Premier Clark guarantees access to post-secondary education

remier Glen Clark has guaranteed spaces for all qualified students hoping to enter one of B.C.'s colleges, universities or post-secondary institutions in the coming academic year.

At a press conference on Tuesday, March 19, Clark committed \$16.5 million in new funding for student spaces which, when combined with efficiencies in the post-secondary system, will allow 7,000 more B.C. students access to education in 1996/97. Clark said this compares to an average increase of 4,400 spaces annually over the past four years.

The premier, who is also the minister responsible for youth, said his government is guaranteeing affordable, accessible education and on-the-job skills training while Ottawa and other provinces are cutting funds for education, health care and social programs.

"Youth in this province have made it clear to me that they expect the B.C. government to protect education, despite federal budget cuts of \$435 million in social transfer payments to our province," Clark said. "Last week I hosted a forum with young people from across the province who told me they want education to be affordable and accessible, and they don't want just talk—they expect real action."

Clark has been busy recently making announcements about access to education and employment. On March 15 Clark announced the new initative, Investing in BC-A Guarantee for Youth, aimed at delivering new jobs and a series of employment and skills training programs through a combination of public, private sector and community resources. This comprehensive youth employment and training initiative allocates \$20 million in provincial funding and a challenge to private sector and Crown corporations to help create up to 11,500 jobs for B.C. young people this year. Leading the initiative is a commitment to double funding for Student Summer Works '96, a wagesharing program with employers. This increase will bring the funding for this program up to \$6.2 million.

On Monday, March 18, the Premier delivered the news of a province-wide tuition freeze for 1996/97 to students at Langara College and via the Knowledge Network to students and faculty around the province.

Behind the scenes: Clark visits VCC

John Cruickshank welcomes **Premier Glen Clark**

Classroom 3202 at KEC met with Andy Warhol's "15 minutes of fame" Friday when Premier Glen Clark arrived on campus to film the first of his 'good news announcements' about the provincial government's freeze on tuition fees. Knowledge Network aired the announcement as a simulcast to the news conference at Langara College to ensure students and faculty province-wide would have an opportunity to hear the Premier's announcement. The announcement was broadcast in the cafeterias on both campuses at 12:30 pm Monday, March 18.

Although VCC was chosen as a location for the production, Clark's arrival on campus was kept quiet so the production could be filmed without interruption. In these situations, College Advancement is relied upon to liaise externally with location scouts, production crews and government officials as well as internally with build-

Being able to read and write have given me new freedom and confidence. My goal now is to complete Grade 12.

Many Vancouver Community College students, faculty and staff know the name Mr. William K. McMenamon. The Educational Foundation has upheld William McMenamon as a long-time VCC supporter, and it was with great sadness that Lilli Milder, Educational Foundation President, informed the College of his passing.

According to Milder, in 1990, McMenamon and an associate, former Foundation Director Mrs. Doris Richardson, first created the Richardson/ McMenamon Memorial Fund to benefit VCC students. Since then, five students have received this Memorial Scholarship while countless others have been assisted through bursary funds.

"Mr. McMenamon has encouraged many individuals to pursue their educational dreams," says Jane Westheuser, Associate Director, VCC Educational Foundation. "He will be remembered each time a Richardson/McMenamon Memorial Scholarship is awarded."


Well, after 10 years I've finally divorced, so I am reclaiming my birth name DROSSIS.

What is news?

Many an assignment editor has been known to answer that question with, "News is what I say it is." If a story is covered at all, how it is treated and where it runs in the newscast or newspaper are all very subjective decisions. Most make those decisions on instinct.

TV News works on the basis of elimination rather than inclusion. There are always far more stories than there is time to tell them. Newspapers have their news needs determined by the advertising department. The amount of editorial content depends on the number of ads; about 40 per cent of the paper is made up of news or features.

Reporters always look for certain qualities in a news story: humanity, conflict, immediacy, locality, celebrity and novelty.

conflict. When there are two obvious sides in conflict, the media see a story, particularly if the stakes are high.

Immediacy. Almost every TV newscast these days includes an on-the-scene report which helps heighten the sense of immediacy, even if it's just for the weather forecast.

Locality. A national newscast will relate world events to Canada, a local newscast will localize international and national events or look for a local expert to comment.

Celebrity. OJ Simpson. Need I say more?

Novelty. Sometimes these offbeat stories are called kickers in TV news but novelty also refers to anything new and different.

Does your voice mail message give potential callers the information they need? Is the message up to date? Is your response timely? Do you log your calls and your responses?

All of us have encountered frustration from this technology not being used to its full potential but, usually, we can lessen the frustration we inflict on others if the answers to the above questions are positive. Before you record your voice mail message put yourself in the shoes of potential callers, both internal and external, and tailor your message to them.

Identify the person and department the caller has reached.

Clarify whether you will be back shortly or whether you are away for an extended period of time. Your callers will appreciate knowing when they can expect to hear from you. If more than one person returns department calls perhaps a telephone log would help keep everyone up to date about how each call is handled.
