Instructors of BC to hold PD workshop at City Centre October 25

SVI, the Society of Vocational Instructors of BC, is a group committed to promoting professional development opportunities for vocational instructors while being involved in maintaining and improving the standards of vocational education. The Society helps vocational instructors to be heard and recognized, not only within the Ministry of Education, Skills and Training, but also within each educational institution.

SVI will present a Professional Development Workshop on October 25 at City Centre Campus, in the Theatre, Room 240, from 9:00 am to 4:00 pm. This workshop would be of interest to instructors teaching in both career and career prep programs.

Session I - 10:15 to 12:00 noon: Charting A New Course

Charting a New Course is a three-part document that the ministry has developed as a strategic plan for the continuation of a vital college, institute, and agency system in B.C. Facilitators: Duncan MacRae and Shell Harvey, Ministry of Education, Skills, and Training. Content: MacRae and Harvey will explain the strategic plan's

focus and discuss the impact the plan will have on vocational education. This document is being presented to Educational Planning Committees throughout the province.

Session 2 - 1:00 to 2:24 pm: Apprenticeship System and Charting A New Course

Facilitators: Dale Oleschko and Guy Huntinton. Content: The main focus of this workshop will be to inform participants what Skills Canada (BC branch) is all about and how their college can become involved.

ELS instructor Sue Atherton learns firsthand the value of Help Phone

Sue Atherton, an instructor in the English Language Skills Department, knows firsthand the value of a quick response in an emergency situation, thanks to the newly installed Help Phones.

About two weeks ago, Sue noticed that one of her students appeared to be very ill during class and showed signs of experiencing a serious medical problem. "I had never seen a person look as ill as this student did. She was lying on the floor, screaming and writhing in pain and her eyes were rolled up in her head," said Sue.

After making sure that the other students could keep an eye on the ill student, Sue immediately went to look for help. Although her classroom (2084) is located in a fairly isolated part of KEC campus, Sue happened on the nearby Help Phone, which put her in immediate contact with the campus security office. Dan Singh, KEC Campus Security Site Supervisor, responded quickly and was able to bring a medical doctor to deal with the situation. The student recovered, and was back at college the following day.

Sue (and her student) were very impressed with the Help Phones and the quick response that Dan Singh provided. "Without the new Help Phone, the response to the situation would have taken much longer, and the end result could have been much different," she said.

Marketing Advisory Committee and related activities: an update

The following is a summary of items from the most recent meeting of the Marketing Advisory Committee, held on September 24, 1996.

Poster Calendar

The 1996/97 Poster Calendar, a glossy handout of programs-at-a-glance, will be available for mailings and handouts by approximately October 21. Copies will be sent to over 1600 contacts at schools, colleges and universities, libraries, Human Resources Centres, and others. The balance will be available as general information handouts for all departments. Counselling Departments at both campuses will have a supply on hand for general use.

Next Mini-Calendar

The Fall and Winter 1996/97 Mini-Calendar will be available by the end of October. A distribution of approximately 285,000 will take place November 13 and 14 in various community papers in the lower mainland. 25,000 will be distributed

and restocked to libraries, community centres, convenience stores and supermarkets over a period of four weeks starting mid-November. The balance of 10,000 will be available as general handouts.

College Calendar

A production schedule for the full-size 1997 College Calendar has been worked out, with a planned release date of February 13. The copy will reflect program changes approved up to and including the September 1996 Education Council meeting.

CC public services

A new, revised brochure reflecting the public services available at City Centre is currently being produced.

Signage

The Committee discussed a new signage concept from design management firm

Gallop/Varley to replace the CC exterior signage on Cambie Street.

Marketing Plan

A draft of the long-term Marketing Plan will be discussed at the next Committee meeting, to be held on November 26, 1996.

The Marketing Advisory Committee provides advice and suggestions to the Executive Director, College Advancement as to the marketing needs of the College and how they can best be met. This is accomplished by meeting as a group to bring forward ideas and suggestions, analyze information, brainstorm and discuss issues. Staff or faculty members are invited to serve on the committee. Contest solicits innovative environmental solutions from students

To help develop solutions to growing environmental problems, the Canadian Intellectual Property Office (CIPO) with the tri-university PATSCAN service announced the CIPO Environmental Innovation Contest. CIPO has donated \$4,000 to be awarded in prizes to deserving BC and Yukon post-secondary students who develop innovative solutions to environmental challenges.

Students entering the contest are invited to research patents to review the novelty of their innovations.

The competition creates two categories of entry for BC post-secondary students:

graduate students and undergraduate or college students. First, second and third prizes of \$1000, \$600 and \$400 respectively will be awarded in each category.

As an added prize, the Molson Companies Donations Fund has donated \$500 to the competition, which will be awarded to the student proposing the best recyclying concept.

To be eligible, the innovation must be of immediate application in the clean-up, protection or conversation of the environment. Each must be submitted through PATSCAN and receive a positive rating, indicating a novel, workable, commer-

cially viable device or process. Entries will be accepted until February 29, 1997.

Contest application forms with listings of previous prize-winning applications are available from the PATSCAN office. Entries can also be made in the form of typed notes of four or more pages resulting from research or studies in progress, whether private work or the result of a course or thesis. All entries must state clearly the entrant's name, institution, degree level, address, phone number and SIN number.
