# Three Women Making an Environmental Difference

MARY FERGUSON, A GRADUATE of the VCC Volunteer Management Program, was always conscious of environmental issues, yet they seemed distant. Mary teamed up with two other equally talented women, Brenda Sawada, another VCC Volunteer Management Graduate, and Carol Journeay, to start up The Sage Foundation, a unique environmental awareness group.

Formed in early 1990, the goal of The Sage Foundation is to translate environmental concerns into actions. Prior to the formation of Sage, nothing

existed for the average citizen who was concerned about the environment, yet unsure of what could be done, and perhaps swayed by the notion that individual actions have little impact.

EcoMotion, one of Sage's more recent projects, used the slogan "you can make a difference." EcoMotion was implemented through facts and simple solutions given in informal talks and checkliststyle pamphlets (printed on

100% post-consumer recycled paper, of course!). For example, "a group of 20 people refusing two (styrofoam) cups per day amounts to 14,600 cups a year," is thought provoking and indicates the measurable benefit of choosing to bring your own mug.

According to Mary, Director of

Public Relations, the successful response to EcoMotion can be attributed to the "positive delivery and reinforcement to encourage people to take small steps and changes and celebrate the successes, as opposed to using harsh gloom and doom tactics."

"The optimism of the action is better than the pessimism of the thought," is one of Program Development Director Brenda Sawada's cherished quotes reflecting her belief in positive action.

through a former instructor in the Volunteer Management Program at VCC. Although they took the course at different times, both offer positive comments about the Volunteer Management Program. They speak warmly of instructors Marilyn McClaren and Marie MacDonald as "inspiring," and commend the practicality of the program. The philosophy of volunteering really struck a chord with Brenda and Mary.

The third founding director of The Sage Foundation, Carol Journeay, quickly recognized the effectiveness of volunteers at Mary and Brenda's "Sage school of (very) professional volunteer management." With a committment to planning, strategy and cooperative support while discovering unusual, even playful ways to get environmental actions underway, Carol provides the strong, creative vision for The Sage Foundation.

To sum up the Sage Foundation, the words of Margaret Mead are fitting. "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world. Indeed it's the only thing that ever has." •

On May 21, 1992, VCC President John Cruikshank announced that due to a College Executive Committee decision, the Alumni program would receive no funding after June 30, 1992. However, due to perseverence and belief in the Alumni Association, the Executive Director and several members of the Alumni Board of Directors wrote up a proposal for a restructured alumni program. The plan was approved, and the new Alumni Association is currently under the auspices of the Educational Foundation, with an Alumni Advisory Committee and one part-time co-ordinator.

The value of an alumni program is not as some think, simply another way to garner funds from former graduates. While financial support for scholarships is always welcome, that is not the sole mission of an Alumni Association. An Alumni Association has several functions which validate the maintenance of alumni records, membership and communication. In the words of former Executive Director, Barbara Alldritt, the alumni are "natural recruiters and mentors for new students for career, technical and vocational programs. The knowledge and contacts they have in the community can assist students and alumni with career placement and development —issues that ranked at the top of student concerns according to a study conducted by Keith Murray, Department Chair of Business Administration programs at Langara Campus.'

Through efforts such as the Alumni Benefits Club, Career Day and ALUMNEWS, the Alumni Association attempts to offer something back to the graduates of VCC while connecting them with future graduates of VCC. Anita Moore, Legal Assistant Program, 1992, is working as a legal assistant in Fort St. John and reportedly survived her first


Mary Arts, Telecommunications Management, 1992, is currently working as a Telecommunications Co-ordinator for I.C.B.C. in North Vancouver.

Andrew enjoyed the Photography Program, mentioning Lyle Larrigan and his classmates. Of his classmates, Andrew says, "our class gets together for dim sum, and keeps in touch."

Upon graduation from the Photography Program, Andrew started working fulltime for Hope International.

Andrew's face lights up as he tells dozens of stories about his experiences in Ethiopia, a visually stunning country he has visited several times. On many of the trips, the Hope crew travelled by LandCruiser. Often when they stopped at villages, a mass of children swarmed around the side mirrors of the Toyota to gaze at their reflections, fascinated by this never before seen novelty.

In another story, one that is less lighthearted, yet has a happy ending, Andrew tells of the incredibly long journeys people in parts of Ethiopia would make to reach dry river

beds. Travelling by night due to the extreme heat, the excursion would often take six hours of walking in each direction. Waiting in lines for several hours and having to dig down six or eight feet for dirty water was not uncommon. Ironically, the liquid that took so much energy to retrieve was often the cause of disease and subsequent death.

One of the projects which Andrew worked with was a water handpump project. The pumps were installed over bore holes that drilled into the dry earth, extracting the natural streams of water located far beneath the surface. With several dozen pumps installed, crystal-clear drinking water, free of impurities, was available and walking distances

Although Andrew no longer works for Hope on a fulltime basis, he does take pictures for them on a freelance basis. Andrew recently completed a two year stint working in the microfilm lab of ICBC, where he met his fiancee. They plan to wed in the new year. ◆





## A Lesson for Canada In Indonesian Wilderness

THE LAST THING KEC GRADU-ATE TREVOR SAWKINS expected to find in one of the most remote regions of the world was a new perspective on Canadian politics.

Sawkins, winner of the 1991-92 Pacific Rim Scholarship for VCC students, recently returned from Indonesia, a country that is trying to unify its people amid internal complexities that make a Canadian accord look as daunting as a two piece jig-saw puzzle.

Sawkins's final six weeks abroad were spent in the easternmost province of Irian Jaya (the province forms the western half of the island of New Guinea).

The rugged geography and sparse population of Irian Jaya creates a huge cultural diversity: communication between tribal groups in different vallevs has been so minimal that over 700 languages have come to exist.

"Soon after arriving, market or go to a we flew into the Baliem Valley, deep in the interior," said Sawkins. "It was as if we had stepped out of a time capsule into a land of tens of thousands ary who had preof years before.

"Many men (of the Dani people) wore only a penis gourd; many women only a grass skirt. The market was an incredible confusion of native Dani and immigrants from other parts of Indonesia selling a colourful display of tobacco, housewares, fruit, vegetables...one man even tried to sell us a fruit bat, stressing its deliciousness. We politely declined."
