Abbotsford residents win Truck Lottery '99 grand prize

Mike Rogers and Bob Tarling of Abbotsford have won the grand prize in this year's VCC Foundation Truck Lottery. The winning ticket number was Series Two #175. Mike and Bob own Pro Fire, manufacturers of fire trucks.

The second prize, a Harley Davidson Softail Classic motorcycle, was won by Doug Rama of Coquitlam, who held ticket number Series Two #1396.

Jack White of Winfield won the trip to Mexico in the Early Bird draw, with ticket number Series Two #076.

This year's lottery also set a new record for sales: 3497 tickets sold of 4000 available. The most tickets ever sold previoulsy was 2400.

VCC Board member honoured by Queen's University

The Hon. Mary Collins, a member of the VCC Board of Governors, became the first graduate from B.C. to receive an Alumni Achievement Award from The Alumni Association of Queen's University.

A recent issue of the Vancouver Board of Trade's Sounding Board magazine wrote that "... the 1999 award is described as a tribute to Collins' 'selfless contribution and commitment to Canada and to Queen's University.'

"Collin's involvement with Queen's spans 30 years. A member of Arts '61 at Queen's, she now serves on the Board of Trustees after being re-elected in 1994, following a previous term from 1974 to 1986. Collins began her career with the Government of Ontario, serving in posts including Executive Officer, Minister of Health and Executive Officer, Premier of Ontario and Cabinet Office.

"Leaving public service, she was elected as Member of Parliament for Capilano-Howe Sound. Her cabinet portfolios included Minister of State (Environment) and Minister of Health and Seniors, and she became the first woman to hold the position of Associate Minister of Defense.

"She now provides consulting services and plays an active role on numerous corporate and not-for-profit boards, including Director of Canadian Blood Services, Vancouver Community College and the Women Business Owners of Canada."

Email etiquette: When to reply to everyone and when not to . . . consider who needs to know

Have you ever received an email request to attend a meeting, and noticed that the same message was copied to numerous other colleagues? Before you quickly type off a reply and hit "send," think about whether your reply needs to go to every recipient of the original request. In many cases, only the sender of the original message needs your reply.

Many of us receive emails that we don't actually need to see. If you don't

think everyone on the recipient or CC list needs to know whether you can, for example, attend a 3:00 meeting two weeks from now, then only send your reply back to the sender.

In Groupwise, when you hit "reply," you are automatically asked whether you wish to send your reply to "sender" or "all" (sender and recipients). If only the sender needs to receive your reply,

check the appropriate box. If you are using KEA (Pine), you are also asked the same question. Again, send your reply only to the person who needs to see it.

By being conscientious about the use of email, you'll be more efficient. And, everyone else will save valuable time by not needing to read unnecessary messages.

In his own words . .

Graduation October 1999 Valedictory address (Academic/ASE/ABE division)

Good evening. I am very proud to be speaking before you.

It is indeed a special moment in life that we can see our accomplishments. Tonight is one of these moments.

I look before me and see students graduating, including myself. It is a proud moment.

I left high school at a very young age. At the time in my life I was living in a dysfunctional family and introducing myself to the life of recreational drugs.

I believed I could do all right. I did do all right. That's about it. I was not after jobs that I was good at or wanted, I was after jobs that I can get. There's a big difference.

I ened up living a life of lies on my job applications. I lost all my pride in applying for work. Education was a requirement. I did not have it. I never did receive the jobs that I wanted.

I lived many years like this.

I started to respect myself in 1988. I decided to change. Certain practices would have to stop, including drug use. If I may give anyone my personal experience that drugs and growth do no mix. Drugs and education do not mix. Drugs and motivation do not mix, drugs and success do not mix. Finally, drugs and self-love do not mix.

While looking for work, I was feeling great. I decided I wanted an accomplishment while looking for work. I decided to go to Vancouver Community College and enrol in the College and Career Access Structured GED program.

I thought this was a great idea. No time wasted.

