ver thought about spending 14 months in a small boat meandering through the canals and waterways of France? After nearly five years of planning and anticipation, College and Career Access instructor Ted Hougham and his wife Shannon, along with their dog Bel Ria, arrived in Holland in July 1994 and began such an adventure.

Two months before, Ted had flown to Sneek, (pronounced "Snake") in the northern Dutch province of Friesland on a search and destroy mission: to buy a boat for their year-long trip through France. Not wanting to wait until July and risk finding no boats for sale or unsuitable ones available, he found and purchased one within a week of arriving. Built in 1974, the 24-foot motorboat, with living quarters and a top speed of 10 km/hour, served them like a trooper, and the builders, Aquannaut Yachting, helped them sell it at the end of their trip.

Neither Ted nor Shannon had ever manned a boat before, other than a canoe. On their first day out, they drove away from the pier and proceeded to hit the first bridge they came to. The only items in danger of being damaged more than their pride were their two bicycles, tied to the top of the boat. Ted's managed to survive relatively intact, but Shannon's has now acquired a permanent wobble from being dragged across the top of the boat by the underpart of the bridge. After that minor misadventure, they proceeded cautiously underway.

You may recall that the previous summer was one of incredibly high flood waters in Europe. While Ted and Shannon were docked in Avignon on the Rhône River, the waters rose three metres overnight. Luckily, their boat was tied to a floating quay, which moved up and down on a cement pole. During the flood, however, everything off the shoreline was picked up and swirled around in the river and against this small, 24 foot boat. Trees and garbage crashed into them all through one sleepless night. Luckily, the boat was made of strong Dutch steel and suffered no major damages.

France is full of canals, some of which are very old (such as the Canal du Midi, built in the mid-1600's) with beautiful construction and tiny stone bridges that a boat even as small as theirs had to creep under. Originally built to help transport barrels of grapes, wine, livestock, bricks and other heavy objects, the canals are still used today for such commerce, as well as for fishing and irrigation. On rivers such as the Rhine, however, huge container

How to get 'shot' and stay healthy

In previous years college health services have provided free influenza vaccine (received from the Vancouver Health Department) to staff and students who met the required *medical criteria*. Last year we had many more requests for the vaccine than we were able to meet. Therefore, we are happy to announce that this year we are expanding our influenza vaccination program.

Influenza occurs in Canada almost every year, generally during the late fall and winter months. The severity of the illness varies from year to year. It is advisable to receive your vaccine before the end of November. Protection against the influenza virus begins about 2 weeks after vaccination and has been shown to prevent illness in approximately 70% of adults. Side-effects of the vaccine are either non-existent or minimal. You cannot get the 'flu' from the vaccination because the vaccine does not contain live virus. Flu vaccine is considered safe in pregnancy.

We will, once again, be receiving a limited number of doses of vaccine from the Vancouver Health Department to be administered to students and staff meeting certain *medical criteria*. These criteria are:

- adults with chronic cardiac (heart) or pulmonary (lung) disorders severe enough to require regular medical follow-up or hospital care;
- adults with other chronic conditions such as diabetes and other metabolic diseases, cancer, immunodeficiency (including HIV virus/AIDS), immunosuppression, renal (kidney) disease and anaemia;
- · adults over 65 years of age;
- persons infected with HIV (Human Immunodeficiency Virus).

If you are a student or staff member, and you believe that you meet any of the above criteria, please contact Health Services as indicated below.

As well, we are pleased to announce that VCC Administration has agreed to fund the cost of 200 doses of influenza vaccine for any VCC staff members who would like to receive it. College Health Services will provide the materials to administer the vaccine. This is a new program and we encourage VCC staff to take advantage of this offer. We thank VCC Administration for funding the cost of this vaccine. We are purchasing the vaccine in bulk for a wholesale price. If you received your influenza 'shot' at a private vaccination clinic or the Vancouver Health Department the cost would be \$20. For VCC staff it is free (and given

If this program is well utilized and helps reduce absence due to influenza illness, we will likely propose that it is offered every year. But for this to happen the program must prove to be cost effective. So call us today to arrange for your 'shot'.

KEC, KEC West and KEC North staff - call the KEC college health nurse (Pauline Reaburn) at 871-7187 (9:00 to 3:00, Monday to Friday) for an appointment.

City Centre staff - call 443-8336 for an appointment with the college physician (Graham Burns) or if it is more convenient, arrange to have your vaccination at KEC by calling 871-7187.

Please note that after receiving the vaccine you are required to remain in our waiting area for at least 15 minutes following your injection.

ships travel in both directions, making for a less-than-relaxing trip for the operators of a boat as small as Ted's and Shannon's. Because of the currents, these container ships criss-cross their way up and down the river, making the proceedings even more interesting. Imagine any number of ships as large as those anchored in Vancouver's English Bay, tearing up and down the river with your 24-foot boat in the middle of it all, and you get an idea of how frightening this experience can be. They spent a hair-raising three hours in the middle of the

fray, with Ted at the wheel, white-knuckling his way up the river.

