LINC Program given reprieve

he College is pleased to announce that our largest contract, Language Instruction to New Canadians (LINC), funded by the Federal Government, has been extended to September 1, 1995. This has allowed the College to continue serving more than 600 students and to delay the layoff of 59 instructors and 7 VMREU staff. The extension was made possible through assistance from the Ministry of Skills, Training and Labour, Province of BC,

and by changes in Federal Funding arrangements announced just three days before our previous contract was to expire.

The College is beginning immediate discussions with both levels of government to attempt before the summer to have in place a new contract beyond our current end date of September 1. We have no way of being certain we can continue with the contract in September, but are hopeful we can find a longer term solution. We will keep the VCC community posted on new developments. In the meantime, please offer your support to the students, staff and faculty whose futures depend upon this contract. We sympathize with the stress that arises from such uncertainty.

Students: Aboriginal Business Internship Program

In Aboriginal culture, young people who are ready to put time and effort into serious study of new skills turn to their elders for instruction and guidance. In the business environment, the same idea is called mentoring and it's central to CCAB's Aboriginal Business Internship Program. The CCAB Internship Program began in 1986 and has evolved substantially. Today, the program aims to hire Aboriginal youth in organizations and businesses to give them a better understanding

of career options. It's objective is to also to provide training and an opportunity to develop business skills. Selected applicants must meet the specific hiring requirements of a host organization. Internships can last up to one year. Over this period, the intern's salary and benefits are paid by the host organization. For those organizations who qualify, CCAB will provide a partial wage subsidy.

Requirements of potential interns:

Potential interns must first complete an internship application form. Application forms can be obtained through Canadian Council for Aboriginal Business, Vancouver, P.O. Box 169 920-Howe Street, Vancouver, B.C. V6Z 2K8 (604) 684-2999.

- Aboriginal ancestry: Status, Non-Status, Metis, Inuit, or Innu
- Ages: 18 24
- Minimum education: high school graduation
