Diesel industry raises \$50,000 for VCC students

Vancouver Community College and diesel industry leaders gathered on June 25, 1996 to celebrate their success in raising \$50,000 to purchase a high tech piece of training equipment designed to give diesel students hands-on experience in hydraulic problem-solving.

The glistening, newly-installed state-ofthe-art hydraulic simulator guarantees future VCC diesel graduates will have technical skills which will give them the cutting edge over others when applying for work in the industry.

Two years ago, when funding was not available for this advanced technology, its \$50,000 price tag became a challenge for industry. Through the efforts of a fundraising committee, chaired by Finning's Jack Carthy and composed entirely of industry members, their dedication to VCC's students paid off.

"Finning's commitment to VCC's diesel program guarantees we'll be able to hire the best trained technicians available. It's a win, win situation," exclaimed John Boe, Training Manager, Finning.

In a refined ceremony held at VCC, replete with tea and dessert squares amongst a backdrop of diesel engines,

grease and coveralls, representatives from Finning Ltd., Coastal Towing Co. Ltd., and a host of other corporate and individual donors looked on with pride as the hydraulic simulator was unveiled. Few diesel technician programs can boast such advanced technology.

This one piece of equipment is critical to the technical expertise of future mechanics. Now VCC diesel students will have hands-on experience diagnosing and repairing a variety of simulated hydraulic engine problems.

"Partnerships with industry provide revenue generating activity which is essential as government funding for the post-secondary sector becomes increasingly scarce and the number of individuals pursuing advanced education grows," said Bob Faulkner, Educational Foundation Chair.

SFU students connect businesses to Internet

Fifteen SFU students are putting their computer knowledge to work to help companies develop their Internet skills. The Student Connection program at SFU started from an Industry Canada initiative to help small - and medium-sized businesses and not-for-profit agencies learn how to navigate the World Wide Web. It is also supported by SFU Co-op and the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada.

VCC ESL instructor wins dean's medal

Fraser Thorburn, an instructor in the ESL-Vocational Department, knows that not having access to a television has its benefits

The winner of the dean's medal in graduate studies in Simon Fraser University's faculty of education worked in Africa for 10 years before studying for his master of arts degree.

"I taught ESL and secondary school English in Nigeria, Tanzania and Zimbabwe," the Burnaby resident says. "I worked in developing countries because I assumed it would give me an authentic introduction into other cultures that I wouldn't get if I just travelled."

Thorburn says returning to formal studies more than 15 years after earning his undergraduate degree from the University of New Brunswick wasn't difficult. He had become accustomed to reading and informal study while in Africa.

"There was no television where I taught so I had the luxury of having time to read and reflect. I have always maintained an informal interest in reading, reflecting and writing. Perhaps that made the transition back to university easier," he explains.

Thorburn achieved top marks in his class while combining his studies with a full-time teaching job in the VCC ESL-Vocational Department and his role as the father of three young children.

His thesis supervisor, Dr. Gloria Sampson, wrote in support, "I am confident that Fraser will have an important impact on the teaching profession in Canada."

His medal citation commends his thesis as "well written and conforming to the traditions of high scholarship." The thesis applied the philosophy of Hans-Georg Gadamer to the learning of language of immigrants.

Equipment match reinstated

During the 1996/97 fiscal year, the provincial government's matching equipment program will contribute one dollar for every dollar raised, up to a maximum of \$229,788, for the upgrade of existing equipment or the purchase of new equipment for educational training. The government funding also matches the appraised value of gifts-in-kind.

To access funds from the program, departments can work with the Educational Foundation in two ways:

1. The match can be used to leverage a monetary gift that is earmarked for equipment. The donor, or donors, contribute 50% of the total cost while the

government matching program makes up the remaining 50%.

2. Recipients of an in-kind donation can apply for the equipment match by providing documentation which outlines the value of the donated equipment. The match for in-kind gifts is considered unrestricted and is distributed according to priority program equipment needs by the College Wide Budget Committee.

Two years ago, this program was very successful at stimulating gifts for new technologies and resulted in \$276,076 being raised for equipment needs at the College. For more information, please contact the Foundation at 7148.

Foundation Board okays funding for five initiatives

At the general meeting held June 3, the VCC Educational Foundation Board approved five applications for funding. Three were submitted by the Counselling Department. The Summer Music Ensembles have proven to be successful recruitment and public relations tools.

New Horizons For Marketing Higher Education

The marketing of higher education is gaining momentum. When first introduced (about a decade and a half ago), marketing concepts and principles to higher education was perceived by most as a radical and new idea. In fact, it was an idea that was often poorly understood. Some of the misunderstandings continue to this day.

Local focus

Early on, when marketing was used, it was most often used in a defined area (i.e., admissions) for a defined purpose (increasing enrollment, preventing attrition) for a defined period of time at a predefined place. Marketing was suspect. It was a four-letter word.

However, that is changing dramatically and quickly. Many people have discovered that marketing can be key to assisting their schools, and in many cases, faculty included, preserving their jobs! Nowadays you will find many people at your school requesting that marketing become a priority.

Systems focus

Watch as programs are developed and services offered to assist institutions in assessing their audiences, segmenting their marketing efforts, developing niches in the marketplace and demonstrating how to work cooperatively to build alliances that improve their marketing and educational positions.

Integrated and **Multidimensional thinking**

Integrated thinking will focus attention on users. Marketing will "think" institutionally, but the programs will be predicated by perceptions held by users, audiences, constituents and a myriad of other external human audiences. Some schools are poised and ready to go to this next logical step, but most, unfortunately, are not there yet.

Marketing research will also be critical, accepted and well utilized. As higher education begins to re-

Every day, the media get dozens of news releases along with a huge stack of other assorted mail. Some companies go to great lengths to make their news releases stand out. They tie balloons to them, wrap them around bottles of champagne, print them onto t-shirts or attach them to hockey sticks.

The media often have great fun with the presents and hee-haws attached to the news release and have no guilt at all when they ignore the organization seeking publicity. If you do go to the extra expense of sending out a novelty news release, make sure the relevant details are on a piece of paper. Hockey sticks and t-shirts don't fit well into most newsroom filing systems.

Sex over Substance

Apart from a possible joke from the weatherman, your coverage will depend on how newsworthy the media think your story is, not on how clever you were with the news release. When your news release arrives, the reporter or editor does a very quick scan. They are looking for a hook, for an edge, for something controversial, for something that doesn't ring true or, if there is nothing else, for something that does ring true. Remember, conflict makes a better story. TV will take Sex over Substance every time.

Teaching certificates to be cancelled — is yours affected?

Do you hold a Ministry of Education Teaching Certificate issued prior to 1988? If no - stop here. If yes - continue.

Have you ever paid a membership fee to the College of Teachers? If yes - stop here. If no - continue.

Your Ministry of Education Certificate will not be valid after December 31, 1996. UNLESS you reinstate your membership with the College of Teachers before that date.

Contact the College of Teachers at the address or telephone number following to

obtain the application form which must be submitted, along with the \$90.00 reinstatement fee and an authorization for a criminal records search form, prior to December 31, 1996.

If you are affected, please act now since failure to reinstate your membership will result in your certificate being cancelled effective January 1, 1997.

Persons who allow their certificate to expire will be required to apply for a new Teaching Certificate and will be subject to the certification requirements in place at the time of application. At least 120 credits of acceptable post secondary course work, including 30 credits of professional course work will be required.

ONLY persons with a Ministry of Education Teaching Certificate issued prior to 1988 who have **NEVER** paid a membership fee to the College of Teachers are affected.
