

Last year was a very lean year with only \$3,552 in donation and only 4% participation. But considering the labour disputes we were lucky to see even this level of participation and involvement. In comparison, 1989 brought in \$6,756 and 10% participation.

This year's goal is to better 1989's donations and boost participation to 20%. What will make the difference? 


