1) PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT LEAVE

Your attention is directed to article VII, paragraph C.2 (d) (iii) on page 12 of the current Collective Agreement.

"An instructor must submit a formal proposal for professional development leave setting out how the time will be used to his advantage and that of the College. Upon return from such leave the instructor shall account for his activities during such leave.

The application, in writing, is to be made to the Principal, through your Department Head, or if you do not have one, your Division Chairman, on a sheet separate from the green "Request for Leave" form which is also to be submitted.

It should give the proposed dates, outline the proposed activities and it should be handed in at least one month before going on leave.

Within one month of returning from leave you should make a written report to the Principal outlining:

(a) The purposes of the professional development leave

(b) The activities undertaken, such as:

places visited

people consulted

books read, etc.

(c) An evaluation as to how you feel that you have benefited from the leave

- (d) Suggestions as to how the College might benefit from your activities while on leave

If you have already taken your Professional Development Leave and have not yet handed in your account of your activities please do so within a month.

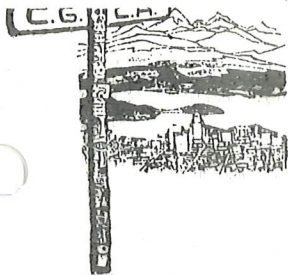
