Commuter Challenge Day had arrived, and as VCC had challenged Langara, I was keen to participate.

My plan was to bike in. The flat tire was pumped up, the helmet unearthed from the deepest recesses of the garage, and suitable garb readied (not Lycra something much less form-fitting). Alas, the morning was gray and as I considered the bike ride, dressed in my spiffy, yet baggy, outfit, it began to rain. Back into the house, change of clothes and onto Plan "B" - the bus.

In anticipation of possible rain, I had researched which bus and which bus stop would get me on my way - Number 28, Kootenay Loop. Off I headed on foot to the Loop. I scanned the signs - no Number 28, but there was a Number 27 - that must be it. I waited patiently and eventually a Number 27 pulled in. The driver jumped out, closed the door and left - for where I don't know. Eventually he came back. "Is this the same as the Number 28," I asked. "No," he replied, "It's a 27 (oh, really?). The 28 is across the street - over there where the bus is pulling out - in fact that is the Number 28."

So, I crossed the street to await the next 28. While waiting I noted that another person waiting asked yet another if she had change for a loonie, for the bus. Change? The last time I took a bus, the nice driver made change with one of those clickity things that held coins dispensed with lit-

tle levers. So, in response to my enquiry, my fellow sidewalk loungers told me exact change. Yikes! Who has change for a \$5.00 bill? No one.

Back across the street to the store - "no change," the sign said. Purchase of some gum and insistence on a whole whack of coins, back to the bus stop I went. My exact change advisers had gone - no doubt on the Number 28. With patience declining, I leaned against a building and waited, and waited. Finally the 28 arrived - great.

On I climbed, exact change ready, and off we went. Around the corner, at relatively high speed, making good time, till we got about half way to where I would need to transfer. We stopped. We remained stopped. For ten minutes. Finally, off we went again, the driver announcing the Lougheed stop for me - I guess in recognition of my question 15 minutes earlier - do you go to Lougheed?

Now, I thought, it should be easy - hop on a B-Line bus and speed to KEC. In fact, here comes one now. I hurried towards the stop, estimating I could make it, and intercept the bus. But no, the bus stop had been temporarily moved because of construction. Moved 200 feet further way. The B-Line rushed past, stopped briefly 200 feet away, teased me as I approached from behind by resting there, and pulled away

Summary of Board Meetings

June 8, 2000

The scheduled May Board meeting was postponed until June 8, 2000. The meeting was preceded by an informal presentation on Budget process and current Budget. The draft Budget would be presented later in the Board meeting, for information. Board approval of the Budget will be sought at the Board meeting on June 22, 2000.

The Board Chair advised that the Board has sent a letter to the Minister with four nominations for new Board members. The nominations were based on Board member selection and identified areas of experience required on the Board: finance, education, leadership, community and industry (related to applied programs). Announcements of Board appointments are usually made at the end of July and there are no guarantees that any of the College Board's suggestions will be accepted. This year we anticipate four new Board appointments.

The Finance and Administration Committee presented the draft Budget 2000/2001 and the College-Wide Budget Committee Capital Ranking, for information at this meeting and approval at the next meeting, on June 22, 2000.

Education Council advised the Board of their endorsement of a new definition of a "student in good standing," in regard to election of student members on Education Council and the Board. They also advised approval of the "Appeal of Final Grade Policy". The Board approved the proposed change to the Entrance Requirements in the Drafting Program, as recommended by Education Council.

Board members who had attended the ACCC 2000 conference in Whitehorse at the end of May reported on the conference highlights. The thought provoking keynote speech by John Ralston Saul was noted by everyone. One of his key messages was the importance of seeing education as an investment, not a cost.

June 22, 2000

The Chair welcomed Mary Dean to the Board, as King Edward Campus Student representative.

The Finance and Administration Committee presented the 2000/01 Budget, the 1999/2000 Financial Statements, 1999/2000 Public Bodies Report and the 2000/2001 Equipment Replacement Capital List, and all were approved by the Board. For Information the Board received the 1999/2000 Enrolment Report and the Non-Base Funded Policy was presented for information at this meeting and approval at the next Board meeting.

