Leave Out the PO Box Number

Vancouver Community College has revised the address of the King Edward Campus, removing the Post Office Box number, which has in the past fostered confusion and caused delays when mailers shortened the address.

Marketing and Purchasing have worked with Canada Post on the new address, which includes an all-new postal code that was created especially to correspond to the Broadway street address.

New address for the King Edward Campus reads:

1155 East Broadway Vancouver, B.C. V5T 4V5

This change was initiated to deal with several logistical, service and marketing issues, including misdirected or delayed mail that resulted when correspondents left out the PO Box from the KEC address; those delays were owing to how Canada Post handled the Box mail, something that the 'new' address will fix.

"We were seeing a lot of confusion among people sending us mail," says purchasing manager Dave Crowe, who handles the college's liaison with Canada Post. "It was time for us to simplify the mailing address for KEC: now it's simply the street address and our new postal code."

KEC's 'old' address using the PO Box will continue to operate for at least a year, so there is no need for the college to re-do materials, but can make the change when stationery, business cards and other items come up for reprinting.

Some existing program and other materials may have addresses that

include the Broadway street address with the previous postal code. Departments re-producing materials featuring the KEC address should check carefully to ensure that the proper postal code (V5T 4V5) accompanies the street address of 1155 East Broadway.

E-mail users should revise their signature files to reflect the new address.

He was also highly respected by classroom faculty who came to him for advice about challenging students and various classroom issues. His timely wisdom was much valued and apprecialted.

VCC Chefs Donate Time to make PNE Show a Success for 4th Year

The major event in Vancouver each year in late summer is the Fair at the PNE. For VCC's Culinary Arts department, the big event is the Pacific Cooking Show at the PNE. For the fourth year, VCC chef instructors entertained audiences with three shows per day for the full 17 days of the PNE Fair from August 17 to September 2.

Although the arrangement with the PNE is to reimburse the College for all costs, the Culinary Arts instructors have donated their time (double shifting and working on weekends and holidays) to raise funds for various activities. The initial seed money in the JJ's Renovation project came from the first year of the cooking show. This year, some funds were allocated for upgrading the buffet accessories at JJ's and travel costs for a student team to compete later in the year and the balance was placed in general revenues.


Each day at 1:30 and 6:30, VCC chef instructors were "on stage" providing cooking tips to audiences of up to 300 people. Interspersed with information on the Culinary Arts programs and the College, the chef instructors offered a wide variety of recipes, ranging from desserts to seafood. A change this year was that two audience members were selected by answering a question on VCC to sit at a special table near the stage and dine on that show's specialty. The 3:30 show featured a celebrity chef who was assisted on stage by the VCC instructor. Bonkowski, O'Flaherty and Dave Donaldson shared hosting duties. Rumours that Harald and his booming voice are being considered for a syndicated cooking show are unsubstantiated.

As part of the PNE commitment, VCC prepared a breakfast on site on August 15 for 150 people from the Board of Trade, Tourism Vancouver, the Vancouver Board of Trade and various media outlets.

VCC donated a basket (containing culinary, dental and hairdressing products and materials) to the Variety Club Celebrity Egg Auction on August 29. The VCC basket, with the addition of a dozen fruit trees and the largest egg, raised \$3000 as part of the overall fundraising of \$26,750.

Media coverage included two articles in the Province and coverage on Shaw Cable. Over 8500 VCC fact sheets (with recipes) were distributed throughout the show and each attendee to the Fair (approximately 1,000,000 people) received a day's events sheet, which included reference to VCC and the cooking show.

Maritza's Maintenance Message

Tip-top Shape Projection Screens


The environment for learning is very important to the teaching process. How classrooms are equipped and maintained influences how students approach the instruction and how teachers guide the learning process.

With all the attention given the various components of an effective projection system, the most important piece of equipment for getting the message across is often the most overlooked: the projection screen.

There are several criteria influencing the selection of the right projection screen such as size, placement, sight lines, surface types and aesthetics.

The standard roll-down screen used in our classrooms is made of a material that is a matte (flat) white colour. This material is mildew resistant and flame retardant and it has excellent projection characteristics and a wide viewing angle. These screens operate similar to a window shade. You pull them down for use and let them roll up when the show is over.

Our last, but certainly not least, consideration in screen selection is the issue of screen maintenance. Screens can last a lifetime with proper care. Ongoing support will always be essential to maintain the equipment



in optimal working condition.

Typical abuse of screens in educational settings include:

a) accidental soiling (writing on the screen, finger prints, dust, chalk, fluid splashes)

b) damage to the roll-down mechanism from inadvertent or constant handling

Under no circumstances should the screen be made wet or cleaned with any material containing bleach or other chemicals; mild soap and warm water can be used to clean the surface.

If you have a problem (mechanism/soiling) with the projection screen in a classroom, call me at local 8614 and I will take prompt action.

I'm a new instructor at VCC. In case either myself or one of my students require first aid, what do I do and who do I notify?

Dear Boo-boo Bob:

Great question Bob!! Here at VCC we have an Emergency Procedures Handbook that you may find helpful with other Emergency situations as well as how to obtain Emergency First Aid. The Handbook is available through the Facilities Department located on the first floor.

To obtain Emergency First Aid follow these basic procedures:

- * If the injury is life threatening, immediately call 9-911 then contact security. Never leave an injured person unattended. Send someone else for help, giving specific instruction as to what is wrong with the individual (i.e. not breathing, bleeding badly, unconscious), your exact location, the nearest entrance and ask the person to return to you with confirmation that they did indeed reach 911. Send an additional person to wait for the ambulance, fire or police so they can direct them to the emergency.
- * For non life-threatening injuries where the victim is unable to reach health services, call security at 4444 or by using a help phone. Stay with the injured person until security/first aid arrives. Once again you should give security accurate information as to where you are located and the

status of the victim.

- * For non life-threatening injuries where the victim is able to reach health services, treatment will be carried out there. Escort the victim to health services and stay with them until first aid takes over.
- * For any injury that involves a member of the VCC staff, contact the Safety Assistant in the Facilities Department at local 8456 so an accident investigation can be done and if necessary forms filled out to apply for Workers Compensation.


