## City Centre Done Good -- \$9,600 Worth of Good! United Way Campaign Wrap-up

The 1991 City Centre workplace campaign for the United Way exceeded the campaign committee's goal by \$2,000, easily surpassing the previous record for donations at this campus in 1988 of \$7,500. This year's campaign netted an astounding \$9,605.04 as well as a participation rate of 40% of the employee group. This figure represents 44% of the total goal for the entire College of \$22,000. The George Clark Care & Share Fund netted \$885.00 that will be matched by the VCC Educational Foundation for a total of \$1770.00.

This year's campaign strategy concentrated on participation rather than special events. The idea was to encourage participation and carry out an awareness raising campaign that valued any kind of involvement from donations to volunteered labour. Special recognition went to **Jim Olson** as last year's campaign chairperson, without whose efforts in a particularly difficult situation the United Way would have disappeared from City Centre.

The **Pancake Breakfast** brought in \$942.00 and the "Win 50 Grey Cup Pool" netted \$129.00 the rest of the monies represents donations in cash and payroll deduction, a whopping \$8,834.04. Congratulations and many thanks to all our generous sponsors, participants and donors!

Then *Public Relations* wanted in on it. We held another meeting with them, and they suggested that



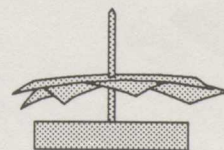
#### *Institutional*

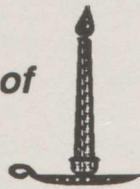

### December 6th -- National Day of Remembrance & Action on Violence Against Women



The federal government has officially declared December 6th as a National Day of Remembrance & Action on Violence Against Women to commemorate the brutal slaying of 14 women in Montreal, on Dec 6, 1989. City Centre Campus will host a display that day which include 14 candles burning throughout the day and a noontime gathering in the Mall that will include college representatives, women's groups and the student association to provide an opportunity to share thoughts and feelings on the day.

All men on campus are asked to wear white ribbons on the day to signal their opposition to violence against women and their support of the day. The ribbons will be available in each department and at a table in the Mall during the day. There will also be a thirty minute video, entitled "After the Massacre" that will be showing in a room to be announced. ### Some Facts About Violence Against Women In Canada

- \* At least one in eight women is physically, emotionally, psychologically or sexually abused each year by a husband, ex-husband or other male partner.
- \* In 1989, 119 women were murdered by current or former husbands or partners. Spousal murder accounts for 62% of murders of women in Canada

- \* Every 17 minutes, a sexual assault involving forced sexual intercourse is committed in Canada; 90% of victims are female.
- \* One in four women will be sexually assaulted at some time in her life, half before the age of 17.
- \* At least 50% of women are afraid to walk on their own city streets at night unaccompanied.

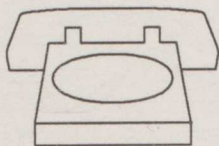

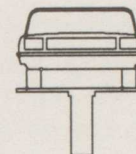

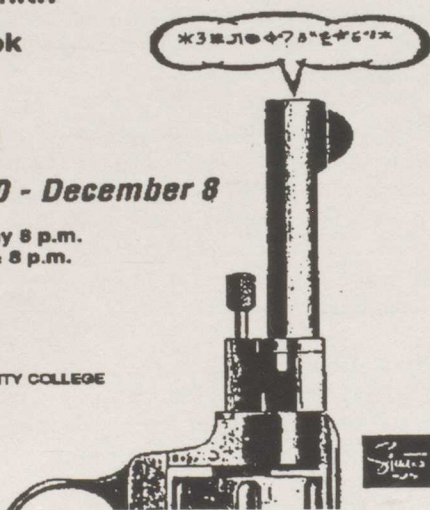

### Harassment Policy & Procedures

Since November 1990, VCC has had a Harassment policy covering students, staff, faculty and administrators, the result of several years of hard work. This policy concerns behaviour that is discriminatory. This would include prejudices based on discrimination against race, national or ethnic origin, colour, religion, union or association membership, age, sex, sexual orientation, marital status, family status, political belief, disability or conviction of a criminal offence and objectionable behaviour - verbal, physical or by innuendo.

The Committee on Harassment has been meeting regularly over the past year in an attempt to approve a set of procedures to deal with harassment cases arising on VCC campuses. The Procedures have now, in principle, been approved to aid in resolution of incidents that arise. The Committee has also been lobbying long and hard to secure a position for an Advisor on harassment. We are happy to report that at a recent meeting Ross Carter announced that funds would be made
