

Tour of VCC auto program inspires grade 7 student to stay in school

Lew Bloomingdale, Department Head of the Auto Collision Repair Program, received a couple of shots of good news recently.

Craig Hopkins, from Vancouver School Board District Learning Services, wrote Lew to thank him for providing a work experience placement for Mike Lightfoot, a VSB grade 12 student. Tom expressed his appreciation for the time and effort Lew and his colleagues contributed toward making Mike's learning experience a worthwhile one.

What made this experience doubly memorable, however, was the fact that during Mike's training period at VCC, he had the opportunity to meet another student, Tim Karajaoja.

Like Mike, Tim is a First Nations student. Tim, however, is 12 years old, in Grade 7 at Walter Moberly Elementary, and hard of hearing. He was also very close to quitting school.

As part of a pre-arranged tour for Walter Moberly students, Tim and his classmates and teachers toured the Auto Collision Repair program and watched students in action.

Now, it just happens that both Tim and Mike hope to work as auto collision repair technicians in the future. Tim struck up a conversation with Mike, and clearly found the experience inspiring, as the end result was that Tim now plans to work harder at school so he can eventually attend the Auto Collision Program at VCC.

Tom Tylka, District Resource Teacher for Deaf and Hard of Hearing students at Walter Moberly Elementary School, wrote Lew to share his feelings about Tim's visit, and made this comment: "Your time with Tim made an impression. He returned to Moberly School with a heightened awareness of the importance of actively participating in his education. It was a pleasure for me watching him enthusiastically share his experience with our school personnel."

Thanks to Lew for sharing this inspiring story with us, just in time for the holidays.

Summary of November 26 Board meeting

In the absence of the Board Chair, Bhalwinder Waraich, Vice Chair, chaired the meeting, held at City Centre Campus.

Amanda Achtymichuk, Sign Language Studies student, brought a report from the King Edward Student Association, indicating student concerns over a possible strike by the Faculty Association and disruption to classes, exams etc. A student petition was presented.

The Board Coordinating Committee's motion to recognize the constituency based advisory group to the President's Evaluation as an advisory group to the Board was passed and the Board approved the continuation of the work of this group, which will meet again in early January.

The Board approved the request from the Board Community Alliance Committee to initiate plans, in partnership with the faculty, for 1999 community forums on post secondary education issues. The Community Alliance Committee reported a meeting with City Fest organizers to confirm plans for City Fest, which will take place at King Edward Campus, May 21-23, 1999.

The revised "Access of the VCC Community to the College Board Agenda" policy was approved. Revision was required earlier in the year, since the

Board Coordinating Committee took on the task of Board agenda approval, which was previously performed by the Board Development Committee. The policy had been circulated widely to all constituent groups for feedback, which has been incorporated into the revised policy. The Board Policy Committee Chair, Cheryl Draper, advised that draft two of the "Student Appeals to the Board" policy will be reviewed by the committee in early December, after which it will be circulated for feedback from the College Community.

The Board was informed of concerns and issues regarding the Skytrain Extension Project. Board members endorsed the writing of a letter, jointly addressed to the Rapid Transit Project Office and to the City Planning Department, supporting the City's request for a three month delay in the process and outlining some of the College's concerns. The Board was informed that information/consultation forums would be taking place at both campuses and a recommendation would go to Operations Council in December regarding the VCC position on the project proposal.

The Board received a presentation from the President of the Faculty Association, Frank Cosco, on outstanding negotiating issues, so that

- · you receive the benefit of immediate income tax relief. Revenue Canada permits the College to reduce the income tax you pay each pay period, instead of you making a contribution and waiting for your tax refund and
- · with the benefit of the Colleges purchasing power, you receive higher interest rates and lower investment management charges than are

available to you from most financial institutions and investment companies.

Since this present plan was implemented there have been legislative changes with respect to RRSPs.

The College is sponsoring information sessions on the Group RRSP Plan to provide you with more information, to update you on legislative changes, to review the performance of the various funds included in the Group RRSP Plan and to answer all your questions.

The Colleges external benefits consultants will provide information with respect to the background of the plan, supplier selection and related RRSP/income tax considerations. The investment managers and administrators

(Connor, Clark & Lunn/ Great-West Life) will discuss investment options, investment performance and the administration of the plan.

The Christmas celebration may not be a part of everyone's heritage, but it is a festival that many Canadians celebrate.


We should be proud to decorate our campus so that people from other cultures can learn more about the holiday and what it means.


