March 25 Board Public Session: your chance to provide input on the search for VCC's new president

The President's Selection Advisory Committee, which met for the first time on March 11, is a representative group whose role is to identify the process and participants by which a new president will be selected.

In order to outline a selection process, the Committee must first develop a

presidential profile, with college community input. The first opportunity to provide input into the development of a presidential profile will be the Public Forum Session at 5:00 p.m. on March 25.

Everyone is invited to come and provide ideas on the kind of president they want for VCC. Oral presentations should be limited to one minute. Longer written submissions can be sent to the Executive office or handed in at the meeting. There will be other opportunities to provide input to this important process.

International Education Annual Report for the 1998/99 Academic Year

Overview

1997/98 was a period marked by program changes and economic uncertainty in most of VCC's target markets.

Overall international enrolments declined by 11.5 percent over the previous year. Expecting a decline in enrolments from Asia, IE placed greater emphasis on student recruitment in Latin America. This strategy partially offset the declining enrolments and created a more diverse student population, which had

a positive impact on marketing VCC as an internationalized institution.

The introduction of the two-month semester for ELS programs and the development of English 101/102, English for Business and English for Tourism were designed to reposition VCC in the international education market and meet increased competition from private language schools and public institutions offering university transfer and/or un-

dergraduate degree programs. Based on the results to date it appears that these changes were timely and allowed the College to compete more effectively in the international marketplace.

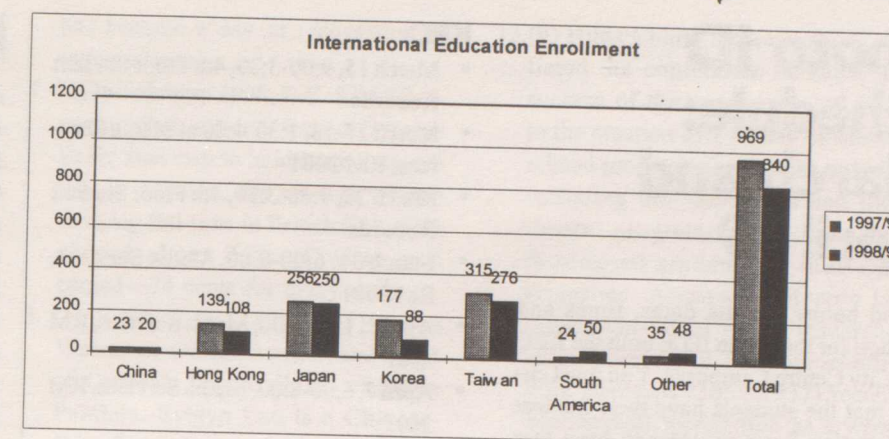
Recent efforts to pursue niche markets are also paying off. The TESOL program offered by Continuing Education, the Summer English Program offered by the ESL Department and several group programs offered in cooperation with foreign colleges and universities are attracting more students to VCC. It is important to note that the additional 135 enrolments generated by these initiatives are not reflected in the attached statistics.

Group Programs

Custom designed programs ranging from three to four weeks attracted student groups from Greenland, Japan and Thailand. These programs usually combine language instruction with recreational, cultural and social activities. They continuously challenge the flexibility of VCC's infrastructure and the ingenuity of instructors but generate repeat business and turn almost all of the participating students into goodwill ambassadors for VCC.

Contracts

Several contracts provided additional revenue to VCC as well as professional



development opportunities for faculty and faculty/student exchanges. Last year the four largest and most significant contracts were:

Kansai College: This contract is now in its sixth year and continues to generate significant revenues for VCC. Last year Kansai College sent 27 students to VCC for 9 months to study ESL. Under the terms of the contract VCC sent two ESL instructors to Osaka, Japan, for 10 days to prepare the next group of students for their studies at VCC.

Train the Trainer: The primary purpose of this contract is to test the feasibility of offering several components of the Provincial Instructor Diploma Program in Latin America. Last year PDD translated and successfully delivered ID101 in cooperation with the Universidad Autonoma de Guadalajara.

This year's plans are to repeat and expand the course offerings.

