
## WHAT IS WHMIS??

#### **COUNCIL NEWS**

The joint Academic and Administrative Councils have recently discussed the following items:



- The Instructor Performance Appraisal process is ongoing, Brian Dwyer has now talked with most of the departments on the methods they will be implementing. It is hoped that by the end of August all systems will have been approved by the Performance Appraisal Committee and implementation will have started.
- The Terms of Reference for the Academic Council were reviewed, and some modifications were made.
- The College Board has approved an immediate average increase of vocational part-time fees to \$3.00 per student contact hours. John Vandenakker received approval from the

Councils to formulate an graduated system of tuition fees for City Centre.



The Operating Capital budget has now been approved by the College Executive Committee. Each campus will received \$280,000 (of

which 10% - \$30,000 will be set aside for emergencies.) The remaining \$250,000 will be divided among the four campus divisions and administration.
