Secondary school counsellors learn about VCC

On March 7 the Counselling Department at City Centre organized an information tour and luncheon for approximately 90 Secondary School counsellors. Our goal in organizing this event was to ensure that school counsellors are aware of the uniqueness of our programs and services and get up-to-date information that they can use in helping their students make good career decisions. This year, representatives from 45 lower mainland schools toured City Centre classrooms, learned about the breadth of programming VCC offers and sat down to a superb lunch hosted by our Hospitality Administration students.

We called upon many of you to help us make this a worthwhile event and we want you to know that your committment and energy paid off. Here are some of the comments we received as written feedback following the tour:

Overall impression:

- * "Highlight was seeing how a GOOD Community College works."
- * "It's by far the best Counselling Conference we're invited to. Informative, friendly staff, classrooms that are open to tours."
- * "All of your staff are very excited about the College and its programs. It's so refreshing to see students in hands-on activities, not just reading books."
- * "I was extremely impressed with the programs. You are filling a niche many other post secondary institutions don't even attempt to fill."

Usefulness of the tour:

- * "Superb tour. Far more invigorating than sitting in a lecture hall. Seeing the programs really helps us talk about them more effectively."
- "Getting first hand information on the multitude of programs offered I would

strongly recommend the students and adults to explore the many avenues you have to offer."

- * "I had no idea of the extent of technical studies available."
- * "I have a large ESL student body. It was wonderful to know that there are many opportunities to seek education and training."
- * "I tend to be too focused on University entrance (come from a West Side school) - now I have information for students who may not go on to University."
- * "I'm excited about telling my students about many of the programs offered. Having seen with my own eyes what goes on here, I am much better informed - and inspired!"

Liaison opportunities and needs:

- * "I will be working towards building a much closer relationship with School District 42."
- * "I'd like to get students to come and see specific programs - especially students at risk of not completing even grade 11 - they need to see your facilities."
- * "What about a video with little talking and mostly students doing their thing such as we saw today. Our students NEED to see this."
- * "Glad to see you've got a High School liaison officer We need her!"
- * "I want to get teachers and parents here, not just students, at various times - I will look into it."

Of course, a main highlight of the day was the outstanding lunch put on by Benny Fernandes, Tom Rogers and their students. Without exception, the visiting counsellors raved about the food, the presentation

Education Council Update - V5N 5T9 February and March 1996

Policy issues:

Education Council has approved the following policies which will go forward to the College Board:

- Policy and Procedures for Students with Disabilities
- VCC Appeal of Final Grade Policy
- VCC International Education Enrolment Policy

Discussions are also occuring about the VCC Policy Making Process guidelines, a draft VCC Policy for Assigning Credits and a draft Student Evaluation Policy. These items will come forward at the April meeting of Council for decision.

Course/program revision form:

The committee working on the form is currently developing a list of major and minor changes for review by Council. Council felt that a clearer designation of what constitutes a major or minor change would be helpful to faculty as they initiate revisions. Laraine Niewinski will be presenting the committee's suggestions at the April meeting.

New programs:

- Pathology Attendant A letter of intent to offer a Pathology Attendant Program has been submitted to the Ministry. The program would be targeted at individuals working in the field who need formal training as pathology attendants. Much of the course material would be offered through distance education. Education Council approved the program in principle and will consider final approval once funding has been received and the proposal has gone through the usual review procedures.
- Summer ESL Program Council received information on a new non-credit ESL program session that will be offered for three weeks in the summer. Courses are open to all applicants, including Internaltional Education students. Classes

will run in both mornings and afternoons and class size is limited to 20 students.

• College Success Curriculum - At the February meeting, Council passed a motion approving the concept of offering College Success curriculum at VCC. Work is now proceeding on curriculum/course/program development.

Program cancellation:

Council approved the deletion of the Business Office Training/ESL program following a review of the factors that had made the program unviable. The College Board will be asked to approve the deletion of this program at their March meeting.

