### Canada wins gold in Berlin

Sunday, September 8, the Canadian National Team competed in the Restaurant of Nations against six other countries to win the Gold Medal in Hot Food Competition at the World Culinary Olympics. This was the very first Gold Medal to be won at the new Berlin Locale and the only Gold Medal to be won on that first day of competition. VCC Culinary Arts program instructor James Hutton was the Assistant Manager of the Canadian team.

The supreme disadvantage of having to compete in this part of the Olympic Competition on the very first day added a further challenge to this very talented team of chefs. Arriving in Berlin on Thursday evening, the team had been working in the kitchens of the Intercontinental Hotel in Berlin in order to prepare for this event. The next challenge which the team faced was to be ready for the Cold Food Competition on Tuesday morning, September 10.

After the Awards Ceremony, the team returned to their hotel, rested briefly and returned to work until their showplates were completed.

### "So, what is David Tickner doing in Bangladesh, anyway?!"

He's responsible for training 60 people as volunteer or part-time teachers.

These teachers will organize and conduct courses, workshops, and other training activities in areas such as community and village development, literacy, agriculture and rural development, women's education and development, adult basic education, youth development, rural children's education, entrepreneurial skills for very small businesses, public health and sanitation, and other areas.

His work involves identifying training needs, developing programs and training materials, training teachers, establishing teacher support networks, and most importantly, ensuring that such activity continues once the project is over.

He's working with the Directorate on Nonformal Education; that is, education and training not part of the regular school and college system. He's part of a seven-person team (five Bangladeshis, one Filipino, and one Canadian) and will travel regularly around the country. Bangladesh is half the size of BC and has a population of 120 million people.

David is on leave from VCC for a year and a half, from September 1996 to March 1998. The project is managed by the Association of Canadian Community Colleges and funded by the Asian Development Bank.

David Tickner is with Program Development and Staff Training Department, located in room 2076 at the KEC campus. The department offers the Provincial Instructor Diploma Program, the Diploma in Adult Education Program, and the University of Alberta - Bachelor of Education Program.

### Internal communications: a key to campus safety

### **Help Phones**

A system of help phones are being installed throughout the King Edward and City Centre Campuses. Each help phone is clearly identified by a yellow "Help!" sign and a location identifier. All help phones call the campus security office (KEC or CC) then automatically transfer to the security cellular if there is no answer after two rings.

There are three types of help phones:

- 1. Enhanced pay phones, that connect with security when the "security button" is pushed.
- 2. "Taxi" style wall phones that connect with security when the receiver is lifted.
- 3. Parking lot call boxes that connect directly to the security cell phone when the red button is pushed (KEC economy and preferred lots only).

The help phones are for the use of employees, students and visitors who require security assistance. Examples of calls include: reporting safety hazards, reporting suspicious persons, requesting a safe walk, requesting a door to be opened, requesting first aid (for victims unable to walk to health services), reports of vandalism, harassment, etc. If you <u>can</u> access an internal phone, please call security, using their regular phone local.

#### 911

If the situation is of an EMERGENCY, life threatening nature, immediately dial 911 from any pay phone or 9-911 from an internal line.

#### 4444

Local 4444 is an extension of the help phone system. When 4444 is dialled from an internal phone the call goes to the campus security office (KEC or CC) then automatically transfers to the security cellular if there is no answer after two rings. Local 4444 is **no longer** an emergency line. As stated above, if the situation is of

an emergency nature, immediately dial 911 for police, fire or ambulance response.

A number of posters and handouts have been distributed over the years to direct people on emergency communication and response. These include information about 4444 as well as numbers to call for first aid assistance. To ensure a consistent response, please ensure all employees and students are familiar with the new help phone system and remove all outdated posters and handouts.

Please take a moment to familiarize yourself with the location and operation of the help phones in your area.

