Staff survey results

In the fall of 1996, we asked VCC employees for their opinions on several diverse workload and leave programs. The survey was given to encourage open discussion about possible options for employees. These options are not meant to provide an alternative for the existing early retirement plan. VCC employees of all ages and employee groups received the survey and about 40% (336) responded. Here is a brief summary of their opinions.

Partial retirement

About half (49%) of those responding would consider a partial retirement; a program where employees 55 and older retire, take a reduced pension, and then return to a partial workload at the college. However, only 19% of all survey respondents would be eligible for this program during the next three years. Of those eligible, 60% expressed an interest.

Early leave

Fourty-three percent of employees would consider an early leave; a one-time payout for those who voluntarily leave. This option was most favourably received by those approaching 55 and least favourably by those over 55.

Reduced workload and job sharing

At least two-thirds (67%) of all employees surveyed would consider either a reduced workload or a job sharing program, although about 15% of those felt neither would be workable within the next three years. When considering these programs, employees expressed concerns about their pensions, seniority and benefits.

Assisted alternate career

Over two-thirds (70%) of Staff and Administrators would consider a career move supported by the college. Faculty members were less likely to consider an assisted alternate career (50%).

Temporary outplacement and fixed-term leave of absence

Temporary Outplacement and a Fixed-Term Leave of Absence were the two programs most likely to be considered by VCC employees. Staff and Faculty favour a Leave of Absence over Outplacement while the reverse is true for Administrators.

Overall

VCC employees seem willing to consider a number of options rather than just one or two. 64% of all those surveyed were willing to consider four or more programs, 12% would consider all of them, and only 7% said they would not consider any.

The survey results and comments can be found in the reference section in each of the campus libraries.

Next Steps

John Cruickshank has asked for employee representatives to work on a new, optional, employee workload and leave plan that will meet the needs of employees and the college. Our goal is to have a working plan available for discussion in the next budget year (1998/99).

VCC Media Services pushed the technical and creative envelope recently in creating a new graphic display for the Music Department. The display, measuring 40 square feet, was produced by using digital as well as traditional graphic production techniques.

After initial discussions with the Music Department, Lauch McKenzie, Zoro Mihajlovic and Bob Altwein developed and executed a concept and design that was eventu-

ally approved for production. With guidelines provided by Key Colour, the final output service provider, the computer file began to take shape. Digitally enhanced photos from live performances and studio shoots were combined with computer generated designs, illustrations and text onto a colour gradient background. A companion brochure using similar graphic elements was also produced to complement the display.


The individual elements for the production were scanned into or constructed

using Adobe Photoshop and Adobe Illustrator programs on Macintosh 7200 computers outfitted with 64 Mb of RAM. 800Megs of hard disc space was required to store the information.

The finished 160Mb file was transported on a hard drive to Key Colour for output on their "CACTUS" printer. Four strips, approximately 3" x 5" each with a resolution of 72 dpi were produced, laminated and mounted on "SINTRA" board for installation in the display system.

To the credit of Lauch, Zoro and Bob, the project came in on time (with the help of serious negotiations with Key Colour), and under budget. It generated a great deal of excitement and positive feedback both within Media Services and from delegates at the conference. It also represents a giant step forward in our ability to handle graphics projects of this size and complexity.

Online writing tips

One of the biggest mistakes of writers new to electronic media is to take material written for print and try to "shovel" it onto a screen. It is what BC-based communications consultant Tim Hicks colourfully calls "shovelware".

When writers produce copy for online consumption, they must remember that their words are not carved in stone. They can be changed, reshaped, corrected, and updated. And, in an interactive medium, those words are subject to immediate feedback. Techniques that will help writers include:

Keeping it short. Learn to break stories into short, easy-to-understand sections. Avoid long, linear pieces that require the reader to start at the beginning and read through. Readers need to be able to start in the middle, if that's where their online search tool takes them.

Organizing for the medium. When you organize your material, forgo the traditional story outline in favour of a storyboard technique that provides links and navigational aids.

Feeding those search engines. Consider how search engines look for information. "They find what's at the beginning of your site, and what's at the beginning of the page," says Tim Hicks.

Managing the information. Separate information according to the subaudiences that will read it, and place information for different audiences on different pages. "That way," says Hicks, "no single audience will have to wade through text that isn't of interest to find one or two points that are relevant to them."

Measuring your effectiveness. Build in mechanisms for feedback, and be prepared to act upon it. This is even more important online than it is for other media, because it's the only way you'll know where to spend your time improving your site.

VCC Culinary Arts apprentice wins Black Box competition

VCC's Culinary Arts students continue to shine in high-profile events. Jason Lloyd, an apprentice chef with the program, rose to the top of nine competitors to win the March 8 "Black Box" competition, held at City Centre on March 8.

Jason, who is apprenticing at the Pan Pacific Hotel, will go on to represent BC at the Canadian Federation of Chefs and Cooks National Apprentice Competition on June 4 in Saskatoon.

At 7:00 am, on the morning of the competition, each of the nine competitors was allowed to open the "Black Box." Each box contained four lamb shanks, a pheasant, two whole trout, some black Thai rice, four apples and an assortment of vegetables: pea shoots, cilantro, bean sprouts and two kinds of mushrooms: chanterelles and portabellas.

By 8:00 am contestants had to come up with a four-course menu to serve four people, using the Black Box ingredients. Serving started 12:45, when the first dish on the menu hit the tables.

The Waterfront Hotel's Greg Van Poppel, another VCC apprentice, took second spot in the competition.