Criteria for program cancellation:

At the March meeting, Council discussed proposed criteria for program cancellation. A motion was subsequently passed to recommend that the VCC Board of Governors approve that the following criteria, in no particular order, be used in identifying programs for cancellation when required:

- a) Mission and Goals
- b) Lack of student demand/waitlists
- c) Lack of employer demand for graduates/job placements
- d) Program offering not current and currency being maintained improbable
- e) VCC ability to support ongoing capital needs of the program difficultf) Full comparison of cost and revenue
- g) Availability of programs elsewhere
- h) Ministry of Education, Skills and Training (or appropriate Ministry) position and advice.

It was suggested that that such criteria could also be used as guiding principles when considering new program proposals. The College will explore this idea.

Course/program revisions:

- Humanities (Correction to prerequisite changes reported in January update) We were in error in our report of changes to the prerequisites for the Humanities program that were presented to Council in January. The correct information follows: Students who do not meet the established requirements or have taken Communications 11 or 12 must take an assessment test and/or see the Department Head for advice.
- Culinary Arts Trades Qualification Theory - Council received information on revisions to this course to maintain currency in the field.

Applied Academics Project:

Dale Dorn provided Council with a brief overview of the Applied Academics Project. Representatives of the ABE Department have been extensively involved in this initiative. Central to the project is the need for applied studies at the secondary level receiving recognition at the post secondary level. Following discussion a motion was passed that VCC recognize for admissions and for meeting of prerequisites applied academic courses.

Suggested revisions to Article 5 of the Human Rights Policy are being considered before being submitted to the College Board for final approval.

Memo to the College community

A memo to the College community is being drafted regarding budget restraint and methods of reducing costs.

The financial aid process at both campuses will be reviewed by an outside consultant as part of the financial system reviews discussed with the Board.

Policy on financial aid eligibility

A draft policy "Identification of Financial Aid Eligibility" was approved by Operations Council. The Policy will be signed by the President and distributed.

Proposal from Safer Campuses Committee

A proposal was made by the Safer Campuses Committee to develop an area at City Centre campus to display pamphlets and posters and present short run videos about safety on campus and human rights. Operations Council approved the proposal in principal, but made suggestions for further consideration by the Safer Campuses Committee.

I.E. Enrolment Policy

The I.E. Enrolment Policy has been passed by Education Council and will be presented to the College Board for approval this month.

Differential fees

A model for differential fees is being considered.

Linking Education to Work

A Special ABE Presentation 9:30 am - 11:00 am, Thursday, April 25, 1996 KEC Auditorium

The document *Employability Skills* published by the Conference Board of Canada has spotlighted the need to link education and work. There is increasing pressure all around us in support of such a link: from the Ministry, from the public and from students concerned with their job prospects.

How can we make education more relevant to the work-place?

Lynda Fownes (B.Ed, M.Ed.), Manager of BC Construction Industry Skills Improvement Council *SkillPlan* will bring adult educators up-to-date with some important studies and sources of information to initiate change.

- Literacy Economy & Society; Results of the First International Adult Literacy Survey - IALS.
- This study examines the relevance of literacy and numeracy to actual adult lives, and seems to be destined to influence decision-makers in years to come.
- Basic Skills Research Project Human Resources Canada.
- In BC, Skill Plan is conducting interviews with workers in hundreds of occupations on how math, reading and writing and other basic skills are applied in the workplace.
- BC Construction Industry Skills Improvement Council, Skill Plan.

Shill Plan is a unique sector-based organization focusing on workforce education. In this setting adult educators make a direct contribution to the

construction industry by integrating their skills with those of trades trainers. *SkillPlan* will be sharing their experiences with ABE instructors.

Lynda Fownes joined the BC Construction Industry Skills Improvement Council in 1992 as Research Director and has designed and managed a wide range of projects involving employers, unions, government and educators. Her lifelong association with the construction industry and experience as a teacher and consultant to the Ministry of Education, Curriculum Development Branch proves to be an eclectic mix that combines knowledge of education systems with a sensitivity to industry. While focusing on practical solutions to basic skills needs, Lynda's work reflects non-traditional, collaborative approaches that contribute to the success of the industry. Lynda is devoted to the philosophy that teaching in the context of workplace is a confidence booster for the worker, a means to a more human and productive workplace and a path to lifelong learning.


