VCC's transportation survey results are in!

ot on the (w)heels of Bike to Work Week (May 31 – June 6), the VCC Employee Transportation Surveys are in and the results are encouraging. The purpose of the survey was to find out how employees are getting to work and what role VCC may be able to play in reducing the stress associated with com-

muting, reducing traffic congestion, improving the environment and offering employees more choices in how they get to work.

Over 300 staff and faculty responded to the survey, giving a clear picture of both the trials and tribulations we face getting to and from work each day. While 51% of respondents claimed to be regular S.O.V.'ers (single occupant vehicle drivers), the remainder defined themselves as regular alternative transportation or "green" commuters.

"Green" commuters included 26% who took transit, 7% who came by carpool or vanpool, 7% who walked or jogged, 5% who cycled, and 4% who drove part way and took transit part way.

Equally as encouraging as the 49% of respondents who already take alternatives, was the number of solo drivers who would consider "going green" more often than they do now. For example, 65% said they would consider taking transit, 57% said they would consider carpooling, 38% said they would consider vanpooling, 31% said they would consider cycling, and 26% said they would consider walking or jogging either most or some of the time. However, before some respondents felt they could

Summary of Board Meeting, July 2, 1998

The Public Forum Session provided a report on a 1997 survey commissioned by the Advanced Education Council of B.C. (AECBC) and the University Presidents' Council of B.C (TUPC) on the topic of "Public Opinion of Post Secondary Education in B.C." The report was presented by Gerry Della Mattia, Executive Director, AECBC and Gitta Oldendorff, Director of Communications and Policy Analysis, AECBC. If anyone is interested in receiving a copy of the survey results, please contact the Executive Office.

The *Board Coordinating Committee* will meet to approve the agenda of the August Board meeting on Thursday, August 13, at 4:00 p.m. in the President's Office at King Edward Campus.

The *Board Development Committee Evaluation Task Force* presented a short
Board self-evaluation instrument which
was completed immediately prior to the

Board meeting. A draft paper on Board Roles and Responsibilities, prepared by two Board members, was distributed to serve as a discussion paper at the next Board meeting. The final product will be used as a base for a more in depth Board evaluation.

The Community Alliance Committee has a new Chair, Sharon Olsen. Sharon congratulated all those involved in the organization of the National Aboriginal Day celebrations held on June 19 at City Centre Campus. She also advised that the VanCity Place For Youth Hostel opening would take place on July 12, 1998, at 326 West Pender and that the Committee was investigating ways to establish links between the Hostel and the College.

The Finance and Administration Committee presented the 1997/98 Financial Statements and Public Bodies Report and the 1998/99 Capital Allocation ranked list, which were all approved. After lengthy discussions and public presentations on proposed cuts within the draft budget, the 1998/99 Budget was approved.

The Board Policy Committee has a new Chair, Cheryl Draper. The Access of VCC Community to Board Agenda Policy has undergone revision by the Committee and will now be distributed to the constituent groups for information and possible input, prior to approval by the Board at the September meeting.

The next Board meeting will take place on Thursday, August 27, 1998 in Room 5025 at King Edward Campus. This will be the first meeting for any new Board members, who are expected to be appointed at the end of July.

regularly act on their desire to walk, cycle, take transit or rideshare to work, they indicated that certain issues need to be addressed and better services implemented.

For instance, key incentives that would encourage respondents to take transit more and leave their cars at home included: subsidized monthly transit passes; a guaranteed ride home policy in the case of an emergency; the sale of monthly passes at work; more flexible work hours; and, improved transportation between campuses.

For those who were interested in ridesharing, assistance in finding "pool partners," parking benefits for carpools and vanpools, and a guaranteed ride home policy were the key issues of concern. Irregular work schedules, difficulty meeting pool partners, and the need to move between campuses currently prevents some people from making the switch to ridesharing.

For those interested in the "greenest" commute alternatives (cycling, walking, and jogging), distance, weather, security and facilities play a key role in commute decisions. Key incentives cited by VCC staff and faculty included more secure and convenient bicycle racks and bicycle lockers, showers and clothing lockers, and other enticements such as bicycle route maps, safe-riding and bike maintenance workshops, more flexible work hours, and a guaranteed ride home policy in case of an emergency.

So, now that the results are in, what's next? Currently, the Transportation Committee (a sub-committee of the Environment Committee) is working energetically on drafting a comprehensive plan, based on the survey results, for the College's consideration in the fall. The plan aims to address many of the barriers and biases faced by staff, faculty, and students when trying to make "green" commute choices thereby providing more choices and services to the commuter. An update on VCC's Banner system

In the last couple of years VCC has installed new computer systems for HR and Finance. Now it's time for the student record system. The full implementation will take some time but towards the end of September 1998 we will begin accepting applications and registrations from students using the Banner Student Record system. We will be implementing the functions that support Catalogue, Scheduling, Admissions, Student Account Receivable, Registration and Academic History. Banner Student is the third of the major Banner systems to be put into place at VCC. Banner HR and Banner Finance are already in place, and Banner Student will be integrated with them.

VCC is in good company. In BC, institutions such as Douglas, Kwantlen, Okanagan University College, University of Victoria, BCIT, Open Learning Agency and UNBC have all installed this system. So have a wide variety of institutions across Canada including SAIT, University of Toronto, McGill, Dalhousie, Yukon College, Red Deer Community College and Athabasca University and many, many more in the United States.