ACCC Women in Enterprise Management China: This four-year project is now in its last year. Last year it generated almost \$84,800 in gross revenue and provided professional development opportunities in China for three faculty members. VCC also sent two students from the Traffic, Customs and Transportation Program to China for a period of seven weeks and hosted four Chinese professors and a delegation of seven university and college presidents and vice-presidents.

North American Mobility Program: This three year contract facilitates the exchange of sixty Hospitality Management students between 6 institutions in Canada, Mexico and the United States. Exchanges range between one and four months and focus on academic or language study. Last year VCC received three students each from the United States and Mexico. Next year VCC will send seven students to Mexico and four to the United States.

Promotional Activities

The promotional activities undertaken in 1998/99 included participation in education fairs in Hong Kong, Japan, Columbia, Brazil, Mexico and Germany, visits by administrators and faculty to several Colleges and Universities in Japan, Mexico and China, the systematic and sustained placement of advertise-

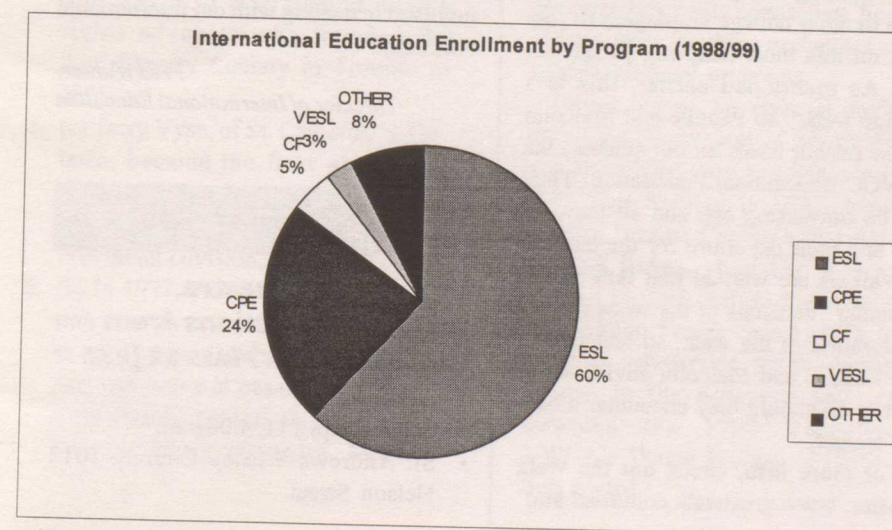

ments in the domestic ethnic press and foreign publications, web sites and CD ROMs distributed internationally by the Canadian Government. IE also installed an enquiry line which provides information in Mandarin, Cantonese, Japanese, Spanish and Portuguese, and enhanced its web site to allow prospective students to request information and ask questions by e-mail.

New Initiatives

Some of the revenue generated by IE was reinvested to develop new programs and institutional linkages. These initiatives included the development of:

- the first year university English courses (English 101 and 102)
- the Applied Design Program for international students
- the TESOL program web site
- promotional materials in Portuguese to recruit students in Brazil
- institutional linkages to deliver parts of the CPE/HSC programs in China

Although somewhat buffeted by the economic downturn in Asia, IE was able to compete effectively in the international marketplace. This of course was largely due to the support received from the Vice-Presidents and Deans, the goodwill of faculty and staff and, last but not least, the hard work of everyone involved in dealing with our international students.

