\$110,000 raised for Vancouver Community College needs

hris Mayhew of Surrey, BC was the lucky ticket holder for the 1995 VCC Educational Foundation Truck Lottery.

"I've been buying tickets since this lottery first started. Even when I lived in the Yukon." After six years of trying, Chris has hit the jackpot by winning the grand prize of a 1996 Western Star (4964F) truck. Worth over \$120,000, this truck, which is equipped with a 435hp Caterpillar engine and computerized dash display, Rockwell transmission, clutch and rear brake system, Michelin

tires, Magnum aluminum cab guard and a BC Tel Mobility phone, attracted a lot of ticket buyers. In fact, all 2,500 tickets soldout two weeks early.

Chris, a driver for Protrux Systems, hauls lumber through the Okanagan. His wife Leona and one year-old daughter Merissa were excited when told of his latest big haul. "My wife is due with our second child any day. The excitement from this might just bring it on early." After living in the Yukon for 15 years and working as a mechanic for the Yukon Highways Department, Chris moved down to the Lower Mainland and bought his own truck. "The dream of any trucker is to own your own

rig outright," said Chris. This win will go a long way to fulfilling his dreams.

Other dreams will be fulfilled through this lottery as well. The VCC Educational Foundation raised \$110,000 which will provide much needed equipment for students attending Vancouver Community College. Computers, upgraded tech-

nical equipment and learning aides are just some of the needs. "Students need to learn on current equipment to enable a smooth transition from school into the workforce," says Lilli Milder, President of the VCC Educational Foundation. "Funds from projects such as this lottery go a long way to furthering students' dreams."

Other winners from this lottery include: second prize of \$1,000 to John Wight of Nanaimo, BC; third prize of \$500 to Bob Matthews of Lethbridge, Alberta; and two early-bird prizes of \$250 each went to Randy Kootnekoff of Fernie, BC and Albert Woynarski of Wynyard, Saskatchewan.

New VCC policies

Better late than never, the following are the VCC Policies on Access to College Facilities (5.1.1.2) and Control of Keys and Access Cards (5.1.1.3). We apologize for the delay in getting these policies out to you.

Policy No. 5.1.1.2 Issue Date: Nov 8, 1994 Amendment New Source: Facilities

Access to College Facilities

Concerning: All Employees, Contractors and Students

President's Approval: John Sm. prhon

Policy

Title:

- 1. Access to Vancouver Community College facilities will be managed to ensure that the security of college and personal property is maintained while providing the required level of access to employees, contractors and students.
- 2. An individual's required level of access will be determined based on the frequency and urgency of their need for access.
- 3. Each department/program head will be responsible for determining the level of access required for the individuals within their department. Access to restricted areas within a department will be at the discretion of the department/program head having authority over these areas.
- 4. Access to multiple departments will be provided for the following positions only:

Grand Master: Designated regular hours administrator; Designated after hours administrator

Service Master: Designated maintenance personnel; Designated cleaners; Security

5. Where an individual's access to their department is through an adjoining department, both department/program heads shall authorize the individual's access.

Title: Control of Keys and Access Cards
Concerning: All Employees, Contractors and Students
President's Approval:

Policy

- 1. The Building Service Manager at each campus is responsible for issuing keys and access cards.
- 2. The individual authorizing a key/card to be issued (i.e. department head/program head) is responsible for reporting employee transfers/termination and lost/stolen keys/cards to the key control clerk.
- 3. The key/card holder is responsible for immediately reporting lost or stolen keys/cards to the authority who signed for the keys/cards. The key/card holder is responsible for returning keys/cards to the issuer upon transfer to a different department or upon discontinuation of service.
- 4. Keys/cards issued to contract service employees are the responsibility of the em-

ployee's contract employer. The contract employer is responsible for the cost of re-keying locks if: keys are lost/stolen due to employee negligence and if keys are not returned upon completion of the contract with Vancouver Community College.

The contract employer is responsible for paying the replacement cost of cards if the card is lost/stolen due to employee negligence; or if the card is not returned upon completion of the contract with Vancouver Community College.

- 5. Keys/cards are transferable only through the Building Service Manager at each site.
- Requests for keys will be subject to the Access to College Facilities Policy.

Procedures

- 1. Keys and access cards will be issued by the Building Service Manager to an individual on presentation of a completed Key/ Card Authorization Form signed by the appropriate authority and the individual requesting the key/card.
- 2. Keys and access cards must be picked up in person and will only be issued to the individual requesting the key/card.
- 3. Keys and access cards must be returned to the issuer by the key holder upon transfer to a different department or upon discontinuation of service.
