3) "LEARNING AT A DISTANCE"

The Language Institute of U.B.C.'s centre for Continuing Education officially begins its "Learning at a Distance" project on English Language Training on Saturday, April 1. On this day, students who have already been assessed and selected will meet with their tutors for the first time at places such as the Britannia Centre, Immigrant Services Society on Main Street, and in Surrey and Abbotsford, to learn about the television part of the project and to receive the printed materials that go with the programs. On Channel 10, on Monday and Tuesday, April 3 and 4, the television program will be shown four times, twice each day, at 10:30 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. On Thursday and Friday, April 6 and 7, the second television program will be shown (at the same morning and afternoon times) and, on the following Saturday, the students will re-convene with their tutors to practise the materials they have learned from the television. This process will be repeated for another three weeks until all eight television programs have been shown.

This has been an ambitious project for the Language Institute involving not only the production of the T.V. programs, but also the designing of the materials and the training of the tutors. These programs should be of interest to all ELT instructors, but particularly to those who would like to design their own T.V. presentations.





7) WHO'S WHO????????????????????


Look for a special "Who's Who?" photo display board in the office next week (April 5, 6 and 7).