Education Council advised approval of the Program Review Policy, and the Board endorsed the Policy. Several members of the College Community spoke in favour of the Policy, and recognition was given to the amount of work that had gone into its development.

A report of the June 13 meeting of Operations Council was given and the Travel Policy was presented to the Board for information.

The Board agreed that they would not meet in July or August unless an issue arises which requires a meeting. Instead of the August meeting, an all day orientation will be held for both new and current Board members. An opportunity will be provided for Board members to meet representatives of the constituency groups.

At the Advanced Education Council of B.C. Conference in June Colleges were asked to advise of issues that could be used as advocacy items in the Fall. Board members put forward five items of immediate concern to the College, and these will be submitted to AECBC at the end of June.

Ian Campbell, Karenn Krangle and Lee Anne Ragan will retire from the Board at the end of July and were recognized for their hard work and contribution to the College. They all expressed their thanks for having the opportunity to be on the Board at VCC and all felt it had been a very positive learning experience.

Winners of the "Name the Centre" Contest


We are pleased to let you know that we have a winning name for our new downtown centre opening in November, 2000. (see Connections, May 12 issue).

1. New Members

Jennifer Spoke (replacing Raj Kapoor) and Charles Finch (replacing Veronica Jorna), CUPE representatives for City Centre Campus and King Edward Campus respectively, were welcomed.

2. Managing a Potentially Violent Situation -Procedures

Steve Traviss, Safety and Security Coordinator, circulated a handout titled, "How to Respond to a Potentially Violent Situation," He reviewed the various procedures for employees and students responding to a potentially violent situation. Council members were asked to provide any comments and feedback to Steve by June 27. The final version of the document will be recirculated to Operations Council. Eventually, the procedures will become part of the process for orienting new employees, new student and IRAs (Instructors with Release Allowance).

3. Terms of Reference -**Operations Council**

The Council's revised Terms of Reference was approved. The revision related to a change in title for the Director of International Education and Contract Services to the Director of Ventures and International Enterprises.

4. Code of Ethics

Rob Henderson, Coordinator of Human Rights and Diversity, asked members to review the Code of Ethics document recently published in the June 9 issue of VCC Connections and provide feedback to him by June 27. He also advised that, although it is not indicated in the version published in the newsletter, the document is still a draft. Operations Council will be asked to endorse the Code of Ethics at their July meeting.

5. 2000/2001 Budget

The 2000/2001 draft budget was approved by the majority of the members present, with the exception of CUPE and VCCFA representatives who did not endorse the passing of the budget. Primarily, the unions disagreed with the College's decision to apply the one-time revenues received from the Sunlife demutualization towards balancing the budget. The VCCFA also voiced the opinion that they did not agree with the College's position that instructors affected by the reduction to ESL offerings, equalling 88 FTEs, were able to be re-assigned elsewhere in the ESL Division. Council was informed that the Program Profile/Education Plan was approved by Education Council on June 6th. The budget package will be presented at the June 15 meeting Finance Committee and the June 22 VCC Board meetings for final approval.

6. 2000/2001 Capital Process

The 2000/2001 Capital Equipment Replacement list, as ranked by the College Wide Budget Committee, was approved. The list will be presented to the Finance Committee and to the VCC Board on June 15 and June 22 respectively for final approval.

7. Draft - Non-base Funded **Activities Policy**

Mary Hoekstra presented draft #3 of

the Non-base Funded Activities Policy. Changes mainly related to re-organization of the contents of the Policy. The policy also now emphasizes that the project sponsor is responsible for ensuring that the routing procedures for non-based funded contracts are followed and that signing officers related specifically to non-based funded contracts would be the President. Vice Presidents and the Director of Financial Services.

8. Draft - Travel Policy

The Travel Policy was approved. Dave Crowe, Manager of Purchasing, re-circulated the draft Travel Policy, presented at the Council's May meeting. The Policy remained unchanged. There had been questions around the proposed per diem rate but Dave reported that, after doing comparative research in the community, private sector and college system, he has found the rate to be comparable.
