# Sharing and learning in Malaysia

VCC instructor Alice Wong lends her expertise to Malaysian women hoping to become entrepreneurs

(One of VCC's great strengths is its ability to send highly qualified instructors to other countries to share our expertise with those eager to learn. Alice Wong, instructor in the ESL-English Language Skills Department, met with me recently to look back on two fascinating trips she took to Malaysia in 1995 (her fourth trip in the last five years); trips that she felt were as valuable to her as learning experiences as they were to the people she met during her visits.-Editor.)

n the early 1990s a group of Malaysian women visited different Canadian colleges to learn about training programs offered for potential and existing women entrepreneurs. VCC was one of the colleges that did a presentation to this group of delegates. Finally, after a few years of contact and negotiation, VCC signed

an agreement with the recently developed Women's Institute of Management in Malaysia to do a serious of sessions in entrepreneurship training. The purpose of the Women's Institute of Management is to help women through training in career exploration and entrepreneurship. VCC (International Education) is part of a consortium of Canadian colleges offering this training in Malaysia, along with the University College of the Cariboo and Ontario's Sheridan College. The colleges take turns sending a representative to Malaysia to train women to start their own

small business and "train their trainers." The Women's Institute invited VCC to put on two seminars in 1995, and Alice Wong was chosen to present them.

One very special part of Alice's first trip (to Kuala Lumpur) was the seminar that she put on specifically for single parents wanting to start

their own business. As this was the first time that Alice had put on a seminar for single parents, she had to do her homework before leaving for Malaysia. She researched and used material developed for training women entrepreneurs here in B.C. Perhaps surprisingly, Malaysia is home to a large number of single parent women; they have even formed their own association. Some are single parents because of divorce, while others are widows. Alice attributes this surprisingly high number to changes in the social makeup (see Malaysia on page 2)

which are taking place all over Asia, in cluding Malaysia.

While Malaysia is still classified as a "developing country," it enjoys an economic boom that is the envy of many other countries-so much so that the label of "developing" will soon be a thing of the past. In particular, English skills are in high demand. Before Malaysia gained its independence from Great Britain, English was the official language spoken. After independence, however, Malay replaced English as the first language. Now, with Malaysia taking an actively international stance, English is once again an "unofficial first language." Because of the country's economic strength, there is a shortage of skilled workers, and women are encouraged to leave their homes and join the workforce. For a single mother, this is not necessarily the best solution, which is why many women are looking to own businesses of their own for financial independence.

The special workshop for single parents was not just to give participants the skills for entrepreneurship but also to build selfesteem and confidence through a holistic approach. Alice was happy to notice a profound and positive change in these women, from the time the workshop started to the time it ended. Women who seemed timid and barely willing speak to each other at the beginning became outgoing and energetic as the workshop progressed. Alice found this to be a very moving experience, and explained that "...it was such a joyful moment at the end—they all felt that they were ready for more. It's amazing to find so many hidden talents in these women—and I learned a lot from them, too. Too often when we Canadians visit developing countries, we take on the attitude that we are there to help, when in fact we would do better to realize that we are there to share our experiences with each other."

Eventually countries like Malaysia will need to do their own training in the areas of entrepreneur development. Alice was gratified to see that among her workshop participants a number of women stood out as having training potential.

Alice's trip to Kuala Lumpur was such a resounding success that she was invited to return to put on workshops in Penang, another large Malaysian city. In her previous trip to Malaysia, she led workshops for 50 women. In Penang, the turnout increased to 90 participants, in two groups. Alice gave the first seminar in Mandarin, as 75% of Penang is made up of Chinese speakers. The second seminar was in English, the official language of finance and commerce. Alice was encouraged to learn that the English session was financed by local banks, which she took as a sign that the Institute and the women involved are achieving a growing sense of independence and an ability to form partnerships with business.

Like the Kuala Lumpur group, the Penang participants were housewives, nurses and women from all works of life. And, like the previous seminar groups, started out the workshops very timid, but ended the sessions very open and vocal. In fact, they loved the program so much that they wanted to form an alumni club on the spot.

Not only were these trips was rewarding learning experiences for Alice and the workshops' participants, other important benefits came out of the visits. VCC was recognized officially by the Minister of Entrepreneur Development of Malaysia, who officiated at the opening of the seminars. This Ministry is one of Malaysia's highest profile departments.

Most would acknowledge that the existence of the Women's Institute of Management and the entrepreneurship training seminars are a progressive idea in any country. Alice agreed, and stated how pleased she was to find that the status of women is important in Malaysia: "A lot of times we think that for religious or cultural reasons Malaysian women are not recognized. I was so happy to find that people are paying a lot of attention to

women's issues. Also, the women leaders are very strong." As well, Alice notes that "with its booming economy, Malaysia has a lot of potential, and not just for women. but for other countries, such as Canada."


Carrying on this valuable and mutual learning experience is important to Alice, who continues to work in sharing her expertise with women who want to learn about career development and entrepreneurship. She currently volunteers her expertise to the newly formed "Women's Enterprise Society of B.C." Alice notes that "...women all over the world are recognizing that we face the same challenges. Yet, women's success rate at running a small business is often higher than that of men. What women need are training, exposure and encouragement." With Alice Wong's help, they've taken that first important step.



VCC has a group membership at Surges Dunsmuir, the BC Hydro fitness centre on the second floor of 333 Dunsmuir. The group renews every six months, at the end of January and July.

Surges Dunsmuir is a well-equipped coed facility with an aerobics floor, free weights area, weight machines, treadmill, exercise cycles and stair machines, a great view and a large outdoor plaza. Fitness classes are offered weekdays at lunch and after work.



# A follow up to the Ian. 10 KEC fire drill

Here are a few reminders for the next time the fire bells ring:
