

Above: Fred Deeley Imports donated a Harley for a weekend as one of the Silent Auction Items.






## VCC Foundation Proposal Makes Short List

The VCC Foundation is thrilled to have made the short list of candidates to receive a donation from the BC Hydro Employees Community Service Fund (HYDRECS) A proposal to support VCC's students with disabilities, visually impaired and Deaf and hard of hearing students worth \$42,733 has made it to the final round and beat out a large number of other applicants from around the province. The proposed funding would pay for some much needed equipment including a fax machine, printer, learning software and a Braille light millennium.

As part of the final decision making, VCC along with the other candidates, has been asked to do a presentation on April 24 to a 19-member committee at BC Hydro which is comprised of representatives from all employee groups as well as retired BC Hydro staff.

Four VCC students will take part in the presentation. "We are really excited to have them participate," says Sheilah Henderson, Executive Director of the Foundation. The four students are Carie Winch and Jean Fournier from Community and Career Education, Theresa Andrews from Visually Impaired and Ying Sin from Deaf and Hard of Hearing.

## VCC Programs Draw a Crowd

Close to 1000 people packed Vancouver Community College's City Centre Campus for its 3rd biannual Program Information Night on April 11, 2002. Potential students and parents were eager to find out what VCC has to offer.

Although the event focused on promoting the Applied Programs, representatives from High School Completion and Upgrading and ESL as well as Counselling, Financial Aid and Admissions were on hand to answer questions from students. To give visitors a better understanding of the programs, many tables featured displays ranging from spray painting to jewellery creations and electronics equipment to cooking demonstrations. VCC music students at one end of the building and 104.9 XFM at the other welcomed visitors. - Only 3% of visitors to Info Night said that it was not useful for them.

"Thanks for the displays, information and music!"



Above: Fisheye view of City Centre Courtyard during Info Night.







## **Library Renewals** Made Easy

Did you know that you don't need to call or come in to the Library to renew your Library materials? You can do it yourself! Follow these instructions:

- Simply access the Library catalogue on the web at: www vcc.ca/library
- Go to the main search screen of the catalogue and select Borrower Info.
- Type in the library barcode number from the front of your employee photo ID card, enter your PIN (last four digits of your phone number) and follow the on screen instructions...

Remember to renew at least one day before the item is due. You will be unable to renew an item if it is already overdue or if another patron has placed a hold.

We encourage you to give this time saving and efficient method of self-renewal a try.

#### **Employee Photo ID** and the Library

By now, all full-time and parttime VCC staff should have an employee photo ID card. Did you know that this card serves as your Library card and entitles you to borrowing privileges? The Library serves hundreds of people every day so it is impossible for Library staff to know who is who and provide an efficient service without proper identification.

We need your help. You will find that checkouts are simpler and more efficient when you present your employee photo ID.

On behalf of all the graduating students here tonight from the Academic, Adult Basic Education and Adult Special Education Division, I would like to say, "Welcome Everyone!"

Our Instructors, Sylvia Patey and Marita Morrow - what can I say - passionate, committed and understanding. Their love and belief in what they do is the reason why we all succeeded in our quest for answers. On the last day of our program, Sylvia, you told us that we were the "best group you'd had so far". It is who you are - caring, hardworking - you always had time for us - you brought out the best in us! Thank you, Thank you.

# Important Information Concerning Photo ID Cards

In order to be more efficient and reduce the costs associated with the production of Photo ID cards for both students and employees, please make note of the new Photo ID schedule that will be in effect from May 1 – August 31, 2002. - Student ID cards are required in order to access Library services and to obtain FASTTRAX transit discount stickers from the Student Association Offices. (a \$2.00 fee applies)

There is no charge to obtain a Student ID card although if the card is lost or stolen, there is a \$10.00 replacement fee payable at the Cashiers' Office. The cashier will issue a new registration form which is necessary to obtain a replacement card during posted hours and locations.

Students who currently have a Student ID card can obtain an expiry date sticker from the Cashier's Office at either campus.
