Bert Wales, VCC's founding CEO, passes away

Bert Wales, founding CEO of VCC, passed away peacefully in Vancouver on October 17, 1998, at the age of 94 years.

Bert started his career in public education in the mid twenties as a public school teacher and administrator. He served as the Vancouver School Board Superintendent of Adult Education in the fifties and sixties, during which time BC became Canada's most respected provider of public adult education programs. He championed the cause of freely available learning opportunities for all adults, by promoting school district sponsored adult education throughout the province and by strongly supporting the development of current colleges and institutes. The work of VVI led to the national BTSD Adult Basic Education program that was the basis for all adult basic education programs in

Canada today. Similarly, English as a Second Language programs were given status and professional leadership in the Vancouver system, providing an example to other major population centres long before the advent of colleges.

Bert led three task forces in the late 50's which skillfully persuaded the Department of Education to implement the (then) revolutionary Adult Interrupted Program for High School Completion, forerunner of the current Dogwood Certificate and other equivalency programs.

In the early 60s, in recognition of Bert's convincing presentations on the growing need for formal post secondary education, the VSB created the King Edward Adult Centre at the old King Edward High School and offered the first community college programs in the province, without the benefit of legislation. In 1965, this led to the government recognizing District and Regional colleges under the Schools Act, with Vancouver Community College, as it became, as the first and only District College. Throughout, Bert contributed technical and

professional support. He was a firm believer in an integrated delivery of programs within the educational system and oversaw the integration of the King Edward program with the Vancouver Vocational Institute and the Vancouver School of Art.

Bert Wales was the first British Columbian to be awarded a doctorate in Adult Education (University of Oregon). He served as President of the Canadian Association for Adult Education in the mid 60's and was one of the early supporters of the B.C. Association of Colleges, now known as the Advanced Education Council of B.C. Bert is an acknowledged leader in the field of adult education in this province and a key player in the development of B.C.'s current post secondary education system. More importantly, we are directly indebted to Bert Wales for the VCC heritage.

Persian dance to benefit Cityfest '99 and Atash dance group

New Traditions, an evening of dance featuring original choreographies, colourful costumes and an exciting blend of techniques from the West and Persia, will be performed by Atash Dance Group on Saturday, February 6 at 7:00 p.m. in the auditorium at King Edward Campus.

The performance celebrates building new traditions for the Iranian-Canadian community by adapting the styles of folk dance and creating new meanings that relate to today. Dances include Helheleh, a name associated with women's voice in Persian culture, and Variations on Kurdi Dancing, which combines traditional Kurdish steps with Ballet.

"In our dances you will find many elements of ballet, modern and jazz techniques," says Artistic Director and Choreographer Mojdeh Shahriari. "We celebrate the traditions that are in motion, that are being redefined by the people who live them."

Proceeds from New Traditions will benefit both CityFest '99 and Atash Dance Group. Atash Dance Group is the only Persian dance group in North America that specializes in combining dance styles from the West and East.

CityFest '99, Vancouver's free intercultural performing arts festival, will take place on the Victoria Day long weekend May 21-23, 1999 at King Edward Campus. Hundreds of performers from more than 30 cultural groups are expected to share their music, dance, songs and stories. This free event is organized by the Vancouver Community Festival Society (VCFS), a registered non-profit charity, and VCC.

January 1999: the Program Development department celebrates 20 years

In January 1979, with support from the B.C. Ministry of Education, the Program Development department was created at VCC's City Centre Campus (known then as Vancouver Vocational Institute, VVI). Nine people were hired or seconded from other departments—six faculty and three staff. Our original offices were in the space now used by the Baking Program. From its inception, the department's mandate has been to provide curriculum and staff development support to both VCC and all BC colleges and institutes.

The major curriculum work begun in 1979 was the development of Program Content Guides (PCG) for every VCC program. This was the first time that VCC curriculum had been documented in a systematic way. The major staff development work begun at that time was the Instructional Skills workshop (ISW). The VCC Annual Report of 1979-80 states: "Beginning in January 1979, a program of ISWs has been offered to all instructors. Ten ISWs have been given to date [ie., March 1979] and the Instructional Skills Workshop Program has now received complete articulation with ID101 [of the Instructor Diploma (ID) Program based at UB.C.]."

The VCC Annual Report of 1979-80 indicates that by March 1980 eighteen ISWs had been conducted for VCC faculty, with nearly one hundred participants. The first Facilitator Training Workshops for the ISW had been conducted at VCC, training people to conduct the ISW at all B.C. colleges and institutes. Some of you who were involved may be reading this now. By March 1980, several PCGs had been developed and by the early 1980s PCGs had been completed for every one of VCC's over eighty Programs.

During the early 1980s, PDD developed the VCC Instructor Training Program, comprising six 30-hour courses. In the mid 1980s, when UBC gave up the ID Program, both it along with VCC's IT Program were brought together to form the Provincial Instructor Diploma Program (PIDP), now based in PDD.

In the early 1990s, PDD moved to KEC. Today, over 2,000 people are taking courses in the PIDP and the VCC Adult Education Diploma Programs. These programs articulate with several degree programs; for example, the University of Alberta B.Ed. program, UCFV's BA program, and SFU's M.Ed. and B.G.S. programs. PDD faculty have been involved in development projects around the world, including Eastern Europe, Africa, the Middle East, countries of the sub-continent and east Asia, South and Central America, Mexico, and the United States.

During our twenty years, six people have served as department head: Ken Wheeler, David Tickner (acting), Karl Gregg, Brian Dwyer, Bob Aitken and Joan MacArthur-Blair. Today, Sally Gibson is acting department head.



Can I put a hold on News

If you think you might need a video for more than three days, it is often more convenient to reserve the video at the Media Desk. That way, you can keep and use the video for a longer period of time and not have to worry about renewals.


