COUNCIL COUNCIL MEETING: WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 12th

At Wednesday's meeting, our College Council, in public session, took the following action:

- a) Search Committee. For the public record, the Council received the College Principal Search Committee Report transmittal letter.
- b) Capital Funding. A resolution carried that "Council approves the 1977/78 Capital Budget of \$709,737 as proposed by the centres and funded by the Ministry of Education."
- c) Capital Funding: V.S.A. A motion, similar to the above but for a lesser amount (\$70,000) carried.
- d) "Designation" under the Colleges and Provincial Institutes Act. Resolutions carried respecting the preparation of a draft paper, for discussion purposes, respecting designation, by-laws, College district, College Board, etc. The resolutions in their entirety:
 1. "That the Vancouver Community College Council prepare a brief for the Minister not later than December 14, 1977 recommending designation of Vancouver Community College under the Colleges and Provincial Institutes Act.
 2. "That the College Administrative Board be instructed to submit a discussion paper on designation to the College Council at its meeting of November 9, 1977, covering the following topics:
 - a) The area of the province that is in the College region (Section 6);
 - b) The composition of the College Board (Section 7);
 - c) The role and composition of the Program Advisory Committee (Section 13(b));
 - d) The by-laws of the College (Sections 13(c), 14, 17(e);
 - e) Such other matters as seem suitable for a designation proposal.
 3. "That the College Administrative Board be instructed to seek such advice as it deems appropriate from the College's solicitors and from within the College in the preparation of its discussion paper."
- e) RACs. Council approved four RACs, for submission to the Ministry,

covering short courses to be offered by C.E.S.

Background material on the above was available at the Council meeting.
I have placed a copy of the material in our Library.

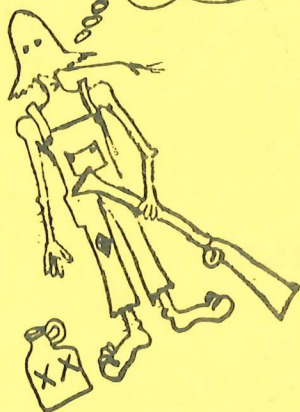

enthusiastic and an enrolment of some 40-50 employees is anticipated.

DOOLEY'S RETURN

Norman and Christel Dooley, a husband and wife team of instructors from Vancouver City College, will be adopting Kitimat as their home for the next eight months during which time they'll conduct two classes a day, three days a week.

This is the couple's second longterm visit to our community. Many of you may have met them two years ago when they taught a program of conversational English which was initiated by the company with the support of Canada Manpower.

That program was largely geared to prospective employees who needed English upgrading to qualify for hire. The difference this time is that the classes are the product of joint management-union co-operation, are for people already employed in the plant, and will use our industrial system as the basis for the teaching approach.

Norman and Christel have spent hours watching training films and familiarizing themselves with the potroom jargon. Says Norman, "The emphasis will be on work-related English - understanding instructions, giving instructions, filling out reports, and so on."

Christel adds, "There will be a scope beyond that though. We'll also be concerned with everyday comprehension so that people taking this course will end up with a full sense of understanding."

Regular classes will be held at 3 Drake Street (Northwest

Community College office) three days a week in the mornings from 9:00 am to 11:00 am and in the evenings from 7:00 pm to 9:00 pm.

On alternate days, the Dooleys will be holding a self-help open class which they'll staff for a full six hours.

"These open classes will be for any employee who wants reading, writing or vocabulary assistance," Christel explains. "Anyone desiring help can drop in and work on his own with the materials we've brought with us from VCC. We'll be there to help analyse a person's difficulties and to assist, but the individual will be working at his own pace."

The open classroom approach may be particularly helpful to those who already speak English quite well but would like to improve their reading or writing abilities.

STILL OPEN

Norman and Christel are encouraging anyone who is interested in the course but hasn't been approached by Sue or Tony to contact them directly at 632-7538.

They've been conducting interviews this week with employees who have already indicated their interest, but Christel points out, "If we've missed you and you feel you'd like to take the course, please call us. You still have time to sign up."

Specialists in adult education, the Dooleys believe that learning a language should be an enjoyable experience and one that stems from the student's own sense of motivation.

Summing up their teaching philosophy, Norman says, "You take charge of your own learning and we'll help you wherever we can."

Language problems?

New course offers work-related English

An English training program to help current employees upgrade their understanding of the language is scheduled to begin on October 3.

The course is a result of an agreement between the company and the union stemming from the potroom reorganization in line 4A.

"With the new structure in 4A, potroom workers will be required to pass a standard practices exam in order to progress," explains Sue Moore of personnel.

"If an employee has difficulty understanding English, he's going to have a hard time with a written exam. Nobody wants to see an employee held back because of

language problems. So, the company agreed to provide language training free of cost and at times that wouldn't conflict with shift schedules."

Through the joint efforts of the company and the union the program has been set up as a voluntary and flexible course which will concentrate on work-related English.

CASAW's Tony Medeiros, who has been heavily involved with the organization of the program, spent many hours talking to employees in an effort to identify those who welcomed assistance with the language.

Reaction to the proposed course has been generally (continued on page 2)

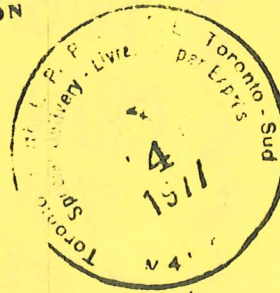

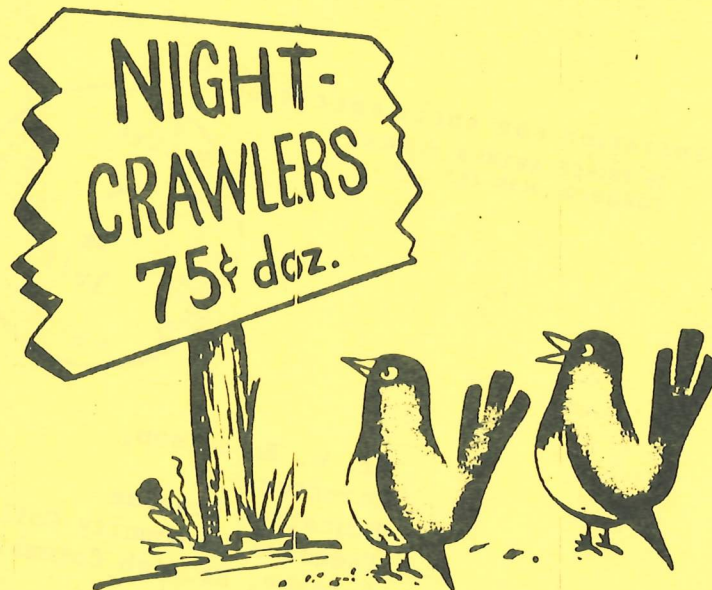