There are many challenges. City Centre and KEC currently have separate, and very different, student information systems. The campuses also have different needs and different procedures and policies. To enable us to move to one system, we must clean up and convert data from both the current systems, find and implement common procedures where possible and determine how to use Banner Student functions to accomplish VCC business. For example, the Banner system is primarily designed for course based/term based offerings and at VCC we offer a wide variety of instructional formats. We also need to determine how to maintain the current systems into next year for students already registered in courses when we move to Banner in September.

Although we are receiving help from different areas of VCC, the main effort falls on the campus Registrar's Offices. The Banner team, consisting of staff from these areas and from the Cashiers Office, works two days per week minimum on Banner activities. During that time, both Registrars' Offices are short staffed but are trying hard to keep up with the regular business of VCC. As we move towards the implementation, the Registrar's Offices at both campuses will be closed on Fridays so that staff can receive training, work out procedures and enter information such as schedules into the new system. Offices closures began on Friday, July 3 1998. The last day planned so far is August 14, 1998.

The Associate Registrars have been working with the Department Heads, Deans and Associate Deans to make sure that the impacts of new procedures are fully understood and to provide any necessary training. We are also working with departments such as Assessments and the Library to ensure that information is passed correctly between the different areas.

Government launches Youth Community Action

Premier Glen Clark announced last month that the provincial government is providing \$3.4 million for Youth Community Action—a new pilot project launched under the Premier's Youth Options BC initiative. Clark made the announcement at Kiwassa Neighbourhood House in Vancouver.

Through the program, youth will earn credit for tuition fees at BC post-secondary institutions while participating in community service around the province.

The work experience opportunities will range from a minimum 100 hours (\$800) to a maximum 300 hours (\$2,400). Neighbourhood houses, crisis centres, local museums and other non-profit agencies can design projects that will involve youth and benefit the community.

The program is delivered by a three-way partnership where sponsors, host-agencies and government work together to give youth opportunities for accessible and affordable post-secondary education.

As part of the ongoing planning process, which is currently at the stage of surveying members of the institutional and administrative areas of the College, the EIT Advisory Committee has defined a set of principles to be used in assessing the priorities for the allocation of resources to technology acquisitions. The principles, laid out below, were presented to, and accepted by, the College Wide Budget Committee during the recently completed budget process.

EIT Principles of allocation—May 1998

- Priority will be given to requests which endeavour to resolve an inability to continue delivery of programs or services.
- Priorities need to be given to infrastruc-

- ture initiatives which will provide institutional efficiencies.
- PC hardware will be configured relative to the software requirements of the request.
- Reassignment and recycling of PC hardware will be based on the software needs of the area and on an evaluation of current resources.
- Opportunities for shared use will be pursued over opportunities for single use.
- Buying and leasing options will be considered for all hardware acquisitions.
- Whenever possible, hardware and software standards will be followed.

The Centre for Curriculum, Transfer and Technology recently solicited proposals for the 1998/99 Locally Initiated Curriculum (LIC) projects. VCC submitted three proposals:

- 1) Social Cultural Competencies Curriculum for Health Sciences Programs (submitted by Pat Hartley, Associate Dean of Health Sciences Programs and Hilary Pearson, Department Head, Counselling)
- 2) Fundamental Level Computer Skills -Instructor's Guide and Student Learning Guide (submitted by Vicky Hallet, Department Head, Basic Education Department and John Marshall, De-

- partment Head, Business and Compu-
- 3) Development and implementation of a distance education program for the Non-Profit Management Certificate Program (submitted by Bonnie Denford-Nelson, Program Coordinator, Continuing Education)

We have just received confirmation from Ministry personnel that \$250,000 is available this year for funding of Locally Initiated Curriculum Development projects. The LIC Review Committee met earlier this spring and reviewed 54 proposals totaling approximately \$640,000 in

requests. Many of the selected projects were approved at budget amounts less than requested.

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Counsellors'

VCC's Student Advocate Program, a peer support program developed and supervised by counsellors, is now in its thirteenth year at KEC. Each year the Counselling Department selects about 25 students from a variety of cultural backgrounds and trains them in basic communication, problem solving, and community referral skills. They also receive some interpretation training from MOSAIC. Cross cultural awareness is an integral part of the Program. Students who complete the training are hired by the College to work with other students by assisting with interpretation, registration, accessing information about the College and government/community agencies and/ or personal support.

The support of a Student Advocate can make returning to school after many years seem less overwhelming. Student Advocates can reduce the isolation felt by many

newcomers to Canada by assisting students who have language barriers or are challenged by cultural transition.

If English is their second language, applicants must be at the Advanced level or higher. For first language students, English must be at Grade 8 or higher. Any KEC students interested in helping other students are encouraged to apply.

The Student Advocate Program trains an additional five students who wish to tutor other students. They are given specific instruction in tutoring techniques by the Learning Resource Centre staff. Students who have an academic background in English, mathematics and all the sciences are encouraged to apply for these positions.

Applications for the Student Advocate Program are available from the Counselling Department Receptionist. Interviews are conducted during the last two weeks of September. Students interested are encouraged to apply early.
