VCC opens new space at The Architecture Centre, 440 Cambie Street

On Thursday, October 7, from 3:00-5:00 p.m. Vancouver Community College will celebrate the official opening of its new space at the Architecture Centre, 440 Cambie with a ribbon-cutting ceremony and Open House. All VCC faculty and staff are invited to invited.

Elder Bob George from the Burrard Nation will perform the blessing, and students of the VCC Music Department will provide entertainment.

Designed by Rositch Hemphill and Associates Architects, VCC's newest downtown space houses the College's new Applied Design Certificate Program, which began its inaugural class on September 20. The downtown offices of the College and Career Access Department

and VCC Assessment Centre, are also housed at 440 Cambie. The renowned Fashion Arts Certificate Program will move to the new location in the near future.

Built over 86 years ago, The Architecture Centre at 440 Cambie is an impressive example of the Edwardian Renaissance Revival Style, and has been designated a Heritage "B" building by the City of Vancouver.

Formerly known as the Edgett Building, it is one of the oldest structures overlooking one of the oldest public spaces in Vancouver. This Victory Square landmark witnessed the introduction of the automobile and the Second World War victory celebration.

B.C. government announces student loan interest relief

On September 25 the Advanced Education Minister Andrew Petter announced a new student loan interest relief program. Former students who qualify for interest relief will have monthly payments on their B.C. student loans suspended for a period of six months. The B.C. government pays the accruing

monthly interest on their loans during this time.

The program will cost \$5.1 million annually, and is expected to benefit nearly 9,000 students each year. On average, interest relief will make an extra \$600 available to students during each six-month defferal period.

Flu vaccine: when will it be available?

The Health Department will provide us with flu vaccine during the last week of October. It will not be available to any medical office before then. They recommend that we do not start giving flu vaccine until November 1. We will advertise further about how people can arrange for their shot closer to the time.

It is too early to give the vaccine in September/October. Immunity would weaken before the end of the flu season, which does not start until late fall. If you choose to have your shot this early, you should at least check that what you are being given is the 1999/2000 vaccine.

Board meeting of Sept. 23, 1999

After a two month hiatus, a Board meeting was held on September 23 at City Centre Campus. The Board decided that for a trial period over the next six months, Board meetings will begin at 5:30 p.m. The next Board meeting will be a community Board meeting.

After a successful meeting at the Aboriginal Friendship Centre last October, a second VCC Board meeting is planned for that location next month. The Community Alliance Committee decided that the First Nations community would be a priority for a second year.


Where are the food boxes?

Interpreting and Braille Services holds orientation

On Tuesday, September 22, the Interpreting and Braille Services (IBS) department hosted an orientation evening for Deaf, Deaf-Blind and hard-of-hearing students at VCC. As you may already know, the IBS department has experienced a substantial growth spurt this semester to accommodate the increased enrolment of students requiring interpreting services.

The orientation gave both new and returning students a chance to meet the interpreting team and find out more about our department. During the evening, each interpreter spoke briefly about various aspects of the interpreter's role. Emphasis was placed on how the student and interpreter(s) can work together to achieve an interpretation that is clear, accurate and meets the specific communication needs of each individual student.

Topics of discussion included: What are the student's responsibilities? Who do we interpret for? Not just the Deaf, Deaf-Blind or hard-of-hearing consumer, Teaming: Why, in some cases, two interpreters are better than one, Why interpreters often wear dark clothing, and Doing the reading: How interpreters prepare for class. Watch for more on these topics in upcoming articles.

Ellie Casey, an interpreter in the IBS department, talked about the benefits of accepting practicum students from the Program of Sign Language Interpretation at Douglas College. A Deaf student talked about his positive experiences with practicum students, and a former Douglas College student, now working at VCC, spoke about the valuable learning experiences she had while on practicum at the college.

All in all, it was a successful evening and the IBS staff members were able to address many of the students' questions and concerns.

IBS would like to thank Linda Martin for taking the time out of her busy schedule to drop by, meet the students and show her support for the IBS department. Efforts such as this show the students that the faculty and staff are all working with them on their road to success.

One of the best ways to make the Deaf, Deaf-Blind and hard-of-hearing students' time at VCC educational and enjoyable is to be aware of the issues surrounding deafness and the interpreting process. For this reason, the IBS department hopes to submit articles to Connections on a regular basis. We hope that you will take the time to read the articles so we can work together to promote awareness and student success at VCC.
