In college, high school students mature overnight

Ten grade 12 students from Kitsilano, Vancouver Technical, John Oliver and John Thompson Secondary are learning first-hand what college is all about thanks to a partnership between Vancouver Community College and the Vancouver School Board.

This first-of-its-kind pilot Diesel program, underway at VCC's King Edward Campus, has transformed a typical group of teens into focussed, mature, career-minded individuals - almost overnight.

"The light bulbs go on when these kids grasp the core relationship between math and physics, and actually put theories into practise," says VCC Instructor Steve DeVooght. "Some of these kids could bench press an engine just with their energy!"

The Mechanical Trades Diesel pilot program enables students to acquire work experience credit while building self-esteem and confidence. For five months they are integrated into VCC's regular Diesel program with full-time adult students. They are required to attend college for 2.5 hours twice a week. VCC is uniquely positioned in the technical training arena to expose students to a variety of opportunities in industry while introducing them to the realities of college life.

"It's a win - win situation," says Ray Oksanen, Department Head, Diesel Mechanics. "The college environment has an

enormous effect on how these young people begin to think about their future. After taking this program a few will pursue a diesel career but, even if one decides he never wants to pick up another wrench we've also been successful."

The pilot program was created as a joint partnership between VCC and the Vancouver School Board to introduce high school students to the college learning environment through exposure to diesel mechanics. The five month course runs between November 1995 and April 1996. Ten students are handpicked by counselors and teachers from secondary schools across Vancouver. Entrance is based upon the students' current performance in Mechanics 12.

Highlights of the 1995 Student Outcomes Survey

In the spring of 1995, Statistics Canada, working on behalf of the colleges and institutes and the MSTL, attempted to contact 26,674 students who had completed their studies at institutions nine to twelve months earlier. The response rate was 75% (19,922). Former students are 54% female and 46% male; the median age is 25.

- 83% of students reported that they had attained the objective for which they had enrolled. The main reasons students gave for enrolling were to obtain job skills (57%) and degree attainment (26%).
- 97% found their studies to be worth while.
- 68% rated the quality of teaching as "good" and an additional 28% rated it "adequate."
- Of the 87% of respondents who are in the labour force, 58% are employed in a training-related job (Note: this includes students from academic programs whose studies were not occupationally focused). Seventy-three percent were employed full-time and an additional 17% were employed part-time.
- 40% of respondents have taken further studies since leaving the institution; 22% report that studying is their current main activity.

Education Council Report - January 1996

Issues under discussion

The following policy items are under discussion at Education Council:

- Policies and Procedures for Students with Disabilities
- VCC Grade Appeal Policy
- Policy Making Process

Input has been received and, following revisions, the policies will come forward to the February Council meeting for decision.

The draft College Success Curriculum generated a lot of feedback. The proposal is being reviewed by the authors in the light of suggestions/queries that were received and an update will come back to Council for further discussion.

The committee working on the draft Course /Program Revision Form will be meeting to examine needed changes to the process and the form itself. They will be updating Council on their suggestions at the February meeting.

Education Council bylaws

Council approved some final changes to the Education Council Bylaws. The Bylaws are now ready for submission to the Ministry. The Ministry has established a committee to review Education Council bylaws for compliance with the College and Institute Act and Ministry policy.

New program

Council passed a motion to support the implementation of a Network Support Professional Program. The program allows students to support networks and Microsoft applications that run on the networks. It is targeted toward LAN professionals who lack this training or to people with a computer background who are having difficulty breaking into the field

because of the way it is currently stratified. Paul Hunt (local 8308) would be pleased to hear from you if you would like further details about this new offering.

Program/course revisions

Changes to curriculum or prerequisites were approved for the following programs/courses:

Denturist Program - curriculum revision that includes division of the program into 16 week semesters, changes in some course names and the inclusion of competencies that will allow the program to become accredited.

Humanities - prerequisite change. Applicants will now need Grade 12 English rather than Communications 11/12.

Mathematics - prerequisite change. Applicants will be required to have Math at the Grade 8 level rather than Math 9.

Science - prerequisite change. Applicants will be accepted into Chemistry and Physics as long as they have successfully completed Advanced ESL or English 059.

Dental Assisting - prerequisite changes. Applicants will have to complete a Criminal Record Search prior to entry into the program and will require documentation of 20 hours of recent observation in a dental office after formal application to the program has been made. With regard to the established requirements of Grade 12 and Biology at the Grade 11 level, a recommendation will be added that applicants take a Human Biology course.

Dental Reception - prerequisite changes. Applicants will have to complete a Criminal Record Search prior to entry and must show documentation of 20 hours of recent

observation in a dental office after formal application to the program.

Information received on course program changes

Council received information about changes to the names of two programs:

The Secretary Program is now called the Administrative Office Assistant Program.

The Pharmacy Technician Assistant Program is now called the Pharmacy Technician Program.

Presentation to Council

Wayne Avery provided Council with an overview of the work he has been doing on the Institution Based Training Initiative. The initiative is funded through the Ministry to examine ways in which Colleges can assist Income Assistance recipients to access post secondary education and make a successful transition to employment or further education. Interviews have been conducted with internal and external sources to determine factors that will be included in the developmental plan which Linda Martin, Vice President Educational Support Services, forwarded to the Ministry. If the plan is approved, funding is guaranteed up to a limit of \$200,000 per institution. Wayne noted the invaluable support he has received from the internal steering committee (Lynn Lennig, Learning Centre, Barbara Little, College and Career Access, Diane Westwood, Practical Nursing, Joan McArthur-Blair, Program Development, and Jackie Sandy, Dean of Student Services) and the willingness of faculty, staff and students across the College to make time to meet with him.

A word on Connections' advertising procedure

"Why didn't my ad get into Connections?"

Although this is not a common refrain, it is a question that we get asked from time to time. Even in a small internal publication like Connections, the same rule applies as anywhere else: not all advertising is created equal. Here are a few guidelines to use when placing an ad in the VCC Connections classifieds section.

As you probably know, we don't accept paid advertising in Connections. As a rule of thumb, our free advertising space is for the use of staff and faculty who want to advertise for sale items, lost and found, job postings and items wanted. That's where the "Connection" comes in... we try to connect people with people.

While we do our best to accommodate everyone who provides us with an advertisement for a service or item, we have to say no to those advertisements which promote the products or services of a small business or are submitted by individuals who are not part of the VCC community.

For instance, if you, as an individual VCC staff member, want to sell your car, you can advertise the item in Connections. However, if you or someone you know wants to advertise a small business, we can't accept it. Again, we have to limit it to those advertisements which (1) are submitted on behalf of an individual VCC member, and (2) are not for a business.

The need to make the Classifieds section available to all readers is important, as well. Therefore, from now on, advertisements will run for one time only, to give everyone an opportunity to use the section.

If we have a question about your advertisement, or if we can't accept it, we will

do our best to contact you and explain why. That's why it's important that you provide your name and local when submitted your ad. By the same token, if you are unsure whether your ad is appropriate, call Dale Rasmussen at (871)7152.

By considering these guidelines before submitting your ad, you'll help make the process simple and problem-free.

David Tickner has been invited by the Colombo Plan Staff College in the Philippines to present a two week workshop on curriculum development.
