# Kids are strictly a drag

ON'T HAVE CHILDREN. They just aren't in fashion. People these days are more aroused by whales, seals, falcons and herring. Even though a quarter of the children in some Third World countries don't live to age six, we still have plenty to spare, whereas some species of whales, seals falcons and herrings are in danger of extinction.

The trend is to have a plant or a pet. Plant stores, pet supply outlets and veterinary clinics, you've seen them spring up all over the place. Thousands of consumers can't be wrong.

A good dog will cost about \$250. A baby will cost its mother about 17 weeks away from her fulfilling career. Pregnancy and childbirth will not enhance her body.

Think of the advantages of having a puppy instead of a baby. A pup is house-broken in four months. It takes at least two years to housebreak a child. Some even need diapers after their fourth birthday.

A four-year-old child is obstreperous and expensive. A dog of similar vintage is in his prime, an affable companion who will obey your commands and never answer back.

Career parents agonize over finding good daycare. But a morning jog before work will leave a dog happy to await your evening return.

He'll guard your home and your treasures. Children leave parents too jaded to jog and too broke to own anything worth protecting.

Consult others before making the fateful parenting decision.

Carole, single owner of twin Afghan hounds, admits that dogs are a responsibility but says that dog-ownership has enriched her life. "I've met really interesting people through Emily and Ernest," she says. Her ex-husband takes them on alternative weekends.

When Suzie and Max holiday, their doberman, Albert, stays at a Pet Country Club where he is given individual attention in a heated run. "We thought of having a child," says Suzie, "but who can board a child for \$5 a day?"

Max says: "Albert would like a child to play with, but the city is no place for children."

A childless community would offer many benefits.

No more school taxes. Schools transformed into dog recreation centres. Adventure playgrounds turned into "Dogs Only" places.

That would cause unemployment among those professions which now service children but they could always retrain in related fields.

Teachers could teach dog obedience classes. Obstetricians could switch to veterinary work. Businessmen already have realized there's more money in marketing food for pets than for babies.

Of course, there'll be perverse people who'll want children no matter what.

Like my husband and me.


