

"Recognize change and seize the opportunity to play a central role in the Canadian society of the future" was the message Vancouver Community College President Paul Gallagher had for those who attended the Annual Conference of the Association of Canadian Community Colleges held last June.

Dr. Gallagher pointed out that there is a widespread view that the next five vears will see the emergence of new social and economic conditions in Canada. If that forecast is accurate, the greatest challenge for the next five years is to redirect college education.

Dr. Gallagher believes colleges need to examine what college education ought to become. He identified five indicators:

- College learning must become more integrated. As faculty, we will have to talk to each other and focus our attention on each student as a whole person; we must see beyond our specific area of
- Direct learning takes place when communication is learned with practice in writing and speaking; and, by the same means, thinking will become more direct and purposeful.
- Foundation programming needs to be enhanced. Colleges, like other educational institutions, work with many

underprepared students.

- Colleges need to convince students that learning must become a continuing process. Colleges should make a long-term commitment to students who come for initial post-secondary education or training and such students should want to make a long-term

commitment to their colleges.

- Much greater attention should be paid to the need for non-technical upgrading of people already in the workforce or seeking employment. The work world is full of people who are stuck in a career rut not because they lack technical skill or potential, but because they do not have the communication skills necessary for working with each other.

Dr. Gallagher ended on the optimistic note that if Canada's colleges can respond effectively to the challenge of redirection, they will be far ahead of other education institutions within Canada and beyond. They have the opportunity to lead the way in Canadian education.



#### **Letting Out** the Seams at Langara

Mel Fearman knows as well as anyone how much the building additions under construction at Langara Campus will alleviate the congestion that exists there. Fearman is Building Services Manager for Langara. A VCC graduate himself, he joined the staff 11 years ago. He has been able to observe the changes that had to occur as student populations climbed to over 6,000 on a site intended for 3,500. Fearman says that

A one storey infill courtyard inside the quadrangle will accommodate Health Services, Continuing Education Faculty offices, and a student study and lounge space. The infill will be covered with a roof garden, which may enhance the view from the inside windows on the 2nd and 3rd floors of the quadrangle. A three storey addition to the south side of the Library will allow for relocation of the bookstore, and the instructional Media Services Department. It will also provide for additional stacks and more badly needed study space for students. The last phase of construction will occur on the north side of the campus adjacent to the entrance. More space will be created to expand the Student Services area. The



while the overcrowding can be stressful, the growth has occurred gradually and for the most part, people have made adjustments. The result has been that people work very hard and they have become very good at doing their jobs and running things at a high level of efficiency.

Nevertheless, the overcrowding has taken its toll on the quality of life at Langara and it has made it difficult for Fearman to do his job.

The large number of people on the site complicate efforts to regulate room temperatures. Keeping the facilities clean and maintained is more of a challenge too. According to Fearman, the lack of study and lounge space has put excessive pressure on the cafeteria, hallways and foyer. The office where we met was a student lounge when I was a student in the seventies. Today eight student lounge areas have been converted for other uses. Fearman says the new additions will reduce the stress of overcrowding by giving students more places to study and socialize.

John Lauder is the Project Manager for the construction. He says none of the additions are going to increase instructional space. All of the new space created will be dedicated to improving services for the students that are currently enrolled.

Daycare will be relocated and the Computer Services Department will be expanded and consolidated. Other aspects of the renovations will bring the buildings to current government standards to improve fire safety features and facilities for disabled people.

Lauder says the priorities for the renovation were set by the people who use the facilities. The plan is a scaled down version of a seven million dollar project that was planned in 1981. The 81 plan was tabled when the Province had to cut spending in 1982. In 1986, the Province came back with an offer of 4 million dollars to improve the campus facilities. One of the things dropped from the original plan was an extension of the Cafeteria on the west

Both Fearman and Lauder agree the twenty acre site is accommodating as many students as it can comfortably manage. They do not feel that expansion of the instructional space to allow for more students would be appropriate. If funds, however, became available for more improvements to the existing space, expansion of the Cafeteria would be on the top of their list.

The present construction is scheduled for completion this summer.

#### Popping the Cork at JJ's

We arrived promptly for our 5:30 reservation at JJ's to be greeted by maitre'd Hans Obeck. Obeck is the instructor for Dining Room and Lounge Training Service at Vancouver Vocational Institute. Our student waiter for the evening is Douglas Beaudry. Douglas proves to be very knowledgeable and not just about the menu, he tells us about some of the many talents of his instructor Hans Obeck.

Obeck, who has been an instructor at VVI for 10 years, has also gained substantial renown as a wine taster. His success at a recent wine tasting competition at the Meridian Hotel, has earned him a chance to attend the Canadian Sommelier Contest in Montreal 1988.

"When tasting a wine, one looks for: colour, balance, bouquet, aroma, taste and aftertaste. All of these must be present and acceptable for the wine to gain passing marks." For amateur wine tasters Hans offered the following hints: "Choose 2 red and 2 white wines each from different grape varieties. Follow the above rules for tasting wines. Once you feel comfortable with this, try 2 wines from the same grape, like Chardonnay, but from different countries.

As for cooking with wine, a leg of lamb with a nice French Bordeaux was a defi-

nite first choice from Hans. On your next visit to II's for dinner talk to Hans about wine, that is, if you can catch him in between seating guests, overseeing the cooks and observing the waiters.

Getting back to our dinner. We enjoyed the sole which was beautifully presented and cooked to perfection. The menu is French, the food is down home good. Pouring through the notes I made during our visit to JJ's is tempting my appetite for more.

If you know all about JJ's, you should go back for a visit (that is for all you VVI grads). Courage continued from page 1 that steady work coming in, and his contacts provide that."

Quang does not work alone in the shop. He remembered a school colleague's pleas for employment at graduation, and hired Danny Kou when the work load got heavy. The work has not slowed down since then. "We have at least one car in every day and one car out every day; we always have eight hour days." Danny says.

He loves the no-pressure working environment he shares with Quang. Because they learned the trade together in school - picking each other as partners whenever a school assignment called for two workers - both Danny and Quang call their relationship a partnership instead of one of employee and employer.

"I don't call him boss," Danny says.
"We joke around, it's not even a job really."

Danny says they treat each other on an equal level. "If Quang doesn't know what he is doing, I'll help him."

Quang has met his challenges with the same quick smile he wears when he speaks to anyone. Like the time he was accused of stealing customers away from his neighbour, another autobody shop. The owner retaliated by refusing to rent a painting booth to Quang.

"It was wrong - most of my work came from the dealerships at that time. I didn't have a painting booth and I needed one so I had to rent another one, but it was far away."

Quang resolved their differences out of necessity by talking with the owner several times. It was the same perseverance that carried him through another problem: understanding customers.

"They would think the work on their car would only take two hours, but I had to explain it would take all day."

Customers' attention to detail would frustrate Quang, but now he says he has developed an understanding of their point of view, and he strives to make them happy.

Quang has learned what many small business operators discover and that is "to open a shop is very easy, but to keep it alive is hard."
