Student achievements shine at Awards Ceremonies

pplause resonated through King Edward Campus' auditorium Friday, November 22, 1996 as the College joined with distinguished donors and the proud families of some of VCC's most exceptional students to congratulate them all on their outstanding academic and personal achievements.

Twice a year in spring and fall ceremonies, nearly 250 scholarships totalling over \$50,000 are awarded to students by the VCC Educational Foundation.

"We owe a lot to the generous support of donors who believe in the value of postsecondary education and training," commented Lilli Milder, President, Educational Foundation. "Their commitment to lifelong learning really does make a difference in the lives of VCC students,"

Students are nominated for scholarships by instructors who recognize in them a determination to succeed, in many cases, against all odds. Following are snapshots of some of the students whose stories were among the most compelling.

Jasmine Lin - Bruce Nicoll Memorial Award

Jasmine Lin received one of several Bruce Nicoll scholarships awarded to students each year. The endowment fund, established by friends and colleagues in memory of Nicoll, Vice-President of Canada Safeway, has helped hundreds of

After immigrating to Canada from Taiwan in 1992, last year, her 10-year-old daughter began bringing her school friends home, and the children would all speak English. Jasmine longed to understand the little girls' giggles so she was motivated

to learn English at VCC through the College's Outreach Program.

"I hope one day to be able to join the children in conversation," said Lin.

Michael Ponech - Lieutenant Governor's Silver Medal and Finning Ltd. Award

Diesel Technician graduate Michael Ponech received two scholarships: The Finning Ltd. Award and the prestigious Governor General's Academic Medal.

The Lieutenant Governor's Silver Medal, first awarded in 1979, is given to a graduate of a post-secondary vocational or career program of less than two years duration who has not only excelled in academic achievement, but has also contributed in a meaningful way to the life of the College or community.

Michael Ponech received this award for his perfect attendance, perfect attitude and almost perfect 3.93 grade point average. His instructors tell us that Ponech set a standard in the classroom by his very commitment to the Diesel Technician program. He gave his studies and his classmates his all.

"Returning to school was a difficult decision to make," said Ponech. "I had been fishing for 13 years and for the last eight I was an engineer on the boat. With the way the fishing industry is now I knew I needed to look to the future."

Ponech also accepted a scholarship from Ron Fletcher of Finning Ltd. in recognition of excellence achieved in the theoretical, practical and behaviourial aspects of the Diesel Technician program.

Zelijko Tomic - Jean Benetti Award

Zelijko Tomic's wide smile dominated his thin face as he humbly but enthusiastically approached the podium to thank his twelve-year-old daughter (he meant son) and the faculty at Vancouver Community College for their support. "I want to thank my teachers for helping me to express myself in more than three words," said Tomic. "I think my teachers learned very soon how much I like to speak English."

After only one year in Canada, Tomic was awarded the Jean Benetti Award (named after one of VCC's first English as a Second Language teachers) for his hard work and dedication in his studies of English.

Just a brief year ago, this 36-year-old ESL student was an assistant professor in the faculty of journalism at Sarajevo's Economic University. He held a degree in computer science and ran his own business, prospering as a systems analyst. His family lived in a comfortable four-bedroom apartment. They had everything.

"Actually I don't like to remember those days because it makes me sad and disappointed," said Tomic.

His spirit speaks for many new immigrants to this country who have left their established lives behind in war-torn homelands to build new lives in a land that is often foreign in culture and language. They come from all over the globe, professionals in their countries: doctors, scientists, lawyers, professors.

A quick glance through VCC's bulging ESL classrooms reveals a microcosm of all that is wrong with the world; a miniature representation of its trouble spots where the ravages of war and economic unrest have forced people from their homes, their families and their countries.

"Suddenly someone came to me and said, 'You must go away. You must find another place to live because you might be killed here.' Canada was the only one hope for me and, especially, for my son. Everything I want now is to forget my past."

Patrick Foley - VCC Faculty Association - Divisional Award

Patrick Foley was awarded a scholarship from VCC's Faculty Association. Based on high achievement or outstanding progress, this award recognizes Foley's effort in the BEST program, an adult special education program designed to help participants upgrade basic skills.

By creating a safe emotional and physical environment, the BEST program teaches people like Foley to trust and work together in a group. For adults with a long history of unemployability this program helps students develop the resources they need to succeed.

Currently studying journalism at Langara College, Patrick made his way to the auditorium podium and told his story.

"For quite a few years I found myself drifting through life," said Foley. "Although I felt there was a place for me somewhere, I couldn't seem to get it together. Finally, I realized I needed some help. So I went to the doc and got referred to a counsellor. That was my first step towards getting back into life.

"The next step was enrolling in the BEST program. What Doug Buck and John Shayler do is take in a bunch of cast offs, has beens, rejects, and hurting people, who in many cases society has rejected, and give them a place to belong. They take them under their wings for awhile and teach them things. They give them lots of care and love. They also build up their selfesteem, teach them to take care of themselves, put them in situations of risk so that they become strong and brave.

"Then eventually, when they feel their charges can cut it they send them out into the world again to take courses and to find careers and jobs that they like. It sounds simple but it's not. It's hard work.

"I guess that's why I'm here today. I was able to take what John and Doug had to offer and build on it. This award is the second award I have won. In high school I won a perfect attendance certificate. But I have to say this one means a lot more."

EEAA meets needs of urban First Nations

Employment and Education Access for Aboriginal People is a new course being offered at City Centre in late January. Designed to meet the growing needs of the urban First Nations community, EEAA takes the students on a journey of personal exploration and awareness. The course provides students with the opportunity to recognize their abilities and strengths, as well as areas requiring improvement.

EEAA offers a combination of personal and cultural awareness for the development of a positive self-image, which is essential for achievement and success in one's educational and career pursuits. These are areas that are not traditionally cultivated as part of the educational process, but which First Nations people deem to be vital aspects of learning.
