If you want to expand your knowledge and forge friendships and working relationships with people from Asia or Mexico, and share those experiences with fellow British Columbians on your return, you could qualify for the Asia Pacific or Mexico Awards.

The Ministry of Skills, Training and Labour, through the British Columbia Centre for International Education, offers financial awards to public community college or provincial institute students and professional staff eager to develop their understanding of Asia or Mexico.

These awards are reserved for people who are keenly committed to cross-cultural understanding. Recipients represent Canada abroad and are expected to use the experience to promote understanding at home.

For students

The program provides financial support for award recipients attending rigorous programs of study in Asia or Mexico.

For professional staff

The program provides financial support enabling recipients to work in an educational institution in Asia or Mexico.

Applicants must be Canadian citizens or landed immigrants, and be permanent residents of British Columbia attending/working in a public community college or provincial institute. Asia Pacific Grant Program

This program provides small grants to enable students to participate in an organized related program of study at an overseas institution, for example, practice-teaching ESL and studying Thai at an institution in Thailand. Period abroad must be a minimum of two months and individuals must be participating in an exchange or linkage program between a British Columbian institution and the overseas institution. If this fits in with a current or potential program of study in your department, please contact Cecily May at 871-7178, or the B.C. kitchens. In just one year they collected and distributed over 2.5 million pounds of donated and purchased food to individuals and agencies in need.

Your financial contribution will enable the Food Bank to purchase items so that they can offer nutritionally balanced bags of food. All donations will be gratefully received and used responsibly to help those individuals currently battling hunger.

Notice of City Centre Campus Saturday closures


