Dear Sir:

In September 1974 the Prime Ministers of Canada and Japan announced their intention to initiate matching and complementary programs of about one million dollars each for promoting academic relations, with the funds being used primarily for the development of Japanese studies in Canada and of Canadian studies in Japan. In accordance with this intention, in March 1975 the Japan Foundation conferred a grant of about one million dollars (three hundred million yen) on the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada. One quarter of this amount has been allocated to the University of British Columbia for the promotion of Japanese Studies according to principles and guidelines laid down by the Japan Foundation.

Among the proposed uses of the funds provided will be fellowships and scholar-ships, including summer language fellowships, tenable at this university; and internships, also tenable at this university, for qualified faculty members of other colleges and universities lacking proper training facilities in the field of Japanese studies who wish to be trained in this field.

I would be grateful if you would draw these opportunities to the attention of interested faculty and students in your institution.
