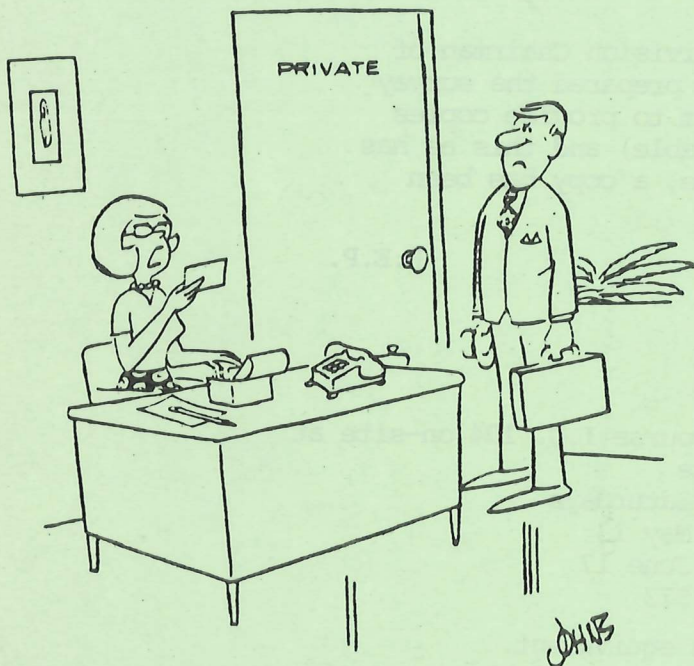
3) SECRETARIES' WEEK

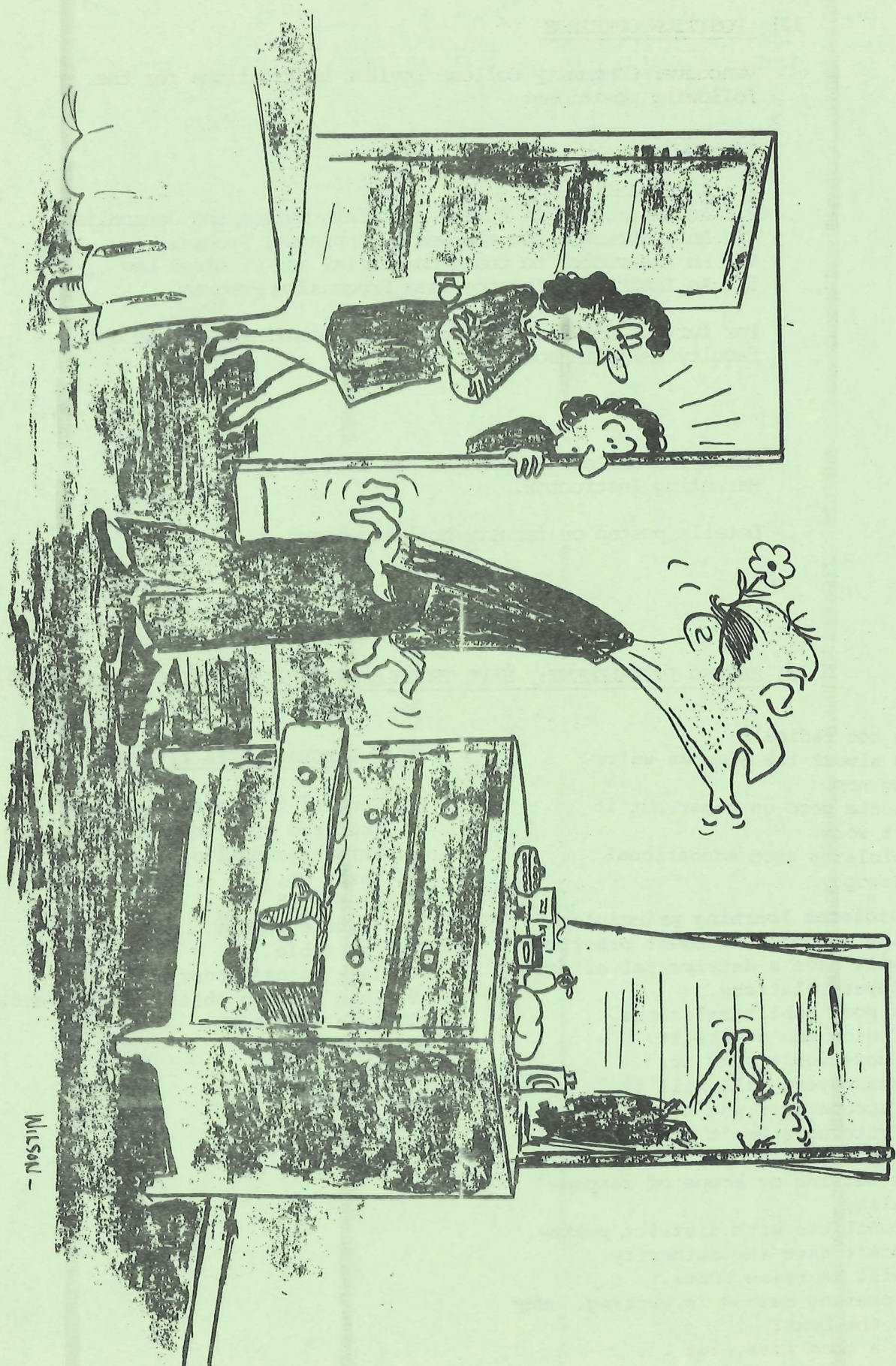
