Beginning the conversation: about a code of ethics for VCC employees

Ethics is the study of standards of right and wrong and/or formal or professional rules of right and wrong.

On September 25 the conversation about a Code of Ethics for VCC employees was moved one step further through a workshop facilitated by Dr. Ed Kramer and Joan McArthur-Blair. This workshop came about as a result of conversations in various constituent groups about the desire for a code of ethics.

Dr. Kramer, Registrar for the College of Psychologists, provided the foundation for the discussion with a session on codes of conduct. One of the first distinctions he made was the difference between a code of ethics and a code of conduct.

A code of ethics is aspirational in that the ethics described in it are not always measurable. A code of conduct has within it behavioural and measurable standards of competency and standards of action with or toward other people.

In Dr. Kramer's view, a good code of conduct should:

- use behavioural language
- set minimum requirements
- not be aspirational
- follow no particular model of thought

- be compulsory and explicit
- be simple in construction

Dr. Kramer went on to discuss the need for a code to have a clear process for adjudication.

After Dr. Kramer's talk, Joan McArthur-Blair facilitated a workshop on examining having a code of conduct and/or code of ethics at VCC. One of the first questions the workshop tried to answer was "who would be bound by a code of ethics?"

It was suggested by the group in attendance that although the conversation had started about a code of ethics for faculty, a code of ethics for all VCC employees was also desirable. The workshop proceeded through the day with an examination of aspirational codes of ethics versus codes of conduct, writing guiding principles for a code of ethics, experiments in writing values and ethical principles into codes of conduct, who will carry this work forward, how will the ideas be communicated, and how will staff, faculty and administrators be included in the process.

The day ended with the formation of an adhoc group, some from earlier conversations and others from the

Rust proofing: worth the cost?

Q: I'm buying a new car, and the dealer wants \$600-\$800 to rust-proof it. Should I pay the extras?

A: We would advise against it.

Most dealerships sublet the work out for approximately \$100-\$125. The remainder is split between the dealer and the salesperson. However, corrosion protection is important.

Corrosion in the past has been mainly a cosmetic concern because of the heavy load-bearing frames. With the advent of the unicycle, car body panels are no longer just cosmetic sheet metal. They are now part of the structural integrity of the vehicle. This means rust is no longer just an eye-sore but a serious safety concern affecting steering, drive ability and the safety of its passengers.

There are other corrosion concerns today that were not as prevalent in years past, such as acid rain. The auto manufacturers are increasing their corrosion protection measures all the time.

Homophobia and heterosexism poster competition

Make VCC's campuses safe for everyone, and help the VCC community learn more about homophobia and heterosexism by designing a poster. You could win one of three prizes: \$200 1st prize, \$100 2nd prize and \$50 3rd prize. Competition is open to all VCC students and employees.

Posters will be judged on visual impact and relevance to the topic. Posters should be no smaller than 11 X 17 inches.

New processes and methods, including the use of coated steels, zinc rich primers, and more durable primers and paints, have made it possible for modern cars to survive corrosive forces for longer periods than before.

This has allowed the manufacturers to increase their warranties for up to ten years. Most countries have laws that set out a minimum standard and length of time for corrosion prevention.

In Canada, the automobile's structural parts must remain rust-free for five years.

If you are concerned about corrosion, check the manufacturer's recommendations as *some manufacturers will nullify the warranty if the car is undercoated*.

A little research will help to protect your sizeable investment.

The students and instructors in this program have very good systems in place for accessing printed publications such as Connections (they receive a copy on disk), and of course they receive the recorded announcements on voice mail like everyone else.

The types of announcement or notice that they have difficulty accessing are the printed notices posted on bulletin boards and in elevators.

To ensure that the instructors and students in this program aren't excluded from receiving your printed messages, please leave your information on voice mail for Betty Noble, Visually Impaired Program Coordinator, local 7339. Betty will in turn provide the information to the other instructors and students.

Most notices that are posted in the elevators at KEC are approved by Bill Miller, so he has agreed to inform Betty of the notices he receives. Your assistance in communicating the other announcements to Betty would be greatly appreciated.
