## VMREU (CUPE 15) contract ratified

The current VMREU (CUPE local 15) contract has been ratified by VCC Board and the VMREU members. The following information provides some highlights of changes to the agreement.

### Contract length

The contract covers a three year term, from October 1, 1994 to September 30, 1997.

### New items

#### Salary

A salary increase of .23 cents per hour across the board effective October 1, 1994 and October 1, 1995, with a monetary reopener for the third year of the agreement.

#### Benefits

Extended health benefits have been increased from a lifetime maximum of \$500,000 to \$1 million. Bereavement leave for permanent and temporary employees has been increased from three to five days.

#### Layoff

Employees must notify the College at the mid-point of the notice period as to where they will bump. This will shorten the chain of events during the bumping process. Severance pay for laidoff employees with 20 or more years of service has been increased by one month and recall rights have been increased to 24 months.

### Contracting Out

Where contracting out will result in a lay-off, the College will provide a minimum of 90 days notice, with every effort made to provide at least 120 days notice.

### Sick Leave

The collective agreement will now include a statement that the Union does not support the misuse of sick leave.

### Retirement

A statement confirming mandatory retirement by the end of the month in which employees reach age 65 has been included in the college agreement.

### Probationary/Trial Period

The three and six month probationary/trial periods will now be based on duty time.

### Other Changes

The collective agreement has been completely re-written and re-ordered, which will make interpretation and administration of the agreement much easier.

## Bombay Trip (Second of two parts)

In the daylight, I could see so much more: the colourful crowds in the streets; the ancient double-decker buses spewing black smoke onto blacker roads; the occasional elephant filling the intersection with its bulky mass; the "bhajiwallis" (vegetable vendors) walking daily up and down the narrow lanes, large wicker baskets on their heads.

The beggars thrust dirty hands up to the taxi window and children were selling garlands of jasmine by the highway. It was a kaleidoscope of new impressions, some of them fascinating, exotic; others bewildering, even unnerving.

My biggest fear was of getting lost. Bombay roads are not laid out on a grid pattern, like our streets and avenues, but in a rather chaotic series of eccentric circles. To make matters worse, the roads are usually known by one name on the map, and quite a different one in actual usage.

Even if you know the correct name of your street, chances are that your building has no number on it anyway. This, compounded by the fact that the vast majority of bus drivers and taxi wallahs speak no English, and that I speak only enough Hindi to get myself into trouble, made the "simple" task of getting home seem too

daunting, especially in the 37-degree heat. Even my wife was taken aback by how much the city had grown in just five years.

Fortunately we were not alone. It must be difficult to be alone in India; wherever you are, it seems there is someone with you. During the day the door is always wide open. There is a continual coming and going—relatives, friends, servants, vendors. We'll never forget the kindness of the good-hearted friends, neighbours, and relatives who assisted us, taking us shopping, visiting temples with us, showing us the city, sharing fresh green coconuts with us on the beach.

I miss India. It was at times very difficult (I got heatstroke), but I miss it just the same. I miss the differences. I miss the people. I'm sure we'll go back, but we'll go back in the winter!

## Budget Advisory Group holds first meeting

At their first meeting on September 18, 1995 the BUDGET ADVISORY GROUP met to establish their Terms of Reference and to consider their primary role within the budget process. The Group will be acting in an advisory capacity and making recommendations in regards to various issues relating to the budget but will not be acting as a decision-making body.

### Meeting schedule

As the meetings will be public, it was agreed that meeting schedules will be published in the VCC Connections on regular basis. For your information, the next meeting of the Group will be held on **Tuesday, October 3, 1995, in Room 4043 from 3:00 - 4:30 p.m. Please note that the meetings will be taped for temporary reference purposes.** We will publish the meeting schedules to the end of 1995 once they have been established.

Although I have been involved for only a short period, I personally want to recognize Lauchlin McKenzie and Malcolm McIntosh for their high level of commitment, their technical expertise and for representing the interests of Media Services, to Aphrodite Harris, Eva Sherrell and Phyllis Butler for their advocacy and support under difficult situations and to Brenda Appleton who met the separation challenge head on and kept the team on track. I hope Media Services is able to provide a fraction of the support as the Library continues with their separation plans. Congratulations to you all.

Change, innovation, develop, provide access, restructure, streamline, establish, maintain, relocate, commitment to services...services...services, collaborate, cooperate; words that have surfaced in discussions about the new Media Services Department.