## The Electronic Library Network at VCC Libraries

Many different databases and research tools are available to VCC faculty and staff from our computer catalogue "Gateway" through the efforts of the Electronic Library Network (ELN). ELN is a provincially funded organization that creates, develops and licences databases and other resources by working with most BC post-secondary institutions. They represent the state-of-the-art in Canadian system-wide library networking, collection acquisition, access and leveraging

Choosing the "Gateway" option on the library catalogue menu takes you outside of VCC Libraries to a variety of wonderful information sources that once were available in only the richest library collections at the largest institutions. You can browse the collections of UBC, SFU, UVic, College Libraries and Vancouver Public Libraries. You can perform searches on many "restricted" databases. You can view many complete magazine and newspaper articles or arrange to receive photocopies.

Here are some of the offerings that can be found through the Gateway:

#### CARL UnCover

When you connect to CARL UnCover, you may search the contents of 17,000 journals. You may place orders for the full articles at a cost of \$8.50 US plus copyright fee. Orders will be delivered by fax within 24 hours. You may also register with UnCover Reveal to receive by e-mail the table of contents of up to 50 journals or up to 25 different search topics. Because of our membership in the ELN, all services except article delivery are free to VCC staff and students.

#### **OJAC: Online Journal Access**

OJAC is a local area document delivery system. Sitting at a VCC Library terminal or your home/office computer, with your VCC Library card at hand, you can connect via the Gateway to SFU. Once there, you can search periodical indexes for articles on your topic, complete an onscreen request form

for up to three articles per topic which you need and transmit this request to the holding library of your choice. (Note: In the CBCA: Canadian Business and Current Affairs database, "online" full-text articles can be printed by you immediately.)

Interlibrary Loan staff will notify you when the article arrives for pickup at your Campus Library, normally in four to five working days.

These services are provided free of charge to VCC Staff and Students, by VCC Libraries and the Electronic Library Network. OJAC user's guides are available at your Campus Library.

### Future workshop at Justice Institute

Voices from Each Generation: Healing the Effects of Generational Trauma (#ep600)

(Co-sponsored with the Native Education Center and S.P.A.N.)

Many non-Aboriginal practitioners providing counselling and support servces are working with First Nations survivors of generational trauma. Increasingly, these practitioners are recognizing that they require an understanding of the history of First Nations people and the impact that this history has had on present day life, on reserve and in urban settings. Without this awareness and cultural sensitivity, practitioners are not able to respond effectively to First Nations survivors within their counselling and support mandates.

The conference will provide critical opportunities to explore culturally relevant approaches to prevention and healing from the effects of generational trauma, and to build bridges between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal service prodiders, agencies, and communities.

This conference is directed toward Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal service providers, administratiors, and policy-makers involved in service provision to First Nations communities.

## An overview of B.C. Benefits and Institution Based Training (IBT) programs at VCC

BC Benefits is the umbrella for British Columbia's social assistance programs including Family Bonus, Healthy Kids, Access to Independence, Youth Works and Welfare to Work. Youth Works and Welfare to Work are the two programs in which VCC is involved.

Youth Works (19 - 24 years) is intended to assist young people in moving from income assistance to work. Youth Works began in January, 1996 and has three phases:

- independent job search (seven months; <u>first</u> group: January-July)
- assisted job search programs (two months; August-September)
- basic education, job readiness community employment training, workplace training or post-secondary training (from month 10; October 1996-TBA). Basic Education includes ESL, ABE, Literacy, Employment Preparation.

In July, 1996, legislation was passed which makes participation in job search programs mandatory for Youth Works clients if they wish to maintain their income assistance. Access to training has been guaranteed to the Youth Works group.

Welfare to Work is a program for income assistance clients 25 years and over. Welfare to Work parallels Youth Works; however, the compliance legislation does not apply to people 25 years and over, and training access is not guaranteed, but subject to availability.

VCC has submitted proposals for Assisted Job Search and Job Readiness programs to the Skills Development Division, Ministry of Education, Skills and Training (MOEST).

