Electronics students shine at Teleglobe project

A mutually beneficial project for VCC and Teleglobe Canada leads to the creation of a new bursary for ESL Electronics students

Teleglobe Canada have enjoyed a strong and mutually beneficial relationship. At no time was this more apparent than during a week last April. That's when Electronics instructor Owen Jones and the first class of ESL Combined Skills Electronics Technician students took on the challenge of a major deinstallation project at Teleglobe Canada.

Owen, a former Teleglobe employee, has kept in touch with his old company since joining VCC; in fact, Owen periodically provides training sessions for their new employees. Teleglobe's manager sits on the Electronics Department's program advisory committee, and over the years they have supplied the program with training opportunities and materials.

As the company responsible for coordinating Canada's entire international communications service, Teleglobe has made the transition to a digital system from an analog, as have other telecommunications companies, like BCTel. When Owen was informed of the opportunity for his class to take on the challenge of

"deinstalling" all the old analog equipment, he jumped at the chance. "This was a tremendous opportunity for the class," Owen said. "The analog equipment was more than one third of Teleglobe's operation."

While Teleglobe had no further use for the deinstalled equipment, it was not obsolete. After completion of the project, Owen's group finished with four large construction-type bins full of metal and electronics parts. These were eventually sold at a net profit of \$1,500. This marked the first donation to the bursary fund, which will help students in all Electronics programs. As well, Teleglobe donated test equipment

Education Council Update

At the October 3, 1995 meeting Education Council dealt with the following issues:

Offering exam preparation courses

In August, the Educational Administrators Group (EAG) received a proposal to offer a Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) preparatory course. The issue was referred to Council as it raised policy implications e.g. should VCC mount courses that prepare students to pass tests or meet entry criteria as part of the base budget program profile?

Debate focused on the degree to which such courses a) simply prepare students to pass a test, or b) combine test preparation with developing relevant competencies. After considerable discussion, the following motion was passed:

That VCC provide such examination test or entry criteria preparatory courses that are useful to assist students to access education as well as focusing a considerable amount of the content on the development of competency.

Program revisions - Electronics Technician

The Electronics Technician Telecommunications System Specialty Course proposed the addition of courses in local area networks, fibre optics and job search. Changes are designed to maintain program currency and relevance to the employment market. The program revisions were approved by Council and will be submitted to the College Board at their next meeting for information.

Timing of Elections and Terms of Office for Education Council Members

After we approved the Council's Draft Terms of Reference at the September meeting, it had become apparent that our decision to hold elections in October would be problematic. It was therefore decided that elections be held in January for terms of office from April to March. By-elections for vacant seats will be held in June and October as required. The Chair and Vice Chair of Council will be elected annually at the April meeting.

These changes have now been made to the Draft Terms of Reference and we shall be arranging for copies to be available from department heads, area supervisors, the Executive Office, Student Associations and your Council representatives. Copies will also be available in the campus libraries.

The by-laws will remain a working document until they have been approved by the Ministry. Council decided to delay submitting them to the Ministry until Paul and Hilary have had an opportunity to discuss by-laws at a meeting of College and Institute Education Council Chairs in mid October.

Planning process update

A part of Education Council's mandate is to advise the College Board on policy related to the mission statement and the educational goals, objectives, strategies and priorities of the institution.

By now, you have all received a copy of the planning Green Paper and an outline of the process established for receiving your feedback. If you have not yet had an opportunity to provide input, remember that you can call your Council representative or any other member of Education Council. You can also use the dedicated voicemail box - local 7540. We are counting on you to ensure a fully informed discussion of the Green Paper at the November 7 Council meeting.

VCC Grade Appeal policy

A draft VCC Grade Appeal policy was circulated for Council's review and will be discussed at the November meeting.

Once again, your representatives will be seeking your input to assist our decision making.

Draft policy on course changes:

An ad hoc committee on course/program changes is preparing a draft policy. Once this has been reviewed by EAG and Educational Support areas, it will come forward to Council for discussion and approval. The development of a clear process and policy will ensure a coordinated, effective and efficient approach to implementation course/program changes.

originally worth about \$36,000 as part of the operation, with a sizable portion being equipment for testing digital systems. While the Electronics Department will keep some of this equipment for instruction, they will sell the more specialized items to increase the bursary fund. Fittingly, the bursary is entitled "The First

ESL Electronics Class 1995 Bursary," in honour of the students and instructors on the deinstallation project.


To give an impression of the physically demanding work involved with the project: the 10-foot high equipment bays had to be stripped of all equipment, the

wiring disconnected and the actual bays removed. And this, of course, is all taking place while the station is still fully operational. Consequently, Owen and his crew, which also included Electronics instructor Christine Miller and ESL instructor Christine Stechishin, had to be extremely careful not to cause a system shutdown. Besides emptying and removing the equipment bays, they also had to detach the false floor and extract the old wire that lay under the floor. The wire was massed three

feet deep from years of operations. The entire project took six full days. To say thanks for a job well done, Teleglobe Canada took the entire group out for lunch on the final day.

The work that the class members did on this project will look very impressive on

> their resumes. In fact, before the deinstallation project began, most of the students did not know the English name for the tools they were using. Nevertheless, being in such a hands-on, cooperative situation meant that they were able to grasp language concepts they hadn't yet. And tired as they were,