Undoubtedly, some of the most interesting aspects of a canal tour are the locks on the

canals themselves. On the larger canal systems the locks are now electrified, with an "éclusier(e)," or lock-keeper, overseeing the operation. (This is the equivalent to working an airport control tower.) However, on some canals, such as the Burgundy, the boat drivers themselves open and close the old water-driven locks by hand. To lend a hand in case of difficulty, mobile éclusier(e)s travel the adjacent canal paths on "mobilettes," the half-bicycle/half-motorcycle commonly seen in France. Incidentally, the canal path is one of the most attractive features of the system. Called a "chemin d'halage," the path follows the canal and is ideally suited to walking, running or cycling. As Ted explained, "a trip through the canals of Europe allows you to see the very best the countryside has to offer-herons, rabbits and other wildlife abound."

If any single part of the trip became more of a chore than any other, it was the time it took Ted and Shannon to drive the boat back to Friesland. As they had faith in the company they bought it from, they felt that the boat would be sold faster by such a reputable company than if they took their chances with an unknown one. This last part of the trip was made up of long days chugging their way back to Friesland. It didn't help that the summer was the second hottest in the last 300 years. (The hottest being the previous summer, when

Ted and Shannon began toodling through the canals.)

This being France, one would expect to find some excellent deals on good local wine, and Ted and Shannon weren't disappointed. As wine-growing

is a highly controlled industry, strict rules govern how much wine a single grower can bottle. Therefore, if a winegrower grows more than he is allowed to bottle, the surplus goes into a vat at the local wine-growers co-op and is sold to anyone with a container to hold it. This "vin de table" or "vin de pays," can be purchased "in bulk," from the vat, and a bottle that would cost \$25-30 in Vancouver goes for about 40 francs, or \$10-12. The only thing missing is the bottle and the label.

What's next for Ted and Shannon? Currently, they are considering a camper-van trip to Australia and New Zealand in five years. Also, after so much time on the water, they want to buy their own boat, even if it's as small as a rowboat. Bel-Ria, their dog, will be pleased to hear this. Named after a sea-faring dog of the same

name from a story by the author of "The Incredible Journey," Bel-Ria has taken to trying to lead her owners on to boats whenever they take her for walks along the piers. It seems she took to the adventure as well as Ted and Shannon did

MSTL education survey results

Improving the public education system, including post-secondary education, should be an important priority for the government, according to the Ministry of Skills, Training and Labour's recent survey of public views on education and training. The survey of 1,600 British Columbians included a series of questions on post-secondary education submitted by the AECBC. Other survey highlights:

- Three quarters of British Columbians oppose federal funding cuts to education and training programs;
- Two-thirds believe the college system is doing a good job providing education and training;
- 92% agree that training is the key to getting a good job;
- 80% believe post-secondary education is so important that everyone who needs it should have access regardless of income or ability to pay;
- While 77% find it easy to obtain information about post-secondary courses, almost two-thirds consider it difficult to get the post-secondary education and training that they may need or want;
- 75% believe education is becoming so expensive that it is getting out of reach for middle class families.

Swedish dental hygiene educator visiting VCC

hrough a submission to the Swedish "Council for the Renewal of Undergraduate Education" by Ms. Kerstin Öhrn, a six week exchange program is being implemented between the Várdhögskolan Falun College for Health and Caring Sciences, and Vancouver Community College.

The exchange program has been designed to develop contacts for students and faculty between VCC and the Falun college, enhance the diploma programs at both colleges, develop strategies for the development of baccalaureate and masters programs related to dental hygiene, and analyze articulation initiatives between community colleges and universities.

The exchange includes a visit by Kerstin Öhrn to the VCC Dental Hygiene Program from Sept. 25 to Nov. 3, 1995. During this time Ms. Öhrn will be involved in a variety of educational sessions on campus and in the dental hygiene community. Blood and Belonging by Michael Ignatieff

New York: Farrar, Straus and Giroux, 1994

Though he modestly calls it a personal journey, Michael Ignatieff's Blood and Belonging is an exposé and a condemnation of a shockingly pervasive belief system of our time: ethnic nationalism. Citing what Freud called "the narcissism of minor difference," he quotes the innocent explanations given by young Serbs and Croats for their enmity: "they smoke different cigarettes than we do." After visiting Irish Republicans and Irish Loyalists, and post-reunification East and West Germans, he returns to his native province to talk to Quebec separatists. His pilgrimage extends to the Ukraine, where his own ethnic roots lie: here he is finds himself personally affected by the emotional power of ethnic nationalism, which appeals to some part of him totally separate from his reasonable, intelligent cosmopolitanism.

One of the most striking photos in the book is of guerrilla fighter named Milan, photographed in the mountains of Iraq where she lives with her fellow guerrillas of the fanatically nationalist PKK party. Australian born and raised, she has revived her Kurkish roots, and the girlish face above the uniform and machine gun is radiant and joyful.

But Ignatieff's words give a dark warning: "There is a deep connection," he says, "between violence and belonging...if a nation gives people a reason to sacrifice themselves it also gives them a reason to kill."

Speaking sensibly and sanely about the nature of the world as it is at the end of the second millenium A.D., he expresses a grave concern that many feel about the recent tremendous resurgence of tribal belonging and exclusiveness. According

to Ignatieff, "When people come, by terror, or exaltation, to think of themselves as patriots first, individuals second, they have embarked on a path of ethical abdication."

Ignatieff's book ends with a historian's reasoned observation: The only reliable antidote to ethnic nationalism turns out to be civic nationalism, because the only guarantee that ethnic groups will live side by side in peace is a shared loyalty to a state strong enough, fair enough, equitable enough to command their obedience.

Accompanied by four fascinating films of his "Journeys into the New Nationalism," the book gave me much food for thought about my own nation and its historical and present context.




