Top jazz talent coming to VCC for free concerts

n Monday, February 3, in the KEC Auditiorium, the VCC Music Department will present a concert of some of Vancouver's finest professional jazz talent. This concert is the first in the four-part "Musician's Performance Trust Fund" concert series, made possible through the generous support of Vancouver Community College, the King Edward Student's Association and the Vancouver Musician's Union. The concert will take place at 1:00 pm in the King Edward Campus auditorium. Admission is free and everyone is welcome.

The February 3 performance will feature the Joe Magnarelli Quartet featuring Rudy Petschauer (drums), Russell Botten (bass), VCC instructor Alan Matheson (piano) and Joe Magnarelli on trumpet.

"Concerts enrich the cultural life of the community and certainly, from the music program's point of view, these opportunities enhance the full development of our students," comments David Branter, VCC Music Department head.

Biographical "Who's Who"

Trumpeter *Joe Magnarelli* is internationally recognized as one of the new young voices in jazz. In reviewing "Why Not," Joe's new release on Criss Cross records, the LA times said, "An excellent recording . . . There's no question this is a fine debut."

Joe has worked with many renowned orchestras and combos, including the Lionel Hampton Orchestra and Buddy Rich Orchestra and can be heard these days working in New York City jazz clubs as a sideman or with the Maria Schneider Monday Night Orchestra. In 1990, Joe was a semifinalist in the Thelonious Monk Jazz Trumpet Competition.

Rudy Petschauer became intrigued by jazz when his drum teacher encouraged him to play along with Miles Davis recordings. Before relocating to New York City in 1985, Joe was a member of Fraser MacPherson's quartet and the drummer of choice for such visiting jazz greats as Joe Pass, Herb Ellis and Tal Farlow. He was also a regular member of pianist Renee Rosnes' trio.

After moving to New York, Rudy played at such famous jazz venues as The Village Gate, The Blue Note and Fat Tuesday's. In 1986, organist Jack McDuff hired Rudy as the drummer for his quintet.

In 1992, Rudy was a finalist in the Thelonious Monk Drum Competition. From 1993 to 1994, he toured the world as a member of the famed Glenn Miller Orchestra.

Alan Matheson is a trumpeter, pianist, composer and arranger as well as a mem-

ber of the jazz quintet Fifth Avenue, 1989 winners of the Alcan National Jazz Competition. Recently, Alan led the CBC Vancouver Jazz Orchestra in a tribute to Paul Whiteman on "West Coast Performance."

An active freelance musician, Alan works with a variety of groups ranging from his own jazz septet and big band to the Vancouver Symphony and Victoria Opera Orchestra. His jazz septet has appeared on the CBC's "Hot Air" and "Jazz Beat" programs.

Alan is also an instructor of the trumpet at UBC and teaches jazz history, piano, trumpet and jazz ensemble at VCC.

Bassist *Russell Botton* started piano lessons at the age of seven and then saxophone before taking up the bass, which he has played professionally since 1974.

Russell has recorded and/or performed with such jazz luminaries as Diana Krall, Herb Ellis, Charlie Byrd, Louise Rose and Johnny Mathis. His recent credits include bassist with Densil Pinnock in the musi-

Student robbed on Broadway after withdrawing cash from KEC bank machine

Customer Service

Don't let this happen to you

Sometimes, the most costly customer service mistakes can happen in only four to six seconds upon meeting a new contact. Here are five forbidden phrases you don't want to use when talking to a customer [or other contact, such as a student -Ed.]:

- Forbidden Phrase #1: I don't know. There is no need to ever utter these words. If you don't know, find out. Usually, there isn't a thing you can't find out, outside of sensitive and financial information. Instead, say: "Gee, that's a good question. Let me check and find out."
- Forbidden Phrase #2: We can't do that. This one is guaranteed to get your contact's blood boiling. Instead, say: "Boy, that's a tough one. Let's see what we can do." Then find an alternative solution.
- Forbidden Phrase #3: You'll have to. Wrong. The only thing that a caller has to do is die and pay taxes. Instead: Use

phrases such as "You'll need to" or "Here's how we can help with that" or "The next time that happens, here's what you can do."

- Forbidden Phrase #4: Hang on a second, I'll be right back. If you've ever said that to a caller, you've lied. Not a big lie, but nevertheless an unnecessary lie. Instead: Watch what happens when you tell the truth: "It may take me two or three minutes to get that information. Are you able to hold while I check?"
- Forbidden Phrase #5: "No" at the beginning of a sentence. The word "no" is useless and conveys total rejection. Most sentences are grammatically correct without the word. Instead: Turn every answer into a positive response. "We aren't able to refund your money, but we can replace the product at no charge."
