### TAPED BOOKS

Several organizations produce taped books for students with disabilities, including '*Recording for the Blind*' in the USA and the '*Crane Library*'




at UBC. Requests are filtered through an organization called the "College and Institute Library Services Clearing House" which has an office at the Langara Campus of VCC. In order to be eligible for taped books, a student must either be visually impaired or have a learning disability. Students with a learning disability are required to provide proof that an assessment has been done and a specific learning

disability diagnosed. The procedure for accessing taped books at City Centre follows:

- Students need to contact <u>Services for</u> <u>Students with Disabilities</u> in the Counselling Department as far in advance of their start date as possible. Copyright permission is not always readily available and can take up to 6 months to obtain. Production of tapes cannot proceed without written permission from the publisher.
- The student will be given an application for service to complete. Verification of disability <u>must be</u> included.
- 3. <u>Services for Students with Disabilities</u> will then liaise with the Department Head to determine what texts will be required. An order will then be initiated with Langara.
- 4. If the relevant text is already on tape, it will take approximately 3-4 weeks to process. If the text is not available, the wait can be significant.

The conference will also feature the AGM for the ASE network of B.C.



## **RECIPE OF THE DAY**

For those who enjoyed the peanut butter oatmeal cookies at the dental department coffee party, here it is by popular demand!!



1½ cups ½ cup 3/4 cup 2/3 cup 2 1½ tsp 1 cup 1 cup	(350 ml) (125 ml) (175 ml) (150 ml) (2) (7 ml) (225 ml) (250 ml) (2 ml)	peanut butter (crunchy or smooth) butter or margarine, softened sugar packed brown sugar eggs vanilla rolled oats all purpose flour baking soda
1 cup ½ tsp	(250 ml) (2 ml)	all purpose flour baking soda
1 cup	(250 ml)	raisins (optional)

- In mixing bowl, cream peanut butter and butter. Gradually beat in sugars. Blend in eggs and vanilla.
- Combine oats, flour and baking soda. Lightly blend into creamed mixture (add raisins, if desired).
- Drop by tablespoonful onto greased cookie sheet. Bake at 350 F (180 C) for 10 to 12 minutes. Cool on baking sheet 5 minutes, transfer to rack and cool.
- Makes about 4 dozen cookies.


