations under the Criminal Code, and courtroom preparation.

This course investigates access control and patrolling as well as crowd control, dealing with disturbed persons, security hardware and systems, and narcotics recognition.

Preventing fires, acting on bomb threats, insuring job safety, and implementing a practical security survey are the primary means of assuring building safety. These topics are supplemented by an intensive study of first aid procedures.

This course introduces the student to electronic components, basic electrical laws and circuits, electronic test equipment, circuit construction and trouble-shooting techniques.

Introducing AC circuit concepts and measuring techniques, this course explores the semi-conductor diode, signal generators, and AC voltmeters; it provides experience using oscilloscopes to make time, frequency and amplitude measurements.

This course introduces the student to the BJT, biasing methods, and applications in DC circuits. LDRs and TDRs will be employed as input devices and LEDs as output indicators is a wide variety of switching circuits.

Regulated and unregulated DC power supply circuits form the main topic of this course. The theory and application of Zener diodes is developed along with applications of BJTs in regulator circuits.

Stored program computing machine concepts are taught using a single board micro-computer for hands-on experience in machine language programming, interfacing and trouble-shooting.
