September 12, 2000 KEC, Room 5025 Acting Chair: Linda Martin

1. Draft Parking Policy

The Draft Parking Policy, originally on the agenda for approval, was presented for information instead. Given summer vacations, the approval process was extended to give members an opportunity to provide comments to Steve Traviss before the next Council meeting.

2. Code of Ethics

The Code of Ethics was endorsed by Operations Council. Support from both the VCCFA membership and CUPE membership will be sought. Results will be announced at the next Council meeting. The Code of Ethics will be introduced at the Board's September meeting and brought forward for approval at their October session.

3. Draft Human Rights Policy

The revised Human Rights Policy was introduced by Rob Henderson, with a request to provide comments to him before the Council meeting in October. The Policy will be brought forward at that time for approval. The revisions included making the document more educational and bringing the language and processes in line with CUPE and VCCFA collective agreements.

4. Career Technical Centre

A joint proposal between Langara College, BCIT, the Vancouver School Board and VCC was recently submitted to the Ministry. Hopefully, approval will be received sometime in October. This project will provide an opportunity for students to enrol in and receive credit for 2.5 year certificate programs, after Grade 10 but while they are still in high school. Programs involved are Information

Technology, Graphic Communications and Production Technology and Electronics.

5. Report on Performance of Contract Fund

A brief presentation was heard from Michael Yue and Michael Proud on the Contract Fund 25 performance for the 1999/2000 fiscal period.

6. 5 Year Capital Plan

The 5 Year Capital Plan was approved. Colleges and institutes are required to make a submission to the Ministry every fall. The Ministry determines its budget for the following fiscal year based on these submissions.

The College has recently received official confirmation and approval from the Pension Corporation that while a faculty member or administrator is on leave without pay for Short Term Disability Benefits while enrolled in the Pension Plan, they will be credited pensionable service without any contributions from the plan member or the College. This new provision is retroactive to March 31, 1980.

The Human Resources Department has STD files from January 1, 1987 and has submitted the relevant data to the Pension

date onwards.

As our records do not go back past 1987, your must notify Eugenie Wong (Human Resources Coordinator) at 871-7136 if you were on a leave of absence without pay for Short Term Disability Benefits from March 31, 1980 to December 31, 1986 and enrolled in the College Pension Plan in order to receive credit for pensionable service. Harvest of Hope

Harvest of Hope is an annual campaign to gather food for hungry and disadvantaged people. This year it will take place during the two weekends around Thanksgiving, October 2nd to 13th. Again, it will be sponsored by Quest Outreach Society.

Quest was founded in 1990, initially to provide hot meals for hungry people in the downtown eastside. As the need grew, so did Quest, which now provides to Tri-Cities, Burnaby, and Surrey.

Quest feeds over 5,000 people each month: hot sit-down meals for the Homeless in Downtown Eastside and the West End; food for women's shelters, youth street programs, neighbourhood houses, halfway houses, food banks, and children's day programs; food hampers for seniors, the disabled and persons who cannot leave their homes; and emergency food hampers for families and individuals referred by social service agencies.

Therapeutic communication is essential in health care

Therapeutic communication involves sensitivity and tact. A health care worker should listen with a "third ear" in order to be able to receive the whole message. This suggests a certain degree of intuitiveness, and involves being sensitive and attuned to what is left unsaid; all the aspects of body language exhibited; as well as the volume and tone of voice used by the client. These all offer valuable clues, and when processed properly, enable a health

worker to receive the complete and accurate message. Tact is the ability to communicate in a pleasant and professional manner. This is very important in the health care profession where we often deal with difficult and delicate issues. Therapeutic communication involves being aware of the effect of the words we use; the way we phrase them; our body language; as well as the volume and tone of our voice. Equally important is know-

ing what NOT to say. Unnecessary information or comments may do more harm than good. Ideally, the client comes away with all the necessary information, feeling reassured and comforted and better equipped to take the next step.
