### Students protest cuts to **Adult Basic Education**

n Wednesday, March 12 faculty and administrators joined students from colleges throughout the Lower Mainland, boarding buses and loading up cars, to crowd into the main mall foyer at City Centre Campus and shout down the government's proposed cuts in funding for adult basic education programs.

BC Colleges joined forces with the Advanced Education Council of BC in protest of Education Minister Ramsey's announcement that government expects to save five per cent through efficiencies in the adult basic educabudget, amounting to about \$1.75 million a year.

Guest speakers included VCC president John Cruickshank, Ed Lavalle, president, College-Institute Educators' Association of BC, Stephanie Forsyth, chair, Provincial Deans and Directors of Development Education Committee, Juliane Albanesse, Canadian Federation of Students representative and a host of students from BC colleges.

Many students denounced the ramifications of these cuts, which mean larger class

sizes and less support for adult basic education students. Many addressed issues close to the heart, speaking of their own struggles to learn and succeed in an exceedingly difficult and challenging world.

Adult basic education programs serve some of the most vulnerable students in the province, those already disadvantaged,

## **Ethical Encounters for College Personnel**

Facilitated By John Dennison, Professor Emeritus of Higher Education, The University of British Columbia.

Finally, participants will break into small groups to discuss and debate a number of cases which involve ethical dilemmas and conflicting values. There will be further opportunity for each group to report on cases and their resolution to the group at large.

### Access of VCC Community to the Board Agenda

Effective date: **02/27/97**Policy Category: **Governance** 

**Purpose:** To ensure that the VCC community has access to the Board agenda and to participation at the Board meeting.

**Policy:** The VCC Board encourages the participation of the VCC community in Board meeting discussion through access to the Board agenda.

Applies to: All members of the VCC internal and external community

#### Procedures:

- 1. Anyone wishing to place an item on the Board agenda should present the item for approval, (accompanied by any relevant background materials), either in person or in writing to the Board Development Committee, which is scheduled to meet the second Thursday of each month.
- 2. The Board agenda is distributed one week before the Board meeting. All members of the VCC Community have access to the agenda through their constituent group. The Executive Office will provide a copy of the agenda, upon request.
- 3. The Board Coordinating Group,\* which meets within seven days of the Board meeting, will rule on requests for late additions to the agenda.
- 4. Delegations wishing to present to the Board must notify the Executive Assistant who will advise the Board Development Committee. The Board Development Committee decides on appropriateness of the delegation, how much time is to be alloted to the item and where it appears on the agenda.
- 5. Anyone wishing to add an urgent, last minute item to the Board agenda

should contact the Executive Assistant who will notify the Board Chair. The Board Chair will determine whether or where to place the item on the agenda.

6. Enquiries are raised before the approval of the Board meeting Agenda. The time and number of enquiries from any one person are at the discretion of the Chair. Enquiries will not be debated at that meeting, but may create an agenda item for the next formal meeting of the Board.

### Process for Board Hearings of Student Appeals

Effective Date: 02/27/97
Policy Category: Governance

**Purpose:** To allow an appeal to the Board by a student of a disciplinary, admissions or grievance decision.

*Policy:* VCC, in accordance with <u>The College and Institute Act</u>, allows for appeal to the Board by a student.

Applies to: All VCC students.

#### Procedures:

- A student wishing to appeal a decision will be advised of the policy on Process for Board Hearings of Student Appeals. If necessary, translation services or other student services will be provided to ensure that the student understands the process and grounds for appeal.
- A student may appeal a disciplinary, admissions or grievance decision on the following grounds <u>ONLY</u>:

- a) due process was not followed
- b) important evidence was missing

NOTE: Disagreement with the decision is not grounds for an appeal.

- 3. The student initiates the appeal process by submitting a written request for a Board Appeal Hearing to the Board Chair within 10 days of the student receiving notice of the decision.
- 4. The Board's Executive Assistant will contact at least three Board members who will review the written request and all background information to determine whether on its face it discloses valid grounds for appeal.
- 5. The Board Chair will inform the student as to whether the request for a Board Appeal Hearing will be granted, within 10 days of receipt of the student's written request.
- 6. If a Board Appeal Hearing is to take place, the Executive Assistant shall immediately contact four Board members, who will constitute the Board Hearing Committee and schedule the Hearing as soon as possible, within 10 days of first contact with Board members.
- 7. The student may be accompanied by an advisor, but must advise the Executive Assistant of intent to do so. More than one advisor may be allowed at the discretion of the Chair.
- Appropriate College personnel\* who have contributed to the decision under appeal will participate in the Hearing.
- 9. Board Appeal Hearing Procedures:
- The Committee Chair will introduce all parties and outline the procedures to be followed at the Hearing.
- The student will identify the issues from his/her perspective, and outline facts relevant to his/her appeal.

- iii) The appropriate College personnel\* concerned will have the same opportunity.
- iv) Each party will have an opportunity to respond to the representations.
- v) The committee will determine any other individuals to be interviewed and give the appropriate College personnel\* and student an opportunity to respond to the information gathered from these interviews.
- vi) Committee members may ask questions of parties in the appeal.
- vii) The Committee members will then deliberate in private and make a decision regarding the appeal.
- viii) If satisfied either that due process was not followed or that important evidence was missing, the Board Appeal Hearing Committee shall grant the appeal and refer the matter back to the President for reconsideration.
- 10. The Board Appeal Hearing Committee communicates its recommendations to the Board Chair, who will advise the student of the outcome in writing, within 10 days of the Hearing.

To combat this type of crime, the Vancouver Police advise you not to leave **ANYTHING** visible in your car. This includes coats, umbrellas, plastic bags, loose change, etc. In fact, the police report that vehicles have been broken into to steal a quarter.

To deter opportunistic theft of your vehicle, consider purchasing a highly visible anti-theft device such as a steering wheel lock.

### PASBC is moving on

PASBC (the Post-Secondary Application Service of British Columbia) is entering a new phase that will see a relocation of its offices from Kamloops to Victoria, but a continuation of its services as if nothing has changed. The move follows a recent decision to merge several organizations into one central location.

PASBC's services are now part of a new non-profit society called the Centre for Education Information Standards and Services (CEISS). The merger follows a two-year strategic planning undertaking within the college, institute and agency sector of BC's public post-secondary system, culminating in the release of a report last fall called *Charting a New Course*.

Under the new organizational structure, PASBC's services are being combined with those of three other previously existing organizations: the Research and Analysis Branch of the Ministry of Education, Skills and Training; the Consortium for Administrative Systems Development (CASD); and Gaylord, Ducharme and Associates (GDA).

The role of the new organization will be to coordinate various system-wide initiatives relating to collecting, analyzing and distributing educational, occupational and economic information according to set standards. Users of PASBC's services, including the provincial common application-for-admission process on the internet, the Explore database, and the PASBC web site, will continue to find PASBC's information and services through the PASBC internet address (http:/ /www.pas.bc.ca). If you visit our home page you'll notice that the background has been changed to reflect some of the visual elements of the CEISS web site (http:// www.ceiss.org). The PASBC common internet application form software now operates from a computer housed at the CEISS office in Victoria. The new machine is several times faster, and if your internet connection is fast enough, you should see improved performance with the form.

Although we kept the URL www.pas.bc.ca the same, you will notice that the name changes automatically to europa.ceiss.org during your session. This has been built into the system and requires no new action on the user's part. It looks like the same Kamloops service as before, but the internet now connects you to Victoria.
