## Does a healthy person need vitamin and mineral supplements?

For most people, eating a variety of foods as suggested by Canada's Food Guide to Healthy Eating will provide all the necessary nutrients. The average healthy person does not require vitamin or mineral pills, even on a stressful day.

Nutritional supplements may be recommended in some cases. Some of these are for women who may become pregnant, are pregnant or are breastfeeding, infants, people who omit entire food groups from their diets, and those on very low calorie diets. There may also be medical reasons to use vitamin and mineral supplements. Your physician and registered dietitian can help advise you of your specific vitamin and mineral requirements, as too much of certain nutrients can be dangerous. A good book to read on this topic is The Essential Guide to Vitamins and Minerals by Elizabeth Somer (Publisher: Health Media of America). Your local health department dietitian/nutritionist is also a super resource for finding nutrition information.

## Counsellors' Korner

(From an article by Beth Weick about a Provincial Study on the status and effectiveness of professional counselling in B.C. colleges, university colleges and institutes.)

Counsellors in B.C. colleges and institutes are excited about a long awaited study on the status and effectiveness of professional counselling in B.C. colleges, university colleges and institutes. Just released by the Centre for Curriculum, Transfer and Technology, "Professional Counselling in the BC College, University College and Institute System" is a document which attests to the significant contribution professional counsellors make to the educational process in institutions across B.C.

Prepared at the behest of the Ministry, survey results from across the province show strong endorsement for academic, personal and career counselling delivered by professional counsellors. Counselling is seen as an integral component of student success.

What makes this document more than just another dry report are the verbatim sum-

maries from twenty-four faculty and student focus groups captured in appendices. Faculty say counsellors are needed to help with crises, as reality checks regarding interactions with students, to help students sort out career issues, as a place to refer students at risk and as a connecting force in campus life.

Both students and faculty mentioned some of the challenges that counsellors face: greater workload with fewer resources, greater student anxiety about careers and funding, increased numbers of high risk students, and more critical incidents and students who threaten. Stress and overwork are identified often enough to highlight the potential for counsellor burnout as a serious issue. Students say counselling provided a big picture perspective, provided knowledge for better studey habits, released the valve on the pressure cooker and kept them from quitting.

The Report is available from the offices of the President, the Senior Educational Support Officer, the Faculty Association, and the Counselling Department. It may also be ordered from the Centre for Curriculum, Transfer and Technology, and will be available on their web site.

Nan was much respected by her colleagues and students and will be greatly missed. She was extremely passionate about her work but this was always tempered by a gentle sense of humour.

### Nan Poliakoff 1953-1998

We are fortunate to have so much by which to remember Nan — her intelligence, her dead-pan sense of humour, her cooking, her love of the arts and, not the least, her glorious hair. Friends and colleagues here may best remember her as a committed educator — she taught in College Prep, ELS — International Education and the Bridge Program — and in the TESL Certificate Program, though Outreach was her home. Her particular love was teaching writing, which she did often to astonishing results. She believed in and quietly championed "Process Writing," a technique that emulates what professional writers do: write, reflect, solicit feedback from editors and peers, rewrite. Rewrite. Rewrite. In her classroom, something real was happening - passionate argument, meaningful communication, true cooperation — which is, I think, the same engage ancestors of one lives NThere's something we ment she brought to her life. have to take out — the part about her in

In writing, as in life, there is no point where a writer can definitively say that a text is finished. Circumstances prescribe that it be finished — deadlines usually. But always there remains that niggling wish to have changed a certain word, to have cut or added, to have made the meaning clearer. Nan, at 45, was very much in midprocess with a daughter in high school, a son in first year university, a loving husband, a sister expecting a baby, a mother going strong. She was working on a book and had just won the Pat Wakefield Award to study in Britain. She had friends who counted on her being there for them.

To those of us, then, who cared for Nan, who loved her, now we have to edit the

#### Public Service Announcements: an opportunity for some free PR

## What's a public service announcement?

Often called a "PSA," it's a brief announcement about an event which would be of interest to the general public. The announcement will contain factual information about the event, time, place, contact for more information, etc.

As an example, Rogers Cable 4, the community and multicultural channels, provides free airing of public service announcements. The announcements run for a maximum of one week, from midnight to 9:00 a.m.

Other media, such as What's On (The Province), or Time Out (The Georgia Straight), offer listings where PSA information can appear.

A regular course offering would usually **not** quality as a PSA, although there are exceptions if the course or program is unique and of current interest.

#### Timing is everything

Your PSA must be received by the media (including Rogers Cable 4) three weeks before the event. The relevant information on your announcement should be sent to Dale Rasmussen, local 7152 or email drasmussen@vcc.bc.ca at least one week before that. Therefore, please provide your information a total of four weeks in advance.

Please keep in mind that whether your PSA is picked up is at the discretion of the media.

The evening's Silent Auction featured the largest assortment of items yet. A grand total of 119 auction items fetched a record \$13,600.

#### In the News

The March 14 edition of The Employment Paper featured an article on the demand for professional cooks. Settimio Sicoli. Associate Dean of Tourism, Hospital and Business programs, was quoted as saying that "tourism and hospitality has taken over as the number one industry in BC. Right now it looks like we can't meet the demand [for chefs] for the next century."

VCC's trades areas got a write-up in the March 21 Employment Paper, which wrote about the shortage of skilled tradespeople in the auto collision, auto painting and refinishing, and diesel industries. Lew Bloomingdale, head of Auto Collision, was quoted as saying that "...if there were 500 umemployed journey people, they would all find work within a week."

In an effort to make up the shortage of skilled grads, the Automotive Retailers Association will offer three new scholarships to high school students entering the VCC auto collision repair program. The first set of scholarships will be awarded in May at the Skills Canada Secondary Competition, taking place at the Vancouver Trade and Convention Centre.

The Electronics program got a boost in the March 28 edition of The Employment Paper, in an article which focussed on the program's Telecommunications specialty option, as well as the Electronics Technician program. The article talked about how "the rapidly expanding field of telecommunications is a hotbed of jobs for those with expertise."

The Committee's goal is to provide funding to encourage the development of creative, innovative and experimental curriculum materials in a wide variety of programs across the BC college and institute system.

The Vice Presidents' office received a total of five (5) LIC proposals for consideration. On Tuesday, March 24,