ANSWERS

- (a) 58. There are 343 men, two horses and two boats. Among the 405 athletes, 40 are from British Columbia. Canada's Sports Hall of Fame was established in 1955 to preserve the record of Canadian sports achievements and to promote a greater awareness of our nation's heritage of sport.
- (b) 1979. The Convention, an international bill of rights for women, acknowledges that women's rights were previously not guaranteed protection under existing human rights standards and mechanisms. The Convention requires participants to eliminate discrimination against women in the enjoyment of all civil, political, economic and cultural rights.
- (b) 1919, the Canadian Federation of University Women (CFUW) was founded as a voluntary, non-partisan, non-profit, self-funded bilingual organization. The CFUW currently has 10,000 women university graduates in 130 clubs throughout Canada.
- (c) Journalism. Mary Shadd Cary (1823-1893) was the first black newspaperwoman in North America. She edited the Toronto-based *Provincial Freeman*—a newspaper dedicated to publicizing the plight of Black people in Canada—until 1858. She was also a dedicated human rights advocate who founded the Anti-Slavery Society in Toronto in 1851.
- (c) Terry Vyse, of St. Catherine's, Ontario, became the **first aboriginal woman judge** in Canada when she was appointed to the Ontario Court, Provincial Division, in 1991.
- (b) In 1977, a United Nations resolution was passed calling for countries to celebrate a day for women's rights and international peace. With its origins firmly rooted in turn of the century labour struggles, March 8 has become a day of recognition in many countries.
- (a) In February 1998, B.C. STATS reported that women were 1/3 more likely than men to hold more than one job. In addition, the average women working full-time in British Columbia earned about 74% of what men earned—74 cents for every dollar.
- (c) Emily Carr (1871-1945) was a Westcoast artist and writer, and a part of Canada's famous Group of Seven Painters. Evelyn Lau is a Chinese-Canadian writer and Shani Mootoo is an Indo-Trinidadian Canadian visual artist and writer.
- (a) In June 1985, women with disabilities from across Canada gathered to form DAWN Canada. This was the first time women with disabilities—approximately 16% of Canadian women—had received funding to organize and come together to deal solely with issues facing women with disabilities. From this meeting, local and provincial DAWN groups were developed throughout Canada.
- (d) All of the above. Women's centres are community based centres where women can get information and support. While no two centres are alike, services offered typically include: information and referral, support groups, advocacy, public education, job entry programs, child care services, crisis counseling, housing registries, clothing exchanges and subsidized meal programs.
- (a) Reva Joshee, an assistant professor in the Department of Educational studies at UBC, was appointed to the B.C. Law Society in 1997. Marka Omatsu became Canada's first Asian woman judge when she was appointed in 1993. Aliyah Rahemtullah won Simon Fraser University's top entrance scholarship for the highest grades in the province and was awarded the 1997 Vancouver YWCA's Young Woman of Distinction Award.

- (b) Hilda Ching, a parasitologist, initiated the conference in 1983. The success of the conference led Ching to the creation of a variety of science-related programs for women and girls, including the "Scientists and Innovators" programs in schools which introduced students to individual scientists. Alexandra Morton is a Vancouver-based whale researcher, artist, author and environmentalist. Julia Henshaw (1869-1937) reached international recognition as a writer, lecturer and botanist and explorer and mapped central Vancouver Island.
- (d) All of the above. Mary Ellen Smith (1861-1933) was not only B.C.'s first female MLA (elected in 1918), she was also the first woman cabinet minister in the British Empire. The 1920's were a decade of social legislation and Smith was at the forefront. She was instrumental in the passing of the Female Minimum Wage Bill (drafted in 1918), the Act of Registration of Nurses, which served to legitimize the nursing profession, and the Juvenile Court Act, which served to allow the appointment of women judges in Juvenile Court.

Background: VCC was part of the college beverage consortium which implemented several exclusive carbonated beverage agreements. After careful consideration, VCC decided it would enter into an agreement on its own in order to take into consideration the specific needs of the College.

In October of 1998, a process for developing a request for proposal was initiated. The proposed process was presented at the November 23, 1998 sponsorship committee meeting and the January 1999 Operations Council meeting.

Two campus forums have been scheduled for March 24 to present the

proposed process and to entertain questions from the College community. The forums will be held at 11:00 a.m. in Room 5025 (KEC) and again at 1:30 p.m. in the Faculty Lounge (CC).

Based on College needs a request for proposal will be sent out to the potential bidders and their responses will be evaluated by the carbonated beverage committee. The committee comprises:

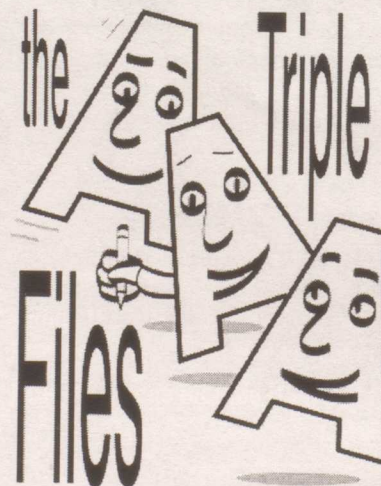