New policy announcement

At the January 30, 1997 Board meeting, the Policy "Board Meetings" was approved.

Policy Category: Governance

Policy on Board Meetings

Purpose: To establish expectations and procedures for VCC Board meetings.

Policy: The VCC Board meets in regularly scheduled sessions, which are open to the public, except in occasional instances. The Board meets "in camera" to discuss confidential issues (see policy - In Camera Board Meetings). Board committees do much of the work of the Board and bring recommendations to the Board as a whole.

Applies to: All Board members.

Procedures: The Board meets as often as necessary to transact the business of the College Board, as a rule once a month.

The Board meetings proceed according to the principles of Roberts Rules of Order and VCC Guidelines for Debate (see Appendix).

The Chairperson shall preside at all meetings of the College Board, or in the absence of the Chairperson, the Vice Chair presides. In the absence of both, a member of the Board appointed by the College Board shall preside.

The President, in conjunction with the Board Chairperson, the Board Development Committee and the College Executive shall prepare and submit an order of Business called an Agenda for each meeting. The Order shall be substantially as follows:

- 1. Presentations/Delegations
- 2. Enquiries
- 3. Approval of Agenda
- 4. Confirmation of Minutes
- 5. Business Arising
- Board Committee Reports
- For Approval

- 6. Board Governance Structure: Education Council Report
- For Approval Operations Council
- For Approval
- 7. New Business
- For Approval
 For Information
- 8. AECBC Report
- 9. President's Report10.Employee Group Reports
- 11. Student Group Reports
- 12.Board Member Reports

No member of the College Board shall leave the College Board meeting before the close of the session without notifying the Chairperson.

The Confidential Secretary takes Minutes of each Board meeting and presents them for approval at the following meeting.

The Chair will, at his/her discretion, allow a comment or enquiry at the beginning of the meeting or as it relates to an agenda item unless otherwise directed by the Board.

The Confidential Secretary to the Board prepares a schedule of Board meetings at the beginning of each calendar year for the year and notifies the College community.

Emergency meetings may be scheduled as required, but with as much notice as possible.

The Confidential Secretary to the Board prepares a draft agenda for the Board Development Committee's review and approval.

The Confidential Secretary prepares and distributes the Board Agenda package one week prior to the Board meeting.

Policy Sponsor: Board Development Committee

Appendix: Guidelines for Debate on Items for Decision at VCC Board Meetings

- No question shall be determined by the College Board unless upon motion of a member seconded by another member. No discussion shall be allowed until a motion is proposed and seconded.
- At all meetings of the College Board all questions shall be decided upon by the majority of votes of the members present and voting, except motions to limit debate, postpone definitely, or withdrawal of a motion, which requires a two-thirds majority.
- 3. Every voting member of the College Board member present, except the Chairperson, shall vote unless excused by the College Board. The Chairperson has the same right to vote as the other members of the College Board but normally will only vote in the event of a tie to cast the deciding vote.
- 4. The Chairperson shall declare the result of all questions voted upon.
- 5. Members will state they are speaking in favour, against, to a point of order, to seek more information or clarification, or to propose a subsidiary motion (to lay on the table, to limit debate, refer to committee, amend, etc.) or an incidental motion (to remove from the table, to reconsider, rescind, etc.)
- 6. Members will confine their remarks to the merits of the motion.



The Vancouver Health Board measles vaccination clinics at KEC and City Centre on Feb. 19, 20 and 21 were very successful. In total of 3,600 people were vaccinated: 1,500 at City Centre and 2,100 at KEC.

The current measles epidemic in post-secondary institutions has resulted in about 59 cases at SFU, 4 at VCC and unknown numbers at UBC and BCIT. Measles can be a serious disease in adults and is extremely infectious.

If you missed your vaccination and still wish to receive the measles vaccine, there is still a limited supply at each campus Health Services. At City Centre call Pat (8337) and at KEC call Pauline (7187).

For two days in February the hospitality management program at City Centre converted their classrooms and labs into temporary human resources departments where 18 hotels and restaurants conducted mass interviews of nearly 200 VCC students. Spearheaded by department head Dave Donaldson, what began four years ago as a simple introduction has grown into a human resources bonanza for the local industry, and a full-time coordination job for Donaldson.

The headline: PICK OF THE CROP

This year, the department's handson approach and hard work paid off in The Province newspaper on February 12, 1997 with a half-page colour photo of Linda Smith, a smiling 28-year-old hospitality administration student.

"The 18 hotels and restaurants grinding the nervous candidates through 607 interviews - up from 500 last year - have got it easy. They'll pick from among the keenest, best-trained applicants BC has to offer to fill entry-level jobs that can turn into careers," wrote reporter Paul Luke.

Hats off to Dave Donaldson! In between organizing every detail of the event, he still found time to boast to College Advancement about the process with such unbridled enthusiasm that a press release was circulated to the local media. Donaldson was also prepared with a list of industry contacts for inclusion in the press release.

The story was a win-win for everyone involved. For industry which
was recognized for supporting
VCC's programs, for the students
whose efforts and special skills are
being recognized and for the College which doesn't just stop at
training its students, but goes
beyond the call to help them find
jobs.

The article, which ran in the newspaper on the first day of the interviews, quoted Sheila Brock, human resources manager with the Hyatt Regency Vancouver, articulating the qualities the hotel would be looking for in prospective employees.

"Attitude, attitude, attitude. That's the important thing," Brock said.

Judging from the attitude of their department head, these students have learned from the master!
