Hay Fever

Over 3.75 million Canadians suffer from hay fever - and many are afflicted year-round.

There are numerous substances, found indoors and outdoors, that can act as allergens and cause allergic reactions in different people. Depending on whether the allergen is present all year or just during a particular season, the allergy it causes may be known as perennial or seasonal. Hay fever is usually seasonal if it's caused by pollinating trees, grasses or plants, but there are other possible causes of hay fever symptoms.

Seasonal hay fever occurs during the spring, summer and early fall when plants shed pollen into the air. Generally, trees pollinate in the early spring (February to April), grasses in early summer (May to July), and weeds in mid and late summer (June September). Unfortunately, the different species of grasses are closely related, so a patient who is allergic to one variety of grass is usually allergic to all varieties.

British Columbia is one of the safest areas in Canada for hay fever sufferers. Ragweeds do exist, but they are rare and their pollen count in autumn adds little to the airborne total. Ragweed is only a problem east of the Rocky Mountains. Along the coast, pollen from the narrow leaved plantain is common, while inland in the drier areas, pollen from lamb's-quarters and sages is fairly abundant, especially in late summer.

Perennial hay fever, on the other hand is a continual sensitivity to many other airborne particles commonly found in the home or workplace. These particles can also cause the typical symptoms of hay fever-sniffles, coughing, headache, poor appetite, running nose, teary and itchy eyes, uncontrollable sneezing, nasal stuffiness and a tickly throat-similar to the effects of a cold. Unlike colds, allergies don't usually cause fever, severe sore throat or swollen glands.

Hay fever, also known as allergic rhinitis or nasal allergy,

is an inflammation of the lining of the nose brought on by an allergic reaction. It occurs because of a sensitivity of the nasal tissues to inhaled particles called allergens. The allergic reaction is an exaggerated bodily response to substances that are normally harmless. The allergens stimulate the body to produce antibodies which react with the allergen to cause the release of histamine, producing the itching, swelling and other allergy symptoms.

If you are concerned about hay fever, consult your family physician. After examination you may be sent to see an allergy specialist. If your physician or allergist confirms that you have symptoms consistent with hay fever or a related allergy, the next step will be to determine from your family history what indoor or outdoor allergens you are sensitive to and whether or not your allergy is perennial or seasonal. Once the causal allergens have been identified, treatment can begin.




