1) HABITAT HIGHLIGHTS: May 27 - May 31

At the Forum:

1. Official opening of Habitat Forum, Thursday, May 27 at 1500 in the Plenary Hall. Speakers will include Sr. Enrique Penalosa (Secretary General, Habitat) and Hon. Barney Danson (Minister of State for Urban Affairs).
2. "A Sense of Place", Canada's film contribution to the UN conference will be shown at the Forum on the evening of May 28 in Hangar 3, Theatre A (also on May 27 at 2000 in the New Westminster public library auditorium, 716 Sixth Avenue).
3. Interfaith religious service on May 30 at 1015 in the Plenary Hall. The guest speaker will be anthropologist Margaret Mead.
4. Statement by one Vancouver symposium (25 scholars convened by economist and environmentalist Barbara Ward) on May 30 at 1500 in the Plenary Hall.
5. Mother Teresa, the missionary leader from Calcutta, will speak on May 31 at 1330 in the Plenary Hall (also at 2000 the same day in the Pacific Coliseum).

Habitat Film Festival:

1. Social alternatives and Canadian made films are the two themes featured at The Western Front, 303 - East 8th Avenue, from May 26 to June 12.
2. Also a series of classic Canadian films will be shown at the Cinematheque, 1155 West Georgia, from May 25 to June 11.

Both exhibitions feature two shows nightly. Admission for all shows is \$1. For further information, call 732-5322.
