New Library fines and fees structure

The College Fees Committee has approved a new Library fines and fees structure which harmonizes the overdue fines and other Library fees charged by the Library at both the City Centre and King Edward Campuses. This will ensure equity both in access to materials, and in the charging of any penalties to Library users at both campuses.

All Library patrons, including College employees (faculty, staff and administrators), will now be charged overdues fines. College employees have always been liable for replacement costs and processing fees for lost and missing items. The new fines and fee structure went into effect July 2.

The Library asks that anyone with Library materials out at present return or renew them on time, and thereby avoid any fines! You can now renew materials either in the Library at the Check Out Desk, or through our new self service renewal system which is also available via the convenience of your home or office computer. If you are unsure what materials you have out, you can print a list from your home or office computer or the library public access terminals, or check at the Library circulation desk. While the standard loan period of materials to college employees is one month, in special circumstances this loan period can be extended; please ask to speak to a librarian at the Information Desk for special extensions.

Prior Learning Assessment at VCC — Q&A

What is it?

Prior Learning Assessment (PLA) is an opportunity for students to receive credit for learning acquired through non-formal education and training or work experience. VCC is now recognizing PLA as one means for students to complete their course of study.

Who might a typical student be?

A typical PLA student is someone who has been working and/or has non-formal education in an area and now wants to use that learning for formal credit. For example a person working as a secretary might want to become a computer application specialist. They might have many of the skills taught in the program but no formal training that proves those skills. With Prior Learning Assessment they would be able to have their skills and knowledge assessed and get academic credit for them. Another example might be someone who has been working in a care setting but doesn't have formal credential but has many of the skills of a Resident Care Attendant. They could have their skills and knowledge assessed and be given credit for the learning they have acquired.

Where is VCC in the implementation process?

Currently VCC, through the PLA committee and coordinator, is in the process of having policy approved, orienting faculty and administration to PLA, and training advisor/assessors for PLA. Concurrent with the development and training are two programs that are beginning to develop assessment tools for prior learning assessment. The Medical Lab Assistant and Resident Care Attendant Programs both have students interested in taking the prior learning assessment route to gain credit. The Provincial Instructor Diploma and the Diploma in Adult Education will begin

offering PLA this July. The Business and Hospitality programs are also beginning the process of examining PLA as an option. Watch for fall training sessions for assessors or call Joan McArthur-Blair to set up a training session for your department.

What is the process a student will go through to get PLA?

Although not all the processes are currently in place, this is a general outline of what the process will be like. A student will advise admissions of their interest in PLA. Admissions will send the student to Counselling to pick up information on prior learning assessment for their program (under development). The student will then proceed to the department where they will accepted (or rejected) as a PLA candidate. If the student is accepted they will provide evidence of their skills and knowledge to the department and be assessed and graded on those skills and knowledge. The department will then provide admission with those grades and the student will be placed in the program.

What do departments need to do to start the process?

If programs and departments are getting involved in PLA they need to train advisor/assessors within the department, re-design course and program evaluations for prior learning assessment and provide counselling with PLA information.

Where can departments who want to implement PLA get support?

VCC has a PLA Coordinator, Joan McArthur-Blair, who is there to assist the college in all aspects of PLA implementation. Advisors/assessors training is available through her and she provides pilot support to all departments getting in-

volved in PLA. In addition, there are small amounts of funds available for release time to departments for re-design of their evaluations for Prior Learning Assessment.

Bike-commuting to VCC: it can be done, and it can also be fun!

(Lee Henderson, of the ESL Outreach Department, relates his experience as a commuter cyclist, travelling mainly to KEC put also periodically to City Centre.)

As a community college, VCC has a big environmental impact on the community we serve. And as we know, air pollution is a problem for the community and lack of exercise creates health problems for the individual.

But there are alternatives, and along with that, some good news: it is becoming easier each year to cycle to KEC. Many of the residential streets in the neighbourhoods around China Creek have calmer motor vehicle traffic because of traffic circles and pocket parks in intersections.

A new bike route, the "Off-Broadway Bikeway," which approaches KEC from the west, was recently opened. However, I don't recommend it, except for using it to cross Clark Drive with the new cyclist-activated traffic light at 7th Ave.

Experienced bike commuters I consulted recommend 10th Ave for crossing town. Because 10th Ave. lies between Broadway and 12th, and the traffic on North-South arterials has big gaps, it is usually easy to cross Granville, Oak, Cambie and Main Streets, to name a few.

As for City Centre, I have cycle commuted to that campus, using the Adanac Bikeway. This is great fun, and heavily used by cyclists, who greet each other on the way.

Although the city is not a completely bikefriendly place yet, over time it is becoming increasingly easy to commute to work. Here's hoping that this bit of information will encourage VCC employees to try out more alternative transportation methods.

Thumbtack owners granted amnesty as part of college "tack-ban"

As of September 1, thumbtacks will be banned from use at KEC campus. When left lying around on elevator and hallway floors, these seemingly innocuous little devils puncture the tires of wheelchairs, causing users no end of frustration.

KEC employees with thumbtacks in their possession are requested to turn them in to KEC Building Services Manager Bill Miller, no questions asked, by September 1. Please note that this is not simply a thumbtack-registration for thumbtacks which you own and use for your own business and personal pleasure. Rather, it is an outright ban.

No word yet on whether persons opposed to the new ban will launch a grassroots PR campaign to fight the turning in of all thumbtacks. However, sources close to this issue tell us that the powerful and well-funded U.S. thumbtack lobby, coordinated by the NTA (National Thumbtack Association) is watching the outcome of this issue very closely, with an eye to assisting in any pro-thumbtack campaign, if requested to by their neighbours to the north.

One thing is obvious, however: the argument that "it's not thumbtacks that puncture tires, it's people that puncture tires" holds no water in this instance.