I started to receive job offers while still in classes. Now I had to make a decision. It was easy. I knew that the education was the priority. After sitting

in the classes, I realized that this is what it's about out there. Education. If I did not finish this, I would be back.

It came to me that education is a quality of life. Education is about living a life you enjoy. Doing things you are good at and improving on that. Doing what you want to do, not what you have to do. Education is self-satisfaction.

I ended up taking jobs that revolved around the classes.

Today we graduate. What's next? We can get into just about any college course. Now we have options, career choices, and excitement. We have built the foundation for our future. I challenge all of you, including myself, to challenge this future. To take the next step. We can continue our education. We can continue to enjoy our lives.

I had a neighbour in Toronto who was 85 years old. He told me about living in the 1800's as it was told to him. You could sit on the porch your whole life and

watch the horse and buggy go by. He continued to explain how different the 1900's were (I can almost say that completely). He referred to this century as the greatest generation. He sat on his porch and watched the horse and buggy turn into the space shuttle. And that was over 18 years ago.

Today the world will pass right by you if you sit on the porch. The technology, science and education is here. It began with no end or speed limit. We are now in the generations of life long learning.

I would like to thank Vancouver Community College for an eve-opening experience. I would like to thank Jim Peacock, Michelle Fisher and Gary Lawrence for their instruction and support. It was dynamic. I would also like to thank my friends the Nasadyks, Miguel and Da, for their support.

Use of Drugs or Other Medication and Alcohol Policy

Effective Date: September 14, 1999 Policy Category: Personnel

Number: B.2.15

Purpose

To protect all members of the VCC community from health and safety risks that could arise from the use of alcohol, drugs or other medication while at the College or on College related activities.

Policy

- Possession of illegal drugs while on College property or while attending College functions is prohibited.
- Except where specifically authorized in advance by a supervisor, consumption of alcohol by employees while on duty is not permitted.*
- In any case, VCC prohibits the use of alcohol, drugs or medications by all VCC employees and students if such use:
 - a) poses a potential risk to the health and safety of VCC employees, students, or others;
 - b) is disruptive to, or negatively affects, the learning environment.
 - c) affects the behaviour or functioning of the employee or student.

Applies to

All VCC employees and students.

Procedures

1. Any employee who observes another employee who appears to be impaired by the use of alcohol, drugs or medication, and whose behaviour could pose a risk to the health or safety of that employee or any other person

has a duty to report this behaviour to his or her direct supervisor, or to the Director of Human Resources.

- a) the Supervisor must notify the Director of Human Resources or other available Senior Administrator immediately.
- b) the Senior Administrator and the Supervisor will speak to the employee who has been identified and determine the appropriate action to be taken, if any. In the case of a VCCFA or CUPE employee, a shop steward may be asked to attend the meeting.
- 2. Students who attend the College or College sponsored activities who appear to be impaired by drugs or alcohol and who appear to be unable to function safely, or are disrupting the learning environment, will be escorted from the College premises or activity and sent home by alternate transportation if it is unsafe to drive, and may be subject to discipline.
- 3. Employees who attend College premises or College related activities when they appear to be impaired by drugs or alcohol will be escorted from the College premises or activity, and sent home by alternate transportation, and may be subject to discipline.
- 4. Employees who are required to take a medication that may affect their judgment or ability to function safely must advise their supervisor of this fact. A physician's note will be required to confirm ability to function safely

- in the work environment.
- 5. If in the opinion of the physician, the use of medication poses a possible safety hazard to any employee or student, the employee will be removed from his or her regular job. If alternate employment is available or modifications can be made to the work so the employee is able to perform work safely, the College will attempt to provide such alternate or modified work. If no alternate or modified work is available the employee will not be allowed to attend work.
- *It is recognized that in accordance with this policy, there will be College sanctioned events or special circumstances where alcohol may be permitted in moderation with the appropriate permission and/or licensing. It is also recognized that certain business/social engagements to be attended as a part of expected duty may include the use of alcohol.

Consuming alcohol must always be complementary or secondary to the event and not the primary focus for the employee and consumption in these cases must be limited so that no impairment results.
