

Baking and pastry student's gingerbread house wins 3rd prize

eight students from baking and pastry program under Marlie van de Ven's guidance entered the Hyatt Regency's Annual Gingerbread House contest and won third prize. Originally entered in the amateur competition, the judges were so impressed they bumped VCC up to the professional category where they competed against hotels and bakeries.

The student's concept was to show the "inside" of the gingerbread house and it's not hard to see why the judges were impressed. Made with over twenty-five kilos of gingerbread, the house is entirely edible and features a fully decorated Christmas tree, a staircase lined with chocolate, and marzipan animals sitting around a table with complete place settings. The students didn't skimp on anything and added details like, croissants on the plates down to nails in the floorboards.

The students donated 360 hours of their own time to the project, working before classes and weekends. "We didn't mind the extra hours" says Elmo Pinpin, 23, of North Vancouver. "It ended up being quite a learning process

Dispelling VCC myth

ith such a large and diverse population at VCC, it is often difficult to know exactly what other departments do. In an effort to dispel myths, each issue of Connections will focus on a different Student Services department.

THIS MONTH'S MYTHS: Financial Aid

The financial aid department provides need-based and merit awards to VCC students. There are seven financial aid staff and two campus offices. Financial aid administers government and VCC funded programs.

How savvy are you about financial aid rules and procedures? Take a look at the following five financial aid myths, then enter to win a Christmas cake and cookies donated by the baking department.

Five financial aid myths:

1. All students should be able to get student loans because all Canadians are taxpayers and, after all, it's only a loan.

False. A needs assessment process determines whether a student will get a student loan and how much she/he will get. Student loans are interest r free to students and the interest is paid by taxpayers. Grants are available in most provinces. B.C. has federal Millennium grants for students in second year or higher and grants for students with dependant chili dren. Financial assistance is available for students with financial need and there is a cost to the taxpayer.

2. It takes students about 6 weeks to find out the answer about their loan; and, then, they receive the money immediately.

False. It can take only 2 to 3 weeks to find out the result of a loan if applying on-line; however, the money

will not be deposited in their account until on or after their start date. If a student cannot pay their initial fees ahead of their start date, they will need to arrange a fee deferral through the cashier's office.

3. Once students receive their loan they pretty much don't have to worry about doing anything else.

False. The student has numerous responsibilities, which are outlined in contracts signed by the student:

- There is a requirement to stay in school for the funded period and to successfully complete their studies.
- If they complete their funded year and return to post-secondary studies, they are responsible for notifying the lender of their return to school if they want the benefit of "interest free" status on their
- If they don't return to school they are required to start repayment six months after leaving.
- 4. Most student loan borrowers repay their loans

True. Approximately 90% of borrowers pay back their student loans.

5. When it comes time to pay back the loan, if they can't pay, there is no help for them.

False. If students can't pay because of unemployment or under-employment, they can apply for Interest Relief – a program where the Federal and/or Provincial government(s) pay the interest because the student is unable.


Film license extended

The VCC Library recently signed a new feature film license, which covers all VCC departments and classrooms. Previously, only classes at KEC and the International Education Centre could use feature films free of charge. Now all VCC departments, including those at the City Centre campus are covered by this license.

This means that for the first time most feature films can be shown in all VCC classrooms without additional fees. These include films that are owned by the library, borrowed from other libraries, rented from video stores and legal personal copies.

The only restriction regarding use is that they must be distributed in Canada by either Audio-Cine Films (www.acf-film.com) or Criterion Pictures (www.criterionpic.com). These two companies represent approximately 80% of the feature film market in Canada, including almost all major U.S. releases.

Instructors who want to show a film in class but are unsure if it is covered by this license, should go directly to the company websites and check, or call the Media Librarian (Brenda Appleton, local 7343 or 864) or your departmental liaison librarian for assistance.
