Our community college: pay attention

Vancouver City College appreciated being the subject of your editorial comment (Paying Attention, May 18).

The college is playing an increasingly important role on the local education scene, as are many other community colleges and provincial institutes established throughout B.C. in recent years. That role is to teach marketable skills suited to the employment requirements of the community and a variety of other learning opportunities.

To fulfill that role colleges must retain their flexibility. That means they must constantly adjust their programs to new opportunities for employment in the areas they serve. A community college must therefore always pay attention to its community, but, equally important, the community should pay attention to its college.

VCC's three main campuses - VVI,

Langara, and King Edward Centre — all operate on an extended-day twelve-month basis, assuring taxpayers of maximum utilization of their capital-cost tax dollars and students of maximum opportunity for attendance. VCC's per student operating cost is the lowest among those of all post-secondary education institutions in B.C.

VCC would prefer improving the quality of its output to merely increasing the quantity of its intake, but because of the continuing demand for its services, combined with the impending early loss of the remainder of its rented King Edward Centre premises (to accommodate expansion of the Vancouver General Hospital), it faces a space crisis.

Your editorial said VCC intends to ask the minister for \$25 million to renovate, replace and expand its physical plant — and cer-

tainly VCC requires replacement and additional space to that value. But we hope that in view of the continuing relatively sharp decline in the pupil population of Vancouver's schools, a substantial proportion of the space requirement can be met by real-location of existing education space in Vancouver, rather than by requiring the tax-payer to pay for new buildings.

Assuming Vancouver appreciates the relevance, quality, and cost/benefit aspects of the education services VCC provides, VCC would ask all citizens to continue to pay attention and to support VCC's request for urgently needed replacement space.

9) COLLEGE COUNCIL MEETING

On May 31 there was a very peaceful College Council Meeting, one almost devoid of controversy. The evening was warm, the meeting started half an hour late, pending the completion of a quorum, and the 'public' consisted of three people, two administrators from the Regional Offices and one from another campus. Two deans 'sat in' for their absent principals and only one staff representative was there. Faculty and student representatives were not in evidence, nor, after making a great splash after the last Council Meeting, were the press.

After approval of the agenda and confirmation of the minutes the College Principal presented his "Report Number 4" to the College Council. A copy of this "Report", which highlights recent College activities, is available in the Library.

Of concern to King Edward Campus was the information that our mid-May enrollment was 3,897 students, an increase of 12% over May 1977 (in fewer classrooms!). It was also noted that we are conducting a four-week program for Basic Job Readiness Training instructors and that Cristel and Norman had been invited to winter in Kitimat for the third time.

As far as the West 8th Avenue facility is concerned, Ministry of Education officials have recommended that it be made available. However, the Minister is biding his time and has made arrangements to meet our Council to discuss the College's space needs. In the interim, the Vancouver School Board has been instructed to make 6 - 8 rooms available to us. Eight rooms, three of which we already use, are being made available to us at Strathcona School. The Primary Annex! The use of the old 'Model School', the one with no boilers and a leaking roof, a few blocks east of us, was pondered over for the umpteenth time in as many years. No great enthusiasm was shown for revitalizing that building.