### **Assisted Job Search Program**

- scheduled August start delayed until October, 1996
- four components:
- information sessions (3 hours/ session)
- Starting Points (8 hours/course)
- Job Club (3 weeks/course)
- Job Search (1 week/course)
- Counsellors are being hired to deliver the program

#### Job Readiness Program

- tentative start date, October, 1996. No response yet to proposal.
- · four components:
  - Career Planning (four week course)
- Basic Employment Orientation (BEOT, 12 week course)
- Specific Sector Employment Orientation Training (12 week course; BEOT plus exploration of a specific job sector)
- Specific Occupational Skills Training (16 week course; BEOT plus specific skills training)
- · facilities and staff will be needed.

### Institution Based Training (IBT)

IBT began under the government's SKILLS NOW Welfare to Work program. This program was intended to assist income assistance recipients in accessing and completing programs leading to employability. Various institutions have been involved in piloting student support projects and programs, and in developing monitoring systems for these activities.

BC Benefits maintains funding for the IBT Student Support Services and includes new funding for IBT Expanded Capacity. The major difference between Skills Now Welfare to Work and BC Benefits is the mandatory participation legislation for 19-24 year olds. IBT is funded through the Post Secondary Division, MOEST.

### **IBT Student Support Services**

At the present time, VCC provides access and support services to people on income assistance as a part of the IBT initiative. The program has a presence on both main campuses.

Services include:

- · Tours of CC and KEC campuses
- Educational planning
- Assistance with accessing career and/ or personal counselling
- Referrals to and liaison with community services
- Assisting with the application process
- Assisting with accessing financial aid programs and services
- Coordination and provision of services to students
- Assistance with transition to employment

Wayne Avery is the IBT Coordinator. Wayne can be found in the Counselling Department at City Centre on Tuesdays and Thursdays. On Mondays and Wednesdays, Wayne can be found on the 4th floor Administration offices at King Edward.

### **IBT Expanded Capacity**

The funding in IBT Expanded Capacity is like base-funded FTE's: it will be used to deliver more instruction in existing and/ or new programs. Instructional support is also part of this funding, as it is in base funding. A VCC PLAN for the funding was submitted to the Ministry on July 30, 1996. VCC will receive the first part of its funds in September, 1996. The PLAN is available from Department Heads or Associate Deans.

A letter from the Ministry says:

"Criteria established when this funding was approved include the following:

 preference will be given to integrated ("mainstream") programming  basic education will be focused, employment/skill training oriented, continuous entry programs

 70% of basic education students will move on to post-secondary training or employment within one year

- post-secondary training will be linked to the labour market and will represent programs of one year or less duration (although the first year of a two-year program would also qualify)
- post-secondary programs will ladder to further education/training wherever possible"

In early July, Deans, Associate Deans, Department Heads and Coordinators were asked for their ideas about expanded programs. An outpouring of proposals followed and these were incorporated into the PLAN. The response was very much appreciated and the Ministry welcomed our ideas.

At a late July meeting, it was decided that our fall programs (October start proposed) will focus on "basic education," eg. ESL, ABE, Literacy and First Nations Access. Because of delays in the start of the Assisted Job Search program, little is known yet about the needs of the Youth Works clients. Based on our knowledge of VCC students, it is likely that the majority of

students will require upgrading of their language, interpersonal and/or academic skills before entering skills training. The Associate Deans have indicated that priority access will be given to Youth Works clients who meet entrance requirements for applied programs.

Through the fall, more planning will be done for January start-up. This will be the opportunity to examine existing programs and expand linkages or ladders between ABE/ESL/ASE and the applied programs, to look at early exit points from longer programs where a person might exit, work and re-enter, and to design new programs. With VCC's large variety of programs, we should be well able to meet the diverse needs of the clients.

The B.C. Benefits and Institution Based Training programs at VCC are in place or under development through the efforts of many people across the College. A thank you is extended to everyone!


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
