VCC grooms pick of the crop

he hospitality industry lined up to meet nearly 200 students at City Centre Campus on February 12 and 13, doubling the exposure for VCC students entering BC's booming tourism industry. And the students were ready — nerves tweaked, hair coiffed, attired in their best bibs and tuckers.

"What began four years ago as a simple introduction has grown into a human resources bonanza with more than double the participants from industry conducting interviews with students this year," said Dave Donaldson, department head, Hospitality Management.

VCC has worked closely with industry to not only develop employment opportunities for its students but to meet industry needs. According to Donaldson, these two straight days of back to back interviews are just one example of how VCC's Hospitality program works so ardently to guarantee the success of its students.

It has proven such an effective recruitment exercise that this year restaurants like White Spot, Red Robin and Starbucks Coffee have jumped on board with the big hotels to get first dibs on "the keenest, best-trained applicants BC has to offer," reported the Province newspaper on February 12, 1997.

"As soon as they drop off their resumes the wheels are in motion," exclaimed

Donaldson. Resumes are typed, formatted and distributed to each employer the student expresses an interest in. Ultimately, the classrooms and labs are converted into temporary HR departments from 9:00 am to 4:30 pm each day.

The employers bring as many as five or six people to conduct interviews scheduled 10 to 20 minutes apart, amounting to 670 interviews, conducted by 57 interviewers, representing 18 prospective employers. And it is all coordinated and carried out fastidiously by the hospitality department. The hospitality industry couldn't be happier.

"Our philosophy embraces that positive, keen enthusiasm you see in students. It also provides a wonderful opportunity for our own HR staff and new managers to gain experience honing their interview skills," explained Maureen Calder, Human Resources, Pan Pacific Hotel.

Tips for avoiding e-mail angst

- put a one-hour delay on your e-mail in case you need to cool down or rethink it
- treat e-mail as you would any other publication — don't say anything you wouldn't say in print
- avoid humour, sarcasm and satire, especially when broadcasting e-mail to multiple readers
- abandon e-mail if you become embroiled in a dispute; it's not an effective way to argue
- remember that e-mail is a record that can be saved forever and can also be forwarded to anyone and everyone without your knowledge

- doublecheck the address to save yourself from a potentially embarassing situation
- when you receive e-mail, don't overread it; recognize that each time you read, it can cut a little deeper and that is probably not what the sender intended
- try starting your message with the person's name and include your own at the end
- think before you send; don't send in anger

Change of meeting structure

At the January 30, 1997 Board meeting, a new format was approved for Board meeting structure, on a one year trial basis, beginning Thursday, February 27, 1997.

In future, monthly Board meetings, as we know them, will start at 6:00 p.m. **BUT** they will be preceded at 5:00 p.m. by a Public Forum, which will be an open discussion period. The College community is invited to submit topics of concern or interest for the consideration of the Board Development Committee. The Board Development Committee meets every second Thursday of the month. All topics submitted will be reviewed and a topic chosen for the next Public Forum. The subject for discussion will be announced in *Connec*-

tions and as much notice as possible will be given, at least one month. Please submit your topics to the Executive Assistant to the President and Board, Sarah Lucas (local 7158). Board members want to hear from you and therfore encourage you to attend these open discussion sessions. The changes suggested have been made to improve interaction between the Board and College community.

Each Board meeting will be followed by a Board Development Session and an "In Camera" meeting of the Board, when necessary.

Board meetings take place every month on the fourth Thursday of the month, at alternating campuses.

Analysis of skills preferred by businesses

A new report, Employability Skills for British Columbia, provides the first analysis of skill sets preferred by BC's medium and small businesses when they hire new recruits.

Skill sets chosen by 50% to 95% of the 195 BC businesses surveyed include "acting with 'common sense' in the work context," being open to "learning new uses of information technology," and specific skills related to communication, numeracy, literacy, planning and ethical behaviour.

The report concentrated on medium and small businesses, the main source of new


