...a look at some of the issues VCC has been facing over the last few years

(I recently had a chance to chat with VCC President John Cruickshank about some of the ongoing events and challenges that have taken place at VCC over the last few years. These issues had at one time been at the forefront of everybody's minds. While they may not generally be discussed as often as they used to be, I thought it would be interesting for everyone to hear how far we have come since we last talked about them. -Ed.)

Debt and Deficit

In a nutshell, our debt is well on its way to being repaid. The Ministry of Education, Skills and Training has an arrangement with the college whereby each year for four years the college pays \$250,000 towards its debt, with this amount matched by the Ministry. At the end of the four-year period, the debt will be paid off completely. "This was an arrangement that was too good for the college to pass up," said Cruickshank. "The \$250,000 per year should not be too difficult an amount to secure, within our \$63 million budget. This means that the debt is no longer a continuing threat to us."

In 1992 the spectre of the \$9 million deficit caused concern and stress to everyone at VCC. The days of VCC operating under a continuing deficit are in the past. This is due in part to the fact that the college is now much more attuned to the way in which we count our FTEs and submit for our revenues. "Under the leadership of Mary Hoekstra, Dale Dorn and Linda Martin, we have moved to a very stable financial picture, and some people even hold us up as an example of how to manage the finances of a college," said John.

Langara separation

Although separation from Langara is almost complete, one crucial area -Continuing Education — remains to be split between the two colleges. January 1, 1997 has been talked about as a possible date of complete separation for CE, but that date is still being negotiated among the affected parties, not the least of whom are the CE staff themselves. However, Information and Computing Services and Media Services are completely separate now, with the Library not far behind. Regarding the latter, John explained that "VCC's Library is almost at a point where it's an independent entity. This, and the fact that Media Services is now completely separate, is greatly due to Brenda Appleton

KEC Mailboxes: changes ahead

As announced recently in Connections, the mailbox arrangement at KEC is about to be changed to a departmental organization.

We solicited input and many people found no reason for concern, thinking that, in fact, it would be a more sensible arrangement. However, some people did express concerns. After listening and analyzing those concerns, Operations Council has recommended that we proceed with the proposed changes.

The concerns fall mainly into the two categories listed below, along with our responses:

a) My mail is private and I don't want it easily read by others.

No one will open mail. Private mail remains private. If you expect faxes which are confidential, let us know and we will place them in an interoffice envelope before delivery to your departmental box. Please bear in mind that right now anyone can look at faxes sitting in the fax machine or in your open mailbox.

b) This will mean more work for our Programme Assistants.

Anyone from your department who comes to the 4th floor can pick up the mail for your department. It doesn't have to fall to one designated person. If sorting is onerous, the individuals who are finding the task burdensome should contact me and I will help find a way to ease the problem. Please bear in mind that large volumes of mail are currently received by departments such as Library, Continuing Education, Payroll and Accounting. These departments do their own sorting and do not find it to be a problem.

The organization will follow the alphabetical departmental listing exactly as shown in the phone directory. The bottom cupboards will be used for external deliveries such as Daycare, KEC West, etc. and for exceptionally high volume users such as Bookstore and Library. All shelves will be labelled clearly. For larger departments, department heads will have an individual shelf at the top of their departmental slot. Everyone's mailbox location will probably change.

Please be patient. We are making this change to try and improve overall College efficiency and cut unnecessary paper use. After the change over is complete on June 21, 1996 and we've all had a little time to adjust, I will be happy to receive feedback and work out problems that are of continuing concern.

The retirement dinner was our way of thanking Bob for his enormous contribution to the College. 70 people attended to pay tribute to this special man, including

former Board members, Bob's family, College employees and students, Mike Harcourt and many other admirers. Dr. Tom Perry, who was unable to attend because of his wife's illness, sent greetings with his former Assistant, Barbara Clague.

During the course of the evening, which was interspersed with laudatory speeches, Bob was treated to a bedtime skit, an adaptation by several Board members of the Dr. Seuss book "Oh, the Places You'll Go." The evening ended on a perfect note with a ceremonial presentation of an eagle feather by Elder Bob George of the

Tuesday, May 14, 1996

Parking Rates at KEC

A proposal to increase daily parking rates at the King Edward Campus lots has been approved. Monthly parking passes will be available at 70% of the daily rate for a month. (Details published in May 30 edition of Connections).

VCC's World Wide Web Site

VCC is in the process of establishing a WWW site. Initially, only currently-published material such as calendars will be presented on the Web. Decisions are still to be made regarding content, policy, format and whether or not to implement an interactive version.

Safer Campuses Standing Committee

This information is listed in the VCC Telephone Directory (issue date 8 February 1996) inside cover and under Quick Reference.

VCC Librarian is Regional Reviewer

Governments are producers of massive quantities of published information. These documents are made accessible by selected libraries across the country through strictly administered depository programs. The VCC Libraries are a depository for B.C. provincial government information and a selective depository for federal publications.

As the Government Documents Librarian for the VCC Libraries, Virginia Adams assesses and selects materials from the masses of government information to make accessible to the College community. In addition to this role, Virginia represents the province of British Columbia as a regional editor for the Journal of Government Information. This is a scholarly publication which publishes professional articles on a wide range of issues related to the production, promotion, documentation and access of government information. The journal's content is not limited only to Canadian information but includes government information from other countries as well as international organizations.

Virginia Adams has been the British Columbia regional representative for the past two years. Prior to this she was the representative for Quebec while working as a Government Documents Librarian at McGill University Library. Her role is to select and prepare ten professional reviews of B.C. government publications for the November/December issue of the Journal of Government Information. Virginia selects publications for review based on their

significance and widespread appeal to the year being reviewed.

It is quite an honor for our institution to be represented at this level. Good work Virginia!




